





Many head-on collisions have resulted from a "fear complex" of these high banisters.

> Greer concluded that the solution to these obsolete narrow bridges with high railings would be to widen all such structures. However, due to limited funds, this is impossible since the Department is only financially able to provide a remedy and not a cure for these deficient bridges

"If House Bill 388 is passed by the State Legislature, the farmer will lose a fourth of his refund on gasoline for non-highway A. Z. Myrick, president of the Eastland County Farm Bureau, said recently.

"What the proponents of this bill have not considered," Mr Myrick said, "is that the refund does not actually belong to the It is a tax collected, just as on all gasoline, and sent to the state tax office and then returned to the tractor farmer."

Mr. Myrick went on to say that the backers of the bill were calling attention to the public school needs, as a clever startegy, by suggesting the bill as a good source of revenue for aiding the schools.


"Farmers pay their share of school taxes," he said, "and this will be an additional burden that is unfair. If one fourth of the refund is lost now, the entire refund may be taken away later.

"Now is the time for farmers and ranchers to wake up and fight as never before for the defeat of this measure which will work a hardship on the tractor
