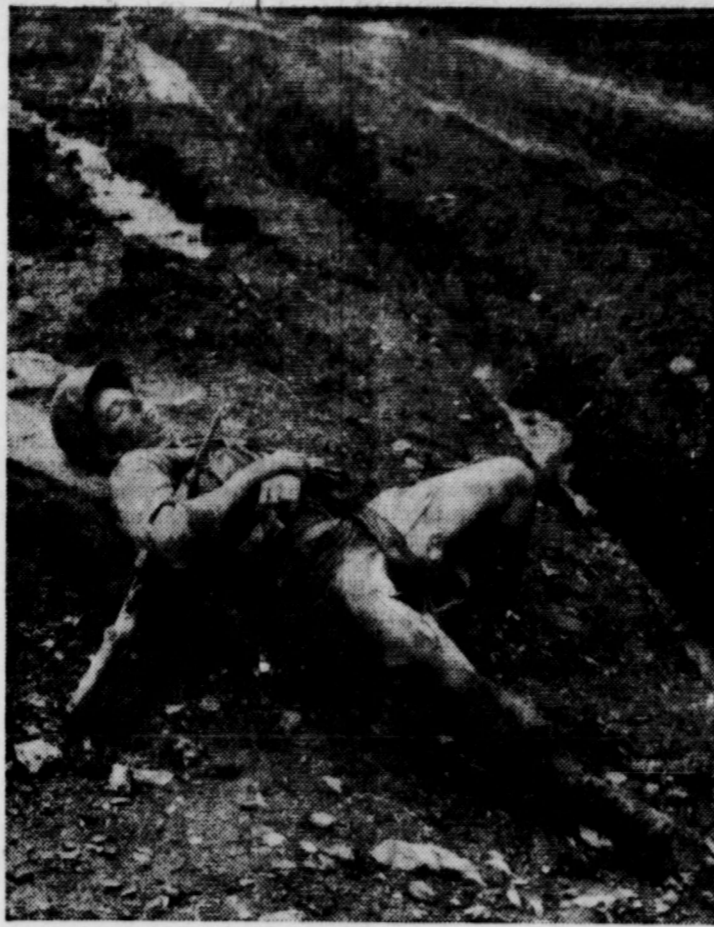

HEALTH TALKS

Grandma's warning that little Johnny was coming down with something because his tongue was coated or his face was flushed showed good common sense. Good common sense is still valuable to today's home nurse, helping her to tell how a sick person's looks and behavior differ from normal. Signposts that all is not well with the patient are called "symptoms." They may be subjective, that is, known only to the patient, or objective, that is, noticeable to the observer as well. In small children who can't talk, the mother has to learn to recognize the location of pain by the child's behavior. Examples of subjective symptoms are pain, headache, feeling sick at the stomach (nausea), or feeling bad in general

(malaise). Objective symptoms include such things as fever, bleeding, skin rashes, and swelling.

The doctor is trained to observe symptoms and makes careful use of his observations in the diagnosis and treatment. Nevertheless, the time he can spend with each patient is limited. Further, the patient may not tell complaints because he forgets about them during the doctor's visit or because he thinks they might be considered unimportant. However, he is likely to confide in members of his family, especially to the person caring for him. How well the home nurse reports these complaints and other signs as well may decide her usefulness to the doctor. In reporting symptoms, as in taking the doctor's orders and reporting treatments she carries out, she may find it helpful to jot down a few notes. Such a record need not be elaborate or long; in fact, the shorter and more to the point it is, the better for the doctor.

The home nurse should be able

to report the character of the patient's illness; his complaint; any symptoms or signs noted such as pain; the temperature, pulse, and respiration; the color and nature of any bodily discharges; how the patient behaves and how he says he feels; how long an undesirable condition such as a rash or swelling has been noted; and any first aid given to relieve the patient.
