Former Ciscoan Dies In Mishap; **Rites To Be Here**

A former Ciscoan, her husband and two small daughters were killed about 1 p. m. Thursday in an automobile accident 13 miles west of Odessa

Dead were Mrs. Wanda Harwell, 22; her husband, Muryl Harwell, 26; their daughters, Gloria, 4 and Glenda, 3.

Mrs. Harwell, the former Wanda Murry, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Oscar Murry of Odessa, former Cisco residents, attended grade and high school in Cisco before moving to Odessa with her parents some 10 years ago. She was married there to Muryl Harwell six years ago. She is niece of Mrs. W. A. Thames of Cisco.

According to investigating officers the accident occurred when the car Harwell was driving went out of control on a curve and skidded sideways on slick pavement. A car driven by Wilmer Graves of Hayward, Calif., rounding the curve in the opposite direction, crashed into the front of the Harwell car.
