





Hunters Urged Watch For Fires Due To Drought

AUSTIN, Oct. 24. - The Executive Secretary of the Game operation of hunters and out-doorsmen generally is needed to avert a catastrophe to woods and forests from fire.

He said the woods and fields in most of the state have been reduced to extreme inflammability by the prolonged drought. He added that some fires already have caused great property loss as well as tragic loss to wildlife.
