

The Director of Wildlife Restoration for the Game and Fish Commission said his staff will be occupied for the next two months analyzing field reports based on the annual fall shoot and getting plans for 1953 into operation.

He said the data accumulated from various sources may reach record proportions judging by information received to date. The Director cited the roundup of the big game hunt in Freestone County which was opened for a short season following the restocking program begun several years ago


"We already have obtained a pretty good picture of the restocking operation in that county," he said, "This is to the credit of landowners and sportsmen who cooperated with our men in the field.

"We use such material as a yardstick to determine future work. We base both our short range programs and long range objectives on such harvest surveys. Therefore, it is indispensable in any modern restoration undertaking."

The Director said reports on the deer season were particularly gratifying. "This is mainly because observations indicate that the deer herds continue to spread over wider areas. This progress is desirable for many obvious reasons. But one important benefit is that the herds, thus dispersed, are less susceptible to unpredictable local population slumps.


