Sounds interesting, doesn't it.

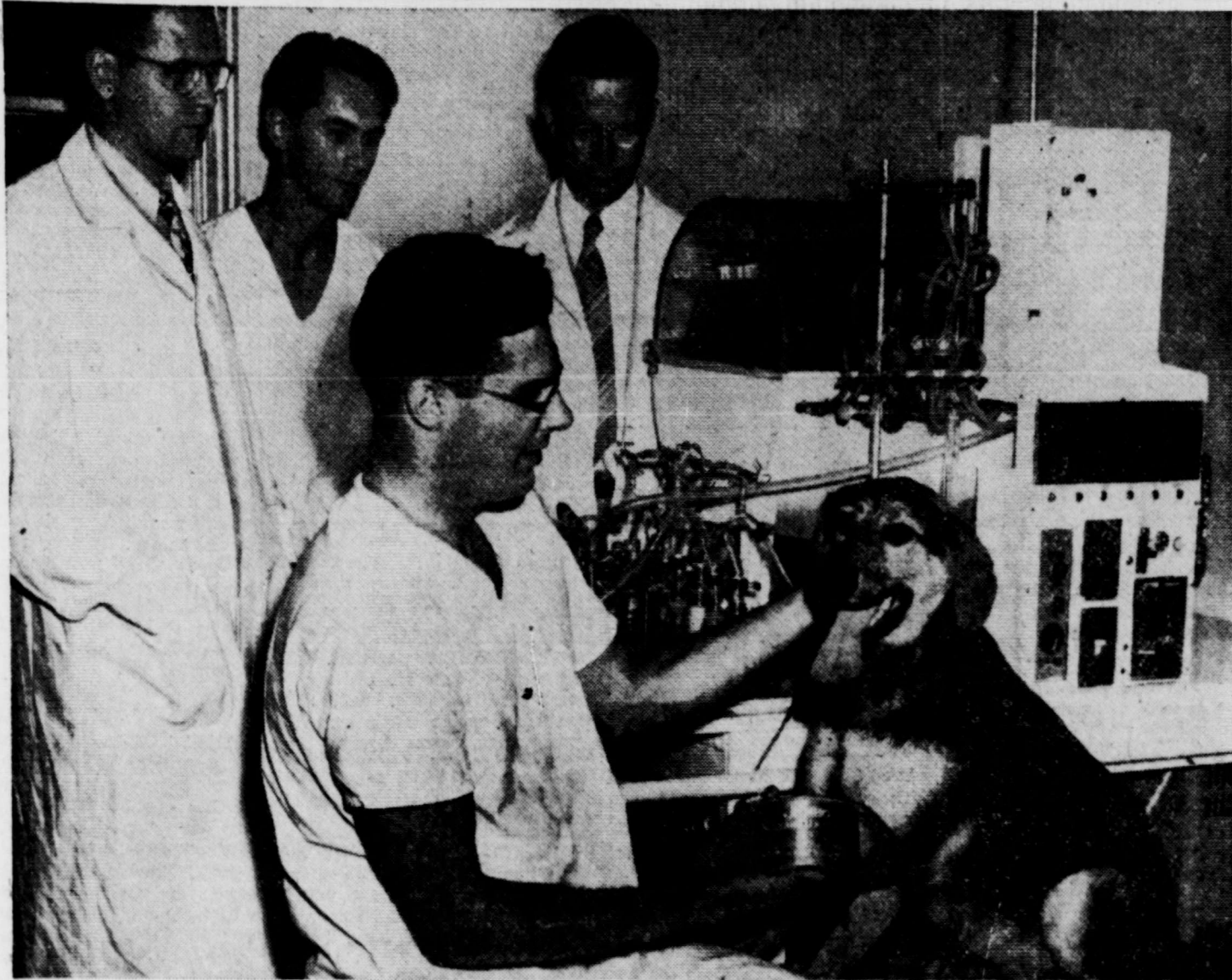

## LOBO 'B' TEAM SCORES 39 TO 0 VICTORY OVER EASTLAND TEAM

The Cisco Lobo "B" football team scored six touchdowns and a safety Saturday night to down a big Eastland "B" team 39-0 on the Eastland field. It was the most impressive win of the season for the Cisco team.

