Cisco forwards Jim Birch and Mickie Burnett began finding the goal early and kept hitting with accuracy to give the Wranglerettes 21 points in the first two stanzas. Mary Nell Clardy and Wylene Bint added five points, while the hard working Cisco guards were holding the visitors to two field goals. The half ended 26-9. The score at the end of the first quarter stood at 16-2.

The work of the guards, Hallie Johnson, Carmalita Dickerson and Barbara Illingworth, was outstanding. They kept the visiting forwards away from the basket, forcing them to take long shots that would not fail.

Jim Birch led in scoring when she made nine field goals and eight free throws for 26 points. She missed one free throw out of nine attempts. Mickie Burnett took second honors with five field goals and three free throws for 13 points. Wylene Bint was in third place with nine points. Dempsey was high point for the visitors with 16.

Perry Triplett Called By Death Early Wednesday

Perry Triplett, 58, tool pusher and production superintendent of the Choate Drilling Company of Cisco, died suddenly at 2:45 a. m. Wednesday of a heart attack at his home at 1212 West 9th Street.

Funeral services will be held at 3 p. m. Thursday at the First Methodist Church. Burial will be in Oakwood Cemetery with the Thomas Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Mr. Triplett had lived in the Cisco area most of his life. However, he had followed the oil business over a wide area of the state. He lived in Cisco for the past five years, coming here from Odessa.

He was born in Waco on July 15, 1894. Survivors are his wife of Cisco; two sons, Cecil Perry Triplett of Odessa and Dwight L. Triplett of Hobbs, New Mexico; a sister, Mrs. W. R. James of Odessa, and two grand children.

DRAFT LAWS AND REGULATIONS

(Editor's note: This is one of a series of 10 short articles on the draft law and its rules and regulations.)

Young men of draft age who ask for and get deferments under certain conditions automatically extend the time during which they can be drafted by nine years.

Brig. Gen. Paul L. Wakefield, state draft director, names the following types of deferred men, among others, who have their liability for service extended until age 35:

- Members of the ROTC and other officer training programs.
 - Students deferred to go to high school or college under requirements of law; college students deferred under authority of the local board.
 - Men left at home for civilian employment.
 - Men deferred to farm.
 - Married men deferred because of their children or because of extreme hardship and privation to dependents.
 - Men classified as mentally, physically, or morally deficient or defective.
- "The regulations spell this out," General Wakefield says. "So when a man gets the privilege of a deferment he is taking on a corresponding responsibility."

Anderson Attends Planning Meeting

A. D. Anderson of A-G Motor Company has just returned from Dallas where he took part in a meeting of the Chevrolet Dealer Planning Committee.

Mr. Anderson was elected to the position by fellow dealers under a nationwide program by which Chevrolet keeps in close touch with retail selling problems. In his position he acted as spokesman for other Chevrolet retailers in presenting developments in this area.

The Chevrolet dealer committee system was pioneered in 1937 and has since been widely imitated in the automotive and other merchandising fields. Meetings are first held with zone committees who pick representatives for subsequent regional meetings. Regional committees then name 16 dealers to meet with Chevrolet officials in Detroit as the National Dealer Planning Committee.

The Kendrick Quartet is well known over the state, having appeared on many programs and on the radio. They have made many personal appearances on church programs and benefits. They are beginning their second year as radio entertainers. One of the features of the quartet is Shorty and his Hiwaian steel guitar.

R. N. CLUCK NAMED PRESIDENT OF JUNIOR COLLEGE AT RANGER

R. N. Cluck, veteran educator who headed the Cisco Public Schools for 16 years and former president of Cisco Junior College, has been named president of Ranger Junior College, it was announced Tuesday morning by A. E. Crawley, chairman of the board of regents of the college.

Cluck succeeds Dr. Grover C. Boswell, head of the local college for 12 years, who resigned the first of the year to accept a public relations position with the Texas Land Office in Austin.

Cluck was named to the presidency of the 27-year-old college during a closed session of the board of regents Saturday afternoon. Crawley said. Other members of the board include A. W. Warford, vice chairman, Joe Nuessle, secretary, Lloyd Bruce, Morris Newnam, F. P. Brasher Jr., H. C. Henderson and Carl Page.

A native of McGregor, Cluck holds a bachelor of arts degree from Baylor University, Waco, a master's degree from Hardin-Simmons University, Abilene, and has done graduate work at the University of Boulder, Boulder, Colo., and the University of Texas, Austin.

