Rates Raised For Big Water Users

A cost of living raise in salaries was approved for city employees Tuesday night at a meeting of the City Commission, Mayor G. C. Rosenthal reported today. The pay raise amounted to about eight per cent for all employees and will become effective as of De-

Mr. Rosenthal estimated that the salary raises would cost the city about \$5,000 per year. This was the first boost in pay that city workers have received in more than two years, Mr. Rosen-

The pay raise was made possible by savings in other items of the new budget, Mr. Rosenthal said. The 1952-53 budget anticipates income of \$228,675 from all sources. Expenditures in the amount of \$227,916 are provided for in the budget.

As a conservation measure, the Commission passed an ordinance raising residential water rates for those who use large amounts of water. The new rate, which becomes effective January 1, 1953 will not effect those who use 7,000 gallons or less

The new rate leaves the minimum charge at \$2 for the first 3,000 gallons and 30 cents per 1,-000 for the next 4,000 gallons. Those who use in excess of 7,000 gallons will pay 60 cents per 1,000 for the next 8,000 gallons and \$1 per 1,000 for all water used in excess of 15,000 gallons.

Persons or corporations selling hunting leases are required by law to obtain a shooting license which costs \$5. More than four thousand of these permits are issued each fall. The preserve record books, sup-

plied by the Commission, provide space for the name and address of the persons hunting, the number of days each spent hunting and the quantity of game each

These records, by law, are require dto be forwarded to the game commission not later than February 10.

Koreans Need CARE Gifts To Survive Hunger, Cold

NEW YORK-The third winter of war means increased suffering for the South Korean people, Paul Comly French, executive director of CARE, reminded Americans in an appeal to continue their relief

About 10,400,000 persons, half the total population, are in dire need of food, warm clothing and blankets, according to reports from Dr. Charles R. Joy, CARE mission chief in Korea, Mr. French said. Relief packages provided through donations to CARE-for-KOREA, 20 Broad St., New York 5, N.Y., or any local office of the non-profit agency, are direct as-surances of these lifesaving sup-

plies, he pointed out.
"Cities like Pusan and Seoul are swollen with refugees, who live in flimsy straw huts," Mr. French stated. "Orphaned chilground, a better understanding streets begging for food. "Starvation and cold must be fought as relentlessly as armed aggression, or the defense of free-dom is meaningless. On behalf of Korea's suffering humanity, we



"Acute otitis media" sounds fearful, and indeed it is to be eared if neglected.

The disease sometimes called ear abscess, is an infection of the niddle ear; "acute" indicates that Eusit is severe and lasts a fairly short time. In the majority of cases the germs that cause the trouble enter through the Eustachian tube, which runs from the throat to the middle ear and which also may be inflamed and

suddenly or follow a feeling of pressure and fullness in the ear. It usually disappears after the which a bloody, pus-like discharge flows into the ear canal. There may be fever, either low or high depending on how se ness with or without ringing in the ears. Other symptoms may be headache, "feeling bad all over," loss of appetite, pain in the back and limbs, vomiting,

The length of the time required for a patient with acute otitis methe poisonousness of germs causing the infection, the patient's re sistance, and the effectiveness of treatment. Even fairly bad cases symptoms lasting longer usually mean that some kind of complication has set in. Complications of otitis media, such as mastoid infection, meningitis, and brain abscess, have been reduced to a very low number by use of the many new medicines available; however, they still are seen occasionally. While the patient is receiving drugs to fight the infection in the middle ear, he also must receive general treatment, such as rest in bed while the fever lasts and drugs to relieve

pain if necessary Another kind of infection of the middle ear is called "chronic catarrhal otitis media." It is not as severe as the acute kind, but ************* it hangs on longer (possibly for years without serious symptoms) and usually involves both ears. Deafness may be present, but not very often does it become complete. There may be a feeling of fullnss, ringing in the ears, and
