THE DALLAS NEWS printed an article the other day about Joseph A. Slicker of Cisco as follows: A former petroleum engineer who has helped repair numerous oil fields throughout the southwest has arrived in Dallas to embark on a new career as a minister.

He is husky, six-foot Joseph A. Slicker of Cisco, fresh from Austin Presbyterian Theological Seminary at Austin with the Bachelor of Divinity Degree.

The Dallas Presbytery, U. S. District court, has appointed 32-year-old Slicker to help organize a new church of the denomination. The new church will be located at 9999 Ferguson, northeast of the Casa Linda section of White Rock.

As a petroleum engineer, Slicker's job was to figure out how to revive sick oil fields that had just about died down and to promote greater yield from wells in new oil fields.

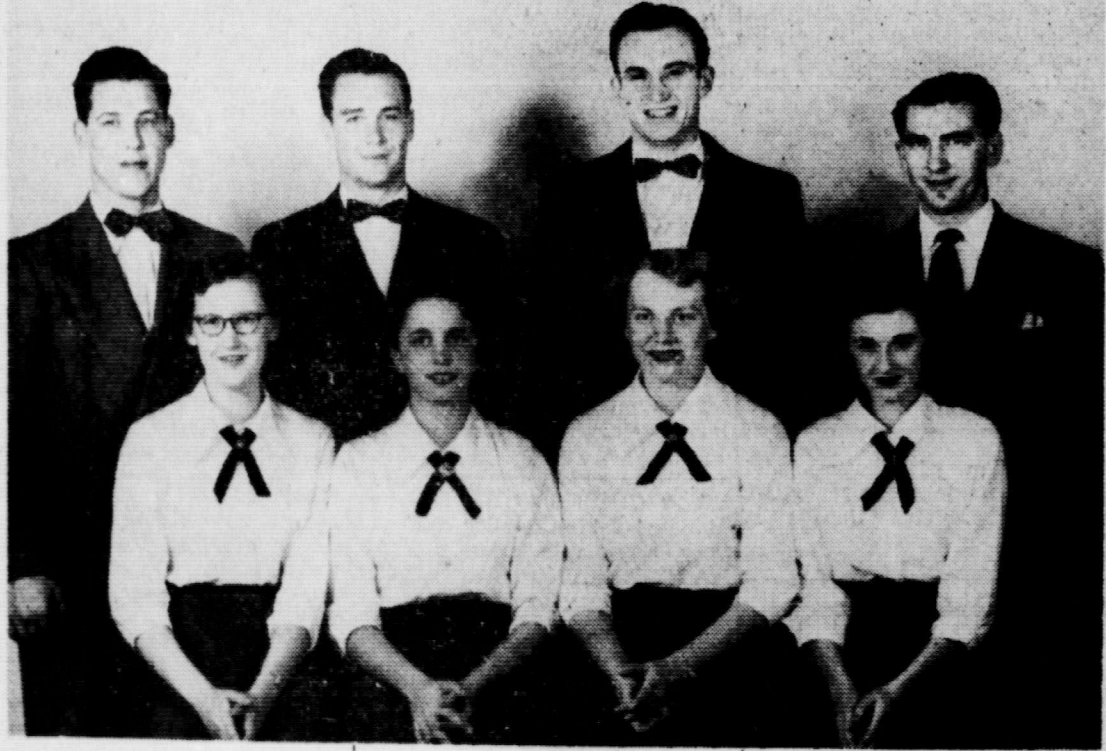
In 1949, Slicker's attention and interest became centered on religion more than ever. At Fort Worth, where he had been with the Stanolind Oil & Gas Company and Mrs. Slicker, the former Miss Anne Cook of Texarkana, Ark., were active in the First Presbyterian Church. In the latter part of that year, he opened offices as a consulting petroleum engineer at Cisco.

Slicker definitely decided to become a minister after attending a lecture by Dr. George Buttrick, New York City, a clergyman, at the Presbyterian Church meeting at Sherman.

"I remember that Dr. Buttrick told me it was harder to repair a broken heart than an elevator. It seemed to me that I had spent all my life repairing sick oil fields and that now I should be repairing broken hearts."

"The Lord used that to put the squeeze on me." Slicker enrolled in the seminary in 1950. In 1942, he had been graduated from Texas A&M with a Bachelor of Science degrees in petroleum and mechanical engineering. Then he went into the Army as a second lieutenant and came out in 1945 as a major. He took part in the Iwo Jima invasion and many other Pacific battles during the war.

### Patrolmen Lose Race But Win At Cisco Road Block

BRECKENRIDGE. — Another race has been staged and lost by local traffic officers to be won at a road blockade.

