
The Bloodmobile Unit's purpose is to obtain whole blood for processing into plasma, which will be shipped to the Korean battlefields to save lives of wounded soldiers.

The human body is the only source of blood plasma used in treating badly wounded persons. The average person's body contains about 12 pints of blood - 12 pints of precious fluid that supplies oxygen, water and food to the body cells.
