

Farming Activity Increases After Recent Rainfall

Farming activities increased sharply during the past few days in northern, eastern and coastal counties of Texas where rains a week ago replenished surface moisture. In those favored areas dry-planted small grains, winter cover and pasture crops were sprouting. Seed bed preparation and planting of additional acreage of winter growing crops was being rushed as moisture in that area was adequate for germination and early growth.

Good progress was made in all fall-crop and winter commercial vegetable areas. Rains of the previous week interrupted harvest of tomatoes and other tender vegetables at Laredo and the Winter Garden but stimulated interest in planting in the non-irrigated sections.







IT'S THE LAW * in Texas *

To many people, the call for plans for that hunting trip are omplete, an inventory or other ousiness problem is demanding special attention, or the best Jersey comes down with a serous ailment, a jury summons

s sure to arrive. In spite of the regularity with which unhappy coincidences oceur to some individuals, no gremin is watching to see when you can least afford to be away from nome and business. Being chosen for jury service at any particuar time is largely a matter of

Under Texas laws jury panels or District Courts are selected y one of two methods - the Jury Wheel or the Jury Commission. The jury wheel is a holow metal wheel or container, o erected that it will freely reolve on its axle.

In counties using a jury wheel, list of all qualified jurors is repared from the official tax sts in August of each year. Taking part in the ceremony are the County Tax Assessor, the District Clerk, the County Sherfff. and the County Clerk. Each prospective juror's name is written on a card of uniform size and placed in the metal container.

Then the wheel is locked with wo separate locks, the key to ne lock being kept by the Disrict Clerk and the other key being kept by the Sheriff. As jurors to mix the names and the required number drawn for preparation of jury lists.

Three persons must be present when the wheel is unlocked and he names drawn therefrom he Sheriff (or one of his depuies), the District Clerk (or one of his deputies), and the District udge. Upon completion of cur ently required jury lists, all names are returned to the container, which is again double

Later, when the time comes around to prepare a new set of lists, some of the same names will very likely be drawn again. Others may never be drawn.

In counties not operating under the jury wheel system, the District Judge at each term of his court appoints from three to five persons from different sections of the county to act as Jury Commissioners.

Using the county tax assessment roll, these men follow the for various weeks of the court term. The lists of names prepared by them are sealed in separate envelopes and delivered to the Judge. He, in turn, turns them over to the District Clerk or one of his dupties in open court, who immediately files the envelopes away in a safe place in the Clerk's office.

Although ordinary inconveniences are not usually sufficient to gain an excuse from jury service, emergency or hardship is a different matter. If you face such extreme circumstances in your business or personal affairs that your mind cannot freely reflect and meditate upon the important issues to be tried, call this to the attention of the judge.

Courts try to be reasonable in granting excuses. The judge will consider your situation carefully and thoughtfully, and may determine that your service should



If the hearing is not normal, more accurate tests are indicated to find out what type of defect is present, and in some instances to find out exactly where the hearing trouble lies. The tuning fork, used to tune musical instruments, can help to find out how high and how low the person being tested can hear. It is moved about to different positions on the head and around the ear

Highly accurate testing can be one with the audiometer (a machine to test hearing). The audiometer is about as big as a medum-sized radio and even resembles a radio with its many dials and knobs. Since it was first used about 1920, it has been much improved, and it is now made in models for individual and group

Usually only one or two hearing ests are needed, but sometimes a