Harold (Little Cotton) Pippen started the scoring spree early in the first quarter when he skirted the Eastland right end for 20 yards and the score. He took a handoff from Tommy Reynolds and threaded his way for the score. Reynolds failed to kick for the extra point. The touchdown was set up when End Bill Miller recovered an Eastland fumble on the 20.

Kent Davis scored the second touchdown late in the first quarter on a 65 yard sprint over tackle. Davis used his blockers well and outran the defenders after he passed the secondary. Reynolds punt conversion failed. End Bill Miller caught a pass from the arm of Tommy Reynolds from the 30 yard line to score the third touchdown. Miller faded out and took the ball on the 20. He was in the clear and ran the distance without trouble. Reynolds again failed to convert.

Davis scored the final touchdown in the first half when he plunged over the Eastland goal from the seven yard line. The score was set up when the Loboes took an Eastland punt on their own 40. Reynolds carried to the Eastland 40, and Pippen picked up 23 yards to the Eastland 17. Poyner carried to the seven and Davis scored. Bob Bennie failed to convert.

The safety came in the first half when the Cisco line broke through to block an Eastland punt behind the goal.

The Loboes wasted little time scoring as the second half opened. Cisco kicked off to the Eastland 20 and Jones returned to the 35. The Mavericks lost 15 yards on two running plays and attempted to pass on third down. Edward Bernie intercepted the Eastland throw on the 22 and carried over for the score. Bennie split the uprights for the point after touchdown.

At this point Coaches Jack Everett and Jay Williams sent in a new team composed of smaller boys and substitutes. They held the Eastland team scoreless most of the third and fourth quarters, but the Mavericks were within striking distance of the goal on two occasions. Late in the fourth quarter the starting team went back in with Eastland on the six. A penalty set the Mavericks back to the 11 and at this point Joe Wayne Farrow, guard, intercepted a pass and ran 89 yards for the final score. Farrow stiff armed one tackler and went the

remainder of the distance ahead of beautiful blocking. When he crossed the goal line there was not an Eastland player within 30 yards. Reynolds failed to convert. Davis and Pippen were the offensive standouts. The blocking of the line, particularly on the part of Bernie, was outstanding and the defensive play of Bernie, Hayes, Farrow, Ingram and others was good. Reynolds mixed his plays well to keep the Mavericks guessing. The "B" team plays Thursday night in Comanche and winds up the season with games against DeLeon and Eastland at Chesley Field in November.

## Letters

I am 80 years old today. I have no political ambitions. Our Republic is in great danger. Our manpower is being exhausted. Our financial resources are being depleted. Just as the line was drawn in the Alamo, American patriots in the 69 Counties I have represented in Congress on November 4 must cross a line to save the United States.

Our Administration and United Nations are infiltrated with Communists. Truman protects them, and says: "Joe Stalin is a fine fellow and I like Joe."

Our Constitution provides that only Congress can declare war. General Wedemeyer returned from the Orient in 1947 and in his report, suppressed by Truman, warned that withdrawing our soldiers from Korea would result in Russia's occupation, yet Truman and Acheson denied help and advice to the Chinese forces on Formosa, and permitted military forces trained by Russia to occupy North Korea and since June 1950, unauthorized by Congress, Truman has waged a bloody war in Korea causing 120,000 American casualties, has spent \$40,000,000,000.00, and is requiring 45,000 American boys to be drafted each month as replacements, portending lasting grief in over a million American homes. Truman deliberately fired MacArthur for advocating courageous policies that would end this war in Korea. With a ridiculous truce suspended for over a year, Truman carries on this bloody war, affording the political slogan "We never had it so good." Roosevelt-Garner campaigners in

1932 asserted that Hoover was bankrupting us with a twenty billion national debt and pledged that they would reduce same 25%, yet they have increased it to \$259,000,000,000.00.

Jake Arvey, Democratic Political boss of Chicago, sponsored Stevenson for Governor and supported Stevenson's nomination for President. Democratic Senator Kefauver in his Democratic Crime Committee Report certified:

"Chicago, unfortunately, still remains the stronghold of certain cliques of corrupt policemen and office-holders and of local legislators who openly consort with gangsters."