Highway Patrolman Kenneth Decker Saturday morning told of a race he and Patrolman B. J. Devenport staged with a speeder Friday. They chased him for over twenty miles, but could not catch him.

"It was the fourth race we have staged in the past week. All the others lost to us, and we would not have lost this one if our Ford had been in its usual good running order, Decker said. This time the race was a Ford vs. a Pontiac.

"We turned around just north of Brewer's Place," Decker related, "and took after the Pontiac going south. When we were about fifteen miles out of Cisco we communicated with Cisco City Police and asked them to set up a road block.

"Our car has a receiver given us by Stephens county and we could talk with the Cisco police and keep them informed where we were.

"It was the longest, hardest chase we have ever had. At the road block the man was forced to stop and we took him into custody and charged him with speeding and operating without a driver's license." Decker refused to divulge the name of the man.

This represented two long races to run down fleeing car drivers in two days, Police Chief Ollie Jackson engaging in one Thursday. The Stamford man taken in by Jackson was reported out on \$200 bond returnable to City court on March 18.

Decker said the man they arrested said he was running because he thought it was just someone playing with him. — Breckenridge American.

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Let's Get Back To Being Ourselves

Author Eric Manners has a friend — his family doctor — who regularly eats ice cream on his breakfast cereal. This is no affection, Mr. Manners insists. The doctor doesn't talk about it, doesn't play it up as an interesting eccentricity — just eats ice cream for breakfast because he like it.

Manners sees in this ice cream-for-breakfast thing a lesson for our times, a lesson in defying conformist social codes and in being ourselves; and he champions this cause stoutly in an April Reader's Digest article condensed from the American Mercury. Whether or not you prefer fried eggs to ice cream as breakfast fare doesn't matter. But if you think it "affected" or somehow "wrong" to eat ice cream for breakfast, just because no one else does, you're in danger of being persuaded into a docile conformity that is

You don't 'form character' or 'get ahead' or even 'become more attractive to others' by following a set of instructions. You do it by being yourself. All you can learn by listening to rules and sedulously conforming to them is the hideous art of how to be nobody at all." Against the threat of being thought for and regulated there is only one weapon. "The weapon is the Self — the unique and incalculable reality that is a human soul."

Vets Questions And Answers

Q — In applying for Korean GI training, must I submit the original of my separation paper (DD Form 214) along with my application form, or will a carbon copy be satisfactory?

A — You may submit an official carbon copy of your DD Form 214 as evidence of your active service. It is not necessary to submit the original.

Q — The Army made a determination that my disability occurred in line of duty. Is VA bound to accept that determination, in ruling on my eligibility for service-connected compensation?

A — The line-of-duty determination is not binding on the VA. However, VA will accept the Army's findings in ruling on whether your disability is service-connected — unless certain considerations would warrant a different finding.

Q — I am the widow of a World War I veteran who died as a result of a service-connected disability. Must I prove dependency in order to be eligible for death compensation payments?

A — No. Dependency is not a factor in determining your eligibility for death compensation. Q — Since I have been totally and permanently disabled for six months, I have applied to VA for waiver of my National Service Life Insurance premiums. How long must I continue to pay my premiums, now that I have filed?

A — Premiums should be paid until you are notified that the waiver has been approved. Any premiums you have paid beyond the required premium-paying period will be refunded to you. Q — My NSLI term policy has lapsed for two months. But it hasn't yet come to the end of its term. How can I go about reinstating it?

A — You may reinstate it by submitting a written application, accompanied by two monthly premiums provided you are in as good health as you were when the premium lapsed. Application forms may be obtained at any VA office.

Highway Bridges Get Overhauling

AUSTIN, March 14. — Have you noticed the face lifting being performed lately on some of the old-style concrete bridges? If not, you are probably one of the more fortunate motorists who have not had to travel over obsolete narrow concrete bridges with high massive railings.

D. C. Greer, State Highway Engineer, explained that work was being programmed as funds would permit to lower these obsolete concrete railings. The reason for this construction is twofold — safety and economy, Greer added. Trucks with overhanging beds or with protruding loads are continually striking the tops of the high banisters, causing costly damage to both bridges and vehicles. In addition to these physical damages suffered by the Highway Department and truckers alike, oftentimes serious injuries and wrecks are caused as a direct result of these high railings being sideswiped. Greer continued that these tall banisters have a psychological effect, causing drivers to shun the massive railings and in doing so, encroach on the adjoining lane of traffic. Many head-on collisions have resulted from a "fear complex" of these high banisters.

Greer concluded that the solution to these obsolete narrow bridges with high railings would be to widen all such structures. However, due to limited funds, this is impossible since the Department is only financially able to provide a remedy and not a cure for these deficient bridges at this time.

