HEALTH TALKS

To those who believe contact lenses are the "latest cry" in glasses, it may come as a surprise to learn they were first suggested as early as 1827. However, it was not until the

latter part of the nineteenth century that wearable lenses were made by a German optical company. They have been perfected to a large degree in the last thirty years or so.

The first contact lenses were fashioned of glass; modern ones are made of plastic. A contact lens is a curved shell on which is ground the patient's optical prescription. It fits over either the center part of the eyeball, the cornea, or the entire front of the eye, including the sclera,

commonly called the white of the eye. It is necessary to fill the shell of the scleral type with a solution which is similar to the tears of the individual patient. The fitting of contact lenses requires a great deal of skill and patience.

Some medical conditions in which contact lenses are very helpful, if not essential, are a condition in which the cornea has a pronounced bulge (keratoconus); absence of the lens after a cataract operation (aphakia); and extreme nearsighted-

ness, farsightedness, and astigmatism.

If the person's occupation is such that flying glass from broken spectacles might endanger his eyes, contact lenses may be advised. Factory workers in certain jobs and athletes in rough

sports are examples. Another "occupational" indication is for actors or opera singers who would appear out of character in spectacles, yet who need the vision afforded by lenses of some kind. Despite the advantages of contact lenses in some eye diseases

and occupations, physicians usually recommend ordinary spectacles for relative inexpensiveness and ease of wearing. Contact lenses worn solely for cosmetic reasons are not always satisfactory. They can be worn only a limited length of time, ranging

from two to eight hours; the wearer's vision becomes hazy; he sees colored halos around lights. To get rid of these unpleasant symptoms, wearers are advised to remove the lenses so often, say every four or for a half hour.

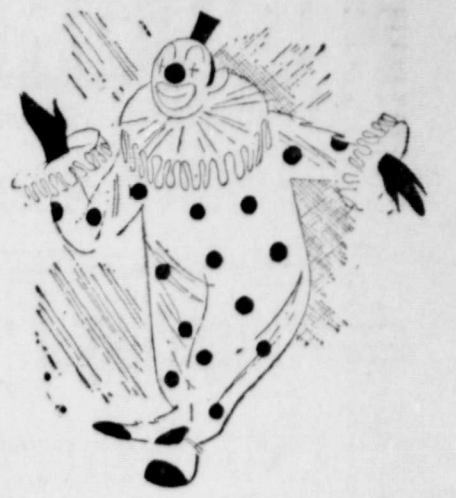

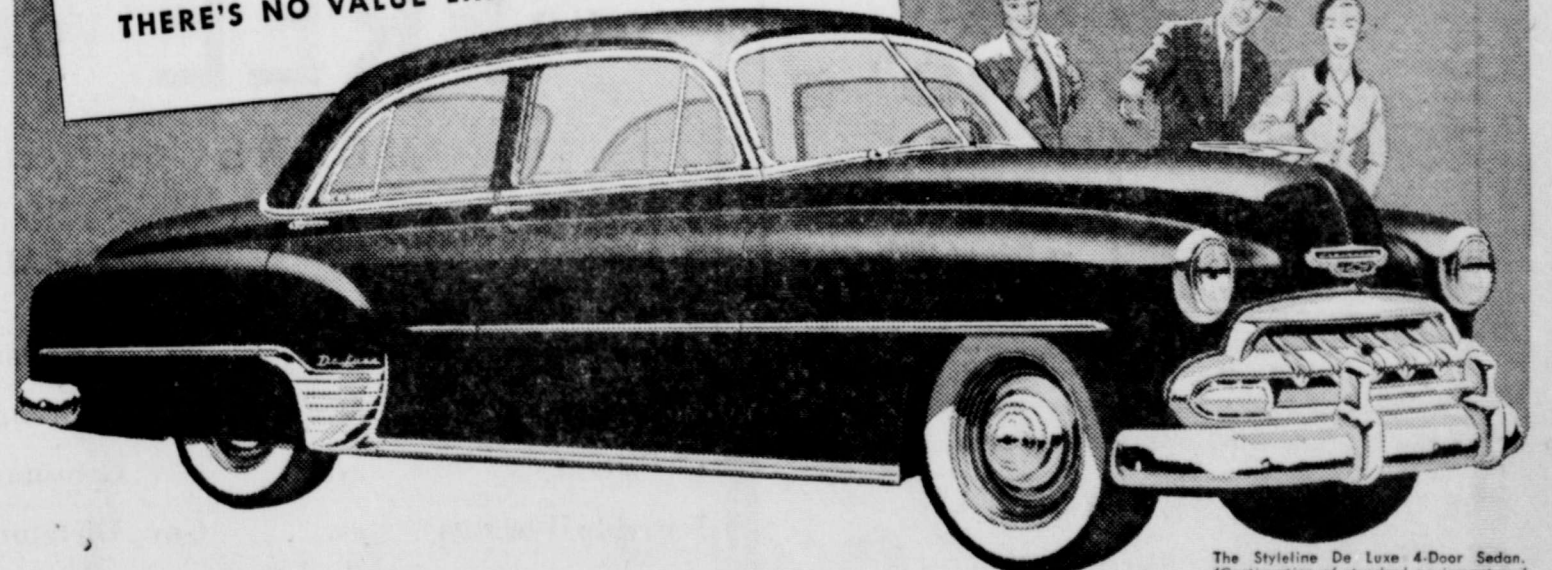

## SERVICE MEN DUE TO RECEIVE RESULTS OF ELECTIONS EARLY

Who won the election? American soldiers — whether in Alaska or Eritrea, Korea or Germany — will get a fast answer to that question this year.

From Ankara to Seoul, from Manila to Heidelberg, from Saigon to Trieste, soldier interest in the national election is at the same fever pitch as civilian interest within the United States. "Is it Adlai or Ike?" That's the question American soldiers around the world are asking.

And they will get the answer just as fast as television viewers, radio listeners, and newspaper readers in the United States.

The Army Signal Corps' vast communications network and Troop Information and Education facilities will carry up-to-the-minute election news to American soldiers throughout the world beginning immediately after the polls close November 4. Not only will this network give them the answer to the number one question, but it also will tell them how the trend goes in each state, and who wins election to the Senate and House.

The three major press associations — Associated Press, United Press and International News Service — have agreed to supply

the Army their election news in order to keep soldiers everywhere informed.

The New York Bureau of European STARS AND STRIPES, one of the Army's two biggest newspapers, will prepare reports and transmit them to Washington. There the Army Signal Corps will relay it to major units throughout the world, and from there they will be transmitted to smaller Army units everywhere.

More than 200 unit newspapers and 72 Army radio stations will work around the clock, getting the news to the soldiers. In addition, many small units without newspapers will publish mimeograph bulletins for distribution.

While the Army's communications system will be used, military messages will take priority over election news.

This represents the first time the Army has attempted such mammoth election coverage. It resulted from a telephone call by Sid Gans, New York Bureau Chief of STARS AND STRIPES, to the Army's Troop Information and Education Division in Washington. Gans said that while STARS AND STRIPES would go all out to get the news to soldiers, he knew many were out of reach of his paper. He asked whether TI&E could lend a hand. It could. So could the Signal Corps. As a result, soldiers everywhere will get the news while it is news.
