THE WAR IS A very serious matter to fellows like Jerry. And if we had oughta do everything better for fellows like Jerry. Things like giving blood when the Red Cross Unit comes around. Had to get a look at Jerry's letter.

Hunters Warned To Be Careful In Big Game Season

AUSTIN, Nov. 4. — The Chief Clerk of the Game and Fish Commission appealed for hunters' cooperation in the grim statistical routine of adding up casualties. "And the best cooperation," he said, "naturally can come in helping keep down the number of hunters shot."

The Chief Clerk made his appeal as preparations were being made for the big game season under the general law which opens November 16. At least five Texas hunters have died from accidents in the field this fall. Four died from gunfire and one drowning while trying to retrieve a duck.

A Hillsboro man, a Porter Springs youth and a Houston youth were killed in handling their own guns. Mistaken for deer, a Livingston man was killed by his own father who is partly blind. The drowning man was from El Paso. He was hunting alone when he vainly tried to retrieve a duck.

The Chief Clerk said the big game season provides even greater hazards than the waterfowl and small game seasons. The reason, he explained, is that deer rifles are more powerful and shoot farther. He listed some pointers covering the more common hunting hazards: Don't pull the trigger until certain of the target. Each year several hunters are mistaken for game and shot. Don't shoot a gun without first ascertaining that the barrel is clear of obstructions. Don't drag a loaded gun muzzle toward yourself in moving it through or under a fence or from a car. He said the Commission will make periodical reports on casualties.

Texas Cattlemen Will Seek Prize

CHICAGO, ILL.—Texas beef cattle breeders will be seeking their fifth grand champion steer award December 2 at the International Livestock Exposition at the Chicago Amphitheatre.

A Texas animal last won the grand champion in 1950 when 19-year-old Lloyd Robinson, Big Spring, showed "Big Spring Special." The 1025-pound Hereford sold for an unprecedented \$12,000 a pound. The previous year, the winner was the Pecos County 4-H Club's Judge Roy Bean, also a hereford.

In addition to the money and honor attendant upon winning the championship, the exhibitor this year, for the first time, will be presented the Lord Elgin trophy, created by a watch company in honor of the Earl of Elgin and Kincardine of Scotland. A Scottish breed of cattle, Aberdeen-Angus, has been the dominant winner over the 50-year-history of the show.

McAnally Speaks At Rotary Meet

Employer-Employee Relationship was the topic of a talk given by Rotarian W. H. McAnally at the regular meeting of the local Rotary Club at the Hotel Victor Thursday. Rotarian McAnally was on the program at the invitation of Bob Elliott, chairman for the day.

Mr. McAnally told Rotarians that a proper relationship between the employer and the employee insured a successful operation of the business and told how the relationship could be improved.

He gave as the five reasons an employee attempted to succeed on a job as a desire for economical security, emotional security, recognition, self expression and self respect, and explained how the employer might help the employee in those five desires.

He stressed incentive as the means of strengthening the relationship and the difference between a good and bad employee. He stressed the importance of explaining fully the requirements and the advantages of jobs when employing a person. He touched on problem cases and told how problem employees might be developed into valuable assets. He told of ways to correct unfavorable attitudes and stressed that as a means of rehabilitating an employee who had not proven satisfactory.

Several hundred fans were in the stands for the two contests.

Fumbles, penalties at crucial spots, and intercepted passes gave the Dogies a 20-0 win over the Midgets. Cisco won the toss and chose to receive. They took the kick on their own 15 and returned it to the 29. Benji Lipsey fumbled on the first series of downs and the Dogies came up with the ball on the Midget 12 yard line. They worked the ball to the two and Leo Smith went over from there. Billy Upchurch carried over for the extra point.

Midway in the second quarter Herbie Gallegos attempted a pass from his own 30 and Smith intercepted it at midfield. He ran the remaining distance to score. Upchurch again carried over for the extra point.

Kent Davis scored first late in the first quarter on a sprint around end from the 16 yard line. The play was set up on a 22 yard run by Davis. A key block by Pippen shook him loose. Reynolds kicked the extra point.