Myrick Against Tractor Gas Tax

"If House Bill 388 is passed by the State Legislature, the farmer will lose a fourth of his refund on gasoline for non-highway use," A. Z. Myrick, president of the Eastland County Farm Bureau, said recently.

"What the proponents of this bill have not considered," Mr. Myrick said, "is that the refund does not actually belong to the state. It is a tax collected, just as on all gasoline, and sent to the state tax office and then returned to the tractor farmer."

Mr. Myrick went on to say that the backers of the bill were calling attention to the public school needs, as a clever strategy, by suggesting the bill as a good source of revenue for aiding the schools.

"Farmers pay their share of school taxes," he said, "and this will be an additional burden that is unfair. If one fourth of the refund is lost now, the entire refund may be taken away later. Now is the time for farmers and ranchers to wake up and fight as never before for the defeat of this measure which will work a hardship on the tractor user."

He urged all farmers to get in touch with their representatives and tell them their wishes in the refund issue.

HEALTH TALKS

An important aid in making a diagnosis or determining what treatment should be is the use of laboratory studies, including x-ray.

Usually certain laboratory tests are made for each newly admitted patient. These include a complete count of the blood cells, a determination of the total amount of hemoglobin (the oxygen-carrying part of the red blood cells), and a study (including examination with a microscope) of the urine. Such studies, which because they are basic are routinely performed, tell the doctor much about his patient. Then, according to what he feels is needed, the physician may order others.

Thus, some patients may need to have extensive studies made of the blood, urine, or stomach contents, while others will be sent to the x-ray department for pictures of the chest, abdomen, or an arm or leg.

Certain laboratory tests require special preparation of the patient. For example, to determine the level of blood sugar, usually breakfast is withheld until after blood is withdrawn for testing.

In all instances, if it is necessary to take the patient to another part of the hospital, he is moved and returned to his room as quickly as possible.



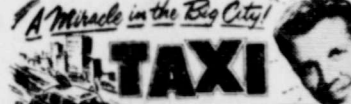

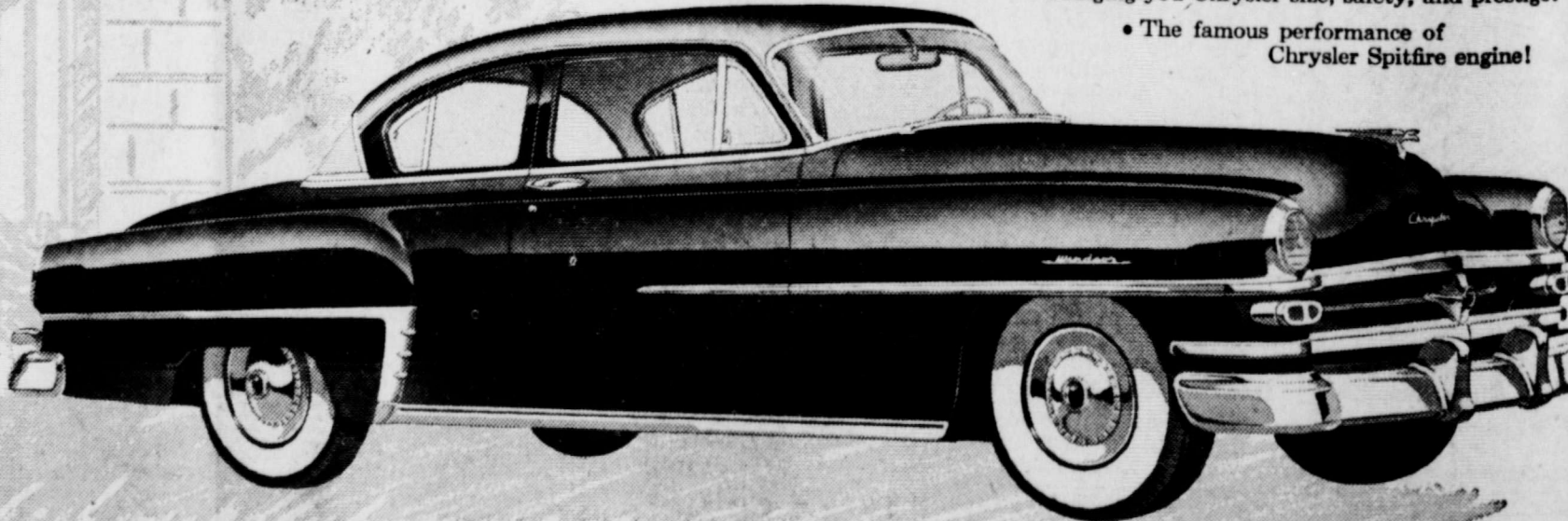
