

AUSTIN, Oct. 21.-Lt. Col Mor-Loboes' next game is with Al- ris S. Schwartz, deputy state Selective Service director, today issued a last reminder to college students that the deadline for application to take the December draft college qualification test is November 1.

"No applications will be accepted that are mailed after November 1," Colonel Schwartz said. Applications for the December 4 test must be postmarked no later than midnight, Saturday, November 1, 1952.'

Students may secure application forms and bulletins of information which tell how to fill out

the forms from any local board in the state. They also can seat Midwestern. He is a hard cure self-addressed envelopes in which to mail applications from the same source.

Draft boards are closed on Saturdays and Sundays, so application blanks may be picked up personally by students only during Mondays through Fridays.

To be eligible to apply for taking the test, a student must (1) intend to request deferment as a student in writing directly to his local board, (2) be satisfactorily pursuing a full-time course of instruction, and (3) not previously have taken the test.

Colonel Schwartz emphasized in his statement that application forms can be secured at any local board.

Daffodils Dominate Spring Landscape in Their Season

Though of limited color range, the daffodil has many attractive forms, and breeders are constantly at work developing new varieties in which bright red and orange trumpets make a vivid contrast with the white or yellow petals of the flowers.

The large trumpet varieties will rise to a height of two feet, with flowers six inches across, when well grown. Other types are classified according to the relative sizes of their trumpets, from the giants, to the poeticus type, in which the trumpet is reduced to a cup, usually a bright scarlet.

Breeders have long sought to pro-duce "pink daffodils," and a few varieties have been introduced