"It also remains the jungle of criminals who walk in the footsteps of Al Capone."

"There was no doubt in the minds of any of us, after the sort of testimony we heard in Chicago, that organized crime and political corruption go hand in hand, and that in fact there could be no bigtime organized crime without a firm and profitable alliance between those who run the rackets and those in political control."

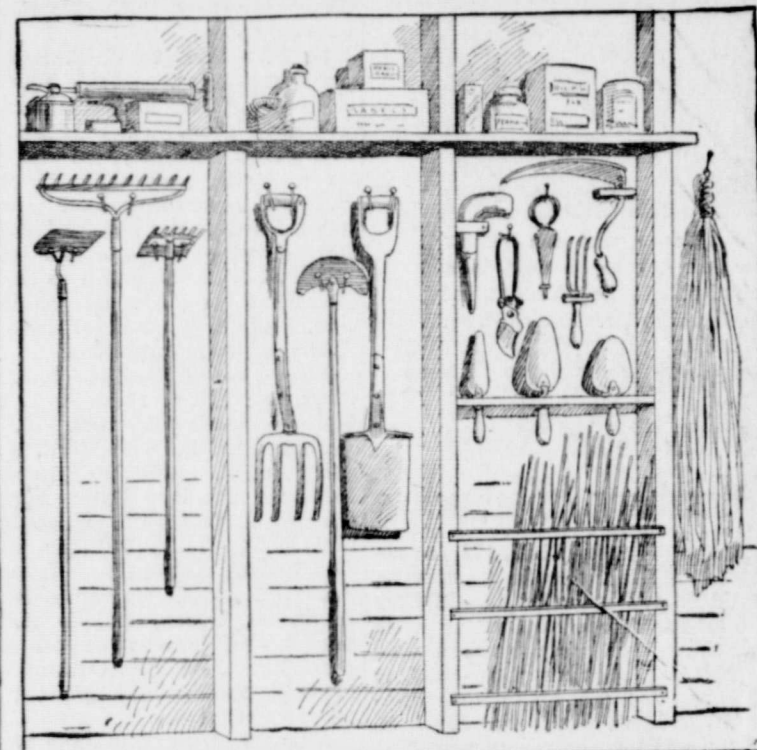

## Save Costly Garden Tools By Checking Winter Rust



KEEP YOUR GARDEN TOOLS IN A HANDY RACK. IT IS ECONOMY.

Garden tools are precious in this inflation era.

Since the greatest deterioration comes when tools are idle, careful cleansing this fall and dry storage over winter are necessary precautions.

The worst enemy of tools is rust. This attacks the metal parts during the winter when the tools are in storage and does more damage than in the summer, when they are in constant use.

To check the rust, first clean all outside metal parts by washing thoroughly. Caked mud should be softened and removed. Then dry, and cover the metal with a thin film of lubricating grease, or oil. All bearings of wheel tools should be oiled. It is possible to obtain new handles, where the old ones have broken, and these should be set in place this fall.

Spraying and dusting equipment should be cleaned thoroughly of all old spray materials. Take the nozzles of sprayers apart and clean. Oil the pumps of sprayers, and set them away without screwing down the tank caps, so that the rubber gaskets are not compressed. Dusters should be cleaned and the outside metal parts oiled, but instead of oil, powdered graphite should be used on the inside.

Make a resolution when your tools have been cleaned, to keep them clean in the future. This will prolong their lives, and make a substantial saving. A rack in which every tool has its place will be found well worthwhile.

## Job Exam Planned By Civil Service

The United States Civil Service Commission today announced examinations for Veterinarian (Trainee) for work with the Bureau of Animal Industry, U. S. Department of Agriculture, at locations throughout the country, and for Student Aid Trainee in the fields of physics, chemistry, mathematics, metallurgy, and engineering, for work in Potomac River Naval Command establishments in Washington, D. C., and vicinity.

The veterinary (trainee) positions pay \$3,410 a year. A 4-year course in veterinary medicine is required; a written test will be given. Students who expect to complete their courses by June 30, 1953, may apply.