Edward Bernie recovered an Eastland fumble as the second quarter began to set up the second Cisco touchdown. Bernie came up with the ball on the 31. Running plays by Pippen, Davis and Whitehead carried to the one foot line and Reynolds took the ball over on a quarterback sneak. His kick for the extra point was low. The half ended with the score 13-0.

Joe Wayne Farrow kicked off to Eastland to open the second half. The ball sailed over the goal line and an Eastland back attempted to run it out but was stopped short of the playing field for a safety to bring the count to 15-0. Eastland kicked to Cisco from the 20 and the ball was put in play on the Cisco 45. Three plays later the Loboes had advanced to the Eastland 40 and Buck Whitehead slipped through the Eastland line and went the distance to score. Reynolds' kick was good to bring the count to 22-0.

Pippen scored the final Cisco touchdown late in the fourth quarter when he carried over from the four yard line. Bob Bernie kicked for the extra point to bring the count to 29-0. Kent Davis scored two other touchdowns on 24 and 15 yard runs but

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Cisco Machine Is Crippled For Tilt

Coaches Jack Everett and Jay Williams put their crippled Cisco Loboes through a stiff defensive drill Thursday in final preparation for their conference game to be played at Chesley Field Friday (tonight) at 8 p. m. against the strong Indians from Comanche.

The coaches were attempting to set up a defense against the potent running attack of the Indians, who use several offensive formations.

With the loss of Daniel Gray, all district tackle, for the remainder of the season the coaches were forced to revamp their line-up for the game tonight. Others who are injured seriously enough to be on the doubtful list are Bob Black, seat back, and Sonny McCrea, offensive guard.

Bobby Qualls will be the starting center and will play on both offense and defense. Jim Reynolds will play at one guard post both on offense and defense. His injured knee was not expected to give him much trouble during the game. The other guard post will be filled by Mack McCauley on offense and Fred Hayes or Max Poyner on defense. Sherwood Gaines and Arzell Hale will probably play at offensive tackle posts and Bill Miller and Bennie Edwards will be used on defense. Bill Smith and Jim Webb will play the offensive end posts. Irv Brunkenhoefer will be shifted to end on defensive plays.

The Bloodmobile Unit's purpose is to obtain whole blood for processing into plasma, which will be shipped to the Korean battlefields to save lives of wounded soldiers.

The human body is the only source of blood plasma used in treating badly wounded persons. The average person's body contains about 12 pints of blood — 12 pints of precious fluid that supplies oxygen, water and food to the body cells.

Statewide Water Group Receives Strong Backing

Governor Shivers' Texas State-wide Water Conservation Committee got strong assistance today when the Texas Section of the American Society of Civil Engineers submitted to the Governor and to the Chairman of the Committee, J. B. Thomas of Fort Worth, a 13 point water policy program.

In the group submitting the recommendations were Mason G. Lockwood, Houston, current president of the Texas Section of the American Society of Civil Engineers; Carr Forrest, Dallas, immediate past president; Lowber D. Snow, Houston, past president; S. W. Freese, Fort Worth, chairman of the Section's water policy committee; Beeman Fisher, Fort Worth; James A. Cotton, Dallas; Robert A. Thompson, Jr., San Antonio; Marvin Nichols, Fort Worth, and Harry Roberts, Lubbock.

The recommendations were for either a complete new water code or amendments to make the present code effective; fair trial for local option solution of underground water problems; more funds and authority for the State Board of Water Engineers commensurate with its expanding duties; a basic state ownership policy with respect to the activities of federal agencies; amendment of the National Reclamation Act before the U. S. Bureau of Reclamation can contribute materially to the Texas water problem solution; co-operation of the state with U. S. Corps of Engineers in development of economically justifiable flood control and navigation projects; support of Department of Agriculture Soil conservation and runoff retardation measures and approval of reservoirs of that department; continuation of state's program with U. S. Geological survey of stream gauging and finally a program of financial participation by the state founded on the principle that full responsibility rest with the subdivisions assisted.

Governor Shivers commented that "help of organizations like the Texas Section of the American Society of Civil Engineers will be most beneficial in carrying out the overall plans of our Statewide Water Conservation Committee's program for the next Legislature."

"Education is needed to get our program over so that the Legislature will have a clear picture of our number one economic program."