Cluck had been in temporary retirement from his profession since 1947 recuperating from serious injuries received in an automobile accident.

He began his career as an educator as superintendent of the Hubbard City schools in Hill County, served for three years as head of Spur Public Schools, was a member of the faculty of the school of the State Reformatory, Gatesville, for one year. He became superintendent of the Cisco Public Schools in 1932 and held that post until 1947 when he was named superintendent of the Del Rio Public Schools. In 1942 he was named president of Cisco Junior College which he helped establish.

The new president of Ranger Junior College is a former president of the Texas Adult Education Assn., past vice president of the Texas State Teachers Assn., past vice president of Texas Assn. of Junior Colleges, one of the founders and first president of the Oil Belt Teachers Assn., former director of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce and past president of the Cisco Rotary Club.

Cluck's wife is a member of the faculty of the Putnam Public Schools. They have three children. Their oldest daughter, Miss Mona Lee Cluck, is a junior at Southern Methodist University, Dallas. Another daughter, Nancy, is a senior student at Cisco High School, and their son, Bobby, 14, attends Cisco Junior High School.

Mrs. Cluck is the former Miss Mona Mullino, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. G. F. Mullino of Haskell. Mr. Cluck is a member of the First Baptist Church of Cisco, and his wife and two daughters and son are members of the First Methodist Church in that city.

Mr. Cluck is a Shriner and is a member of the Cisco Masonic Lodge, A.F. & A. M. 446, also the chapter and council.

He was born at Osage in Coryell County and is the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. S. N. Cluck, prominent farming couple of that community. He graduated from high school at McGregor.

His eldest daughter, Mona Lee, a music major at SMU, was valedictorian of the 1950 graduating class of Cisco High School. She plays the violin as does her sister.

Bob Powelson Given Fort Hood Assignment

Private Bob Powelson of Carrizo, New Mexico, has arrived at North Fort Hood, Texas, where he will be assigned to the famed first armored division for basic training, according to information here today.

Powelson is the son of Mr. and Mrs. H. A. Powelson. He attended Cisco Junior College for the past two years and was active in all sports at the school.

During his years with the Cisco schools, the accomplishments were many. At one time during the 1930s, students of 17 common school districts attended classes in Cisco under contracts. Fourteen buses were used to transport the students.

During the depression, the school district suffered a great loss in property valuations, necessitating changes in the bonded indebtedness program. Mr. Cluck and G. R. (Pete) Nance, president of the school board at the time, worked out a program that enabled the schools to reorganize its financing under legislative approval.

During the same years, an adult school was opened in Cisco and 75 people were given employment in teaching adults the fundamentals of English, writing, arithmetic and other elementary subjects. The Cisco schools were the first to offer a course in diversified occupation, enabling boys and girls to learn a profession by working part-time while attending school. This course is still being offered here.

Mr. Cluck helped put a special act through the Legislature, authorizing the operation of Cisco Junior College and helped work out a tax program for financing the operation.

During the war years, he helped obtain an ordinance school in Cisco to train women to be mechanics, electricians and so forth to replace men in ordinance plants. At one time, the school had an enrollment of over 300 women.

Working with Reg Robbins, the college obtained a government civilian pilot training school and was instrumental in teaching more than 100 young men to fly.

After the war, Mr. Cluck helped in obtaining 26 housing units for veterans at the college and a classroom building and a big shop for vocational training work. Considerable equipment was obtained to equip these buildings.

FFA Boys Review Accomplishments In Past Months

During the past week, which was designated as National FFA Week, the local FFA chapter reviewed its accomplishments for the past year and laid plans for the work during the current term of school.

During the year the local chapter made a great amount of progress toward practical farming on their farm located at the north edge of the city limits.

Members of the chapter have cleared some 10 acres of brush land on the farm and have studied practical grazing methods and planting programs.

At the present time they have some 13 acres planted in oats, vetch and alfalfa. The chapter and members of the chapter have 10 head of hogs that are running on the farm. A local cattleman has seven head of cattle he is also running on the farm.

In addition to the hogs, members of the chapter have 10 head of sheep they are caring for on an associate member's farm.

The members are constructing a hog shed at the farm and plan other improvements this year.