The Student Aid Trainee examination is for positions paying \$2,750 to \$3,175 a year, and is open only to persons who have completed one-fourth, one-half, or three-fourth of a college engineering course or who expect to complete such study within nine months of the date of filing application. A written test will be given.

The maximum age limit for both examinations is 35 years. The closing date for acceptance of applications for Veterinarian (Trainee) is November 25, 1952. Applications for Student Aid Trainee will be accepted until further notice.

Further information including instructions on applying, and application forms, may be secured from the Commission's local secretary, Sam King, at the Cisco post office.

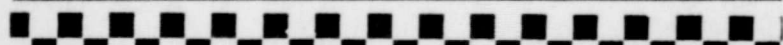

They voted against controlling monopolistic mergers. (The record: 59% of Senate Republicans voted against the anti-merger bill in 1950. This bill plugged up a serious loophole in anti-trust laws, prevented large corporations from making monopolistic mergers by purchasing assets rather than stock of corporations.)

What Did The Republicans Do To Stop Communist Expansion?

They voted against any help to our allies in 1951. (The record: 54% of House Republicans in 1951 voted to block any help—military, economic or technical—to enable our allies and friends to strengthen themselves against the threat of Communism.)

What Did The Republicans Do To Strengthen South Korea?

They voted against military help to Korea in 1949. (The record: 65% of House Republicans voted against sending arms to Korea in 1949.)

What Did The Republicans Do To Make America Strong And Safe?

They voted to cut defense. (The record: 94% of House Republicans voted to limit defense expenditures in 1953 to \$46 billion, to reduce our number of new medium tanks from 3,400 to 300, to slow Air Force and Navy readiness by two years.)

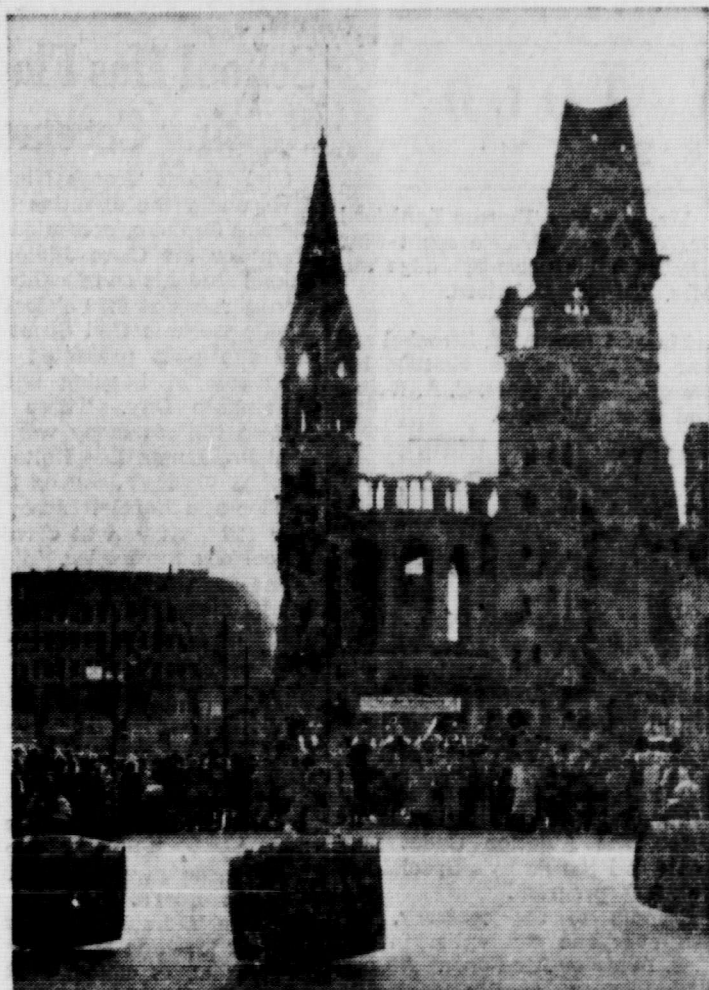