Last year they won the Phillips 66 soil improvement award of \$66.66, and were selected for competition for the same award this year. The requirements this year are greater than they were last year, and the competition harder.

Other plans call for fertilizing the land this year as soon as moisture conditions permit. The boys do all the work and gain practical farming experience as the reward for their efforts. James Starr is the instructor and counselor for the chapter.

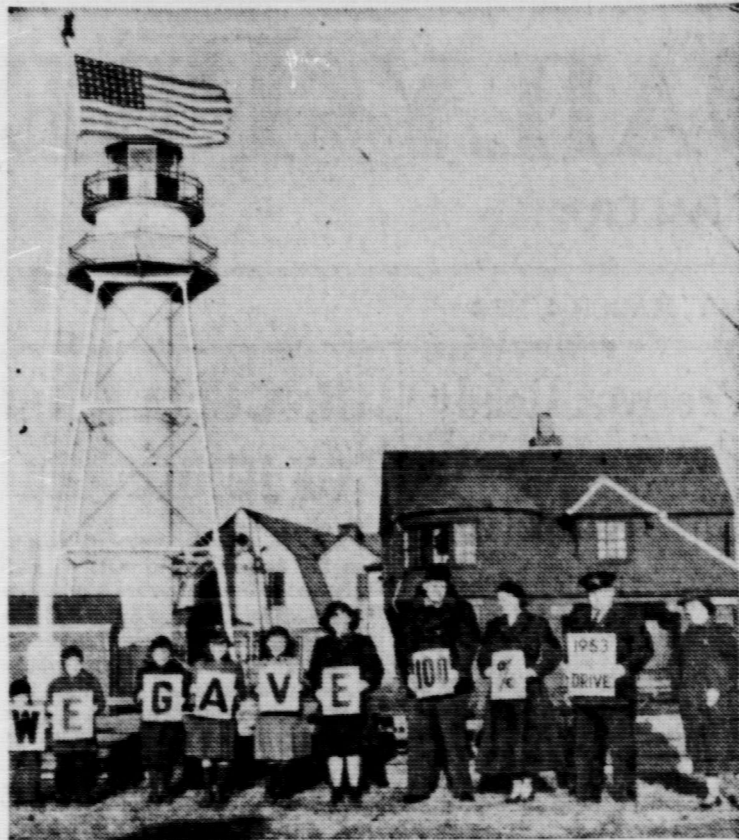

Spading in Humus is Best Way to Condition Soil

Outdoor gardening can begin as soon as the frost is out, and the soil has dried sufficiently to spade it. The test of this is to mould a ball of soil in your hand, then pat it between your palms. If it makes a mud pie, the soil is too wet, but if it crumbles, then it can be worked.



Begin spading by digging a trench, then fill it with soil on adjoining trench, and so on, and on.

If your soil is stiff, hard to work and slow to allow water to drain through it, every time it is spaded something should be added to make it more porous. One of the best materials to add is limestone screenings. These are usually obtainable at quarries for low prices. When finely crushed limestone is added to clay, a chemical reaction takes place, which has the effect of making the soil particles larger and the soil more porous.

Spading loosens the soil, lets air into it, and leaves it in the best condition for both water and air to enter. Good soil, Ohio State experiments showed, is composed of 25 per cent "pores" containing air, 25 per cent "pores" containing water, and 50 per cent solid matter.

Heavy clay soil has particles so fine that there are not enough "pores" in it. But it can be made good by mixing one inch of manure or a substitute such as compost or peat moss, to four inches of clayey soil. This will give an idea of the quantity of coarse material needed to loosen heavy garden soil. Spread it evenly over the soil, and turn it under as you spade.

Mark out the area to be spaded in a day. Begin by opening a trench at one end, throwing the soil removed in a pile. Then dig an adjoining trench and throw the soil in the first one. Continue this until the day's work is ended, filling the final trench with soil removed from the first.

The original committee hearing on the bill attracted 1,200 service station operators and gasoline wholesalers.

Service station operators contended they were suffering losses because they receive less gasoline than they pay for, since weather changes cause gasoline to alter in volume.

To eliminate duplication of federal and state powers, especially in the field of taxation, will be the aim of a commission who members will be appointed by President Eisenhower, Congress, and the National Governors' Conference.

Senator Bell predicted that if the amendment passes, local communities will build \$250 million worth of dams for water storage, flood control, and irrigation as soon as the money is available.
