THE LAST STRONGHOLD of the Texas male is being seriously threatened again. Down in Austin, where the Texas Legislature is in session, the women folks are putting up a merry battle for the honor of becoming eligible for jury duty in our state. The house has passed a bill to permit women folks to serve on juries, and the matter now rests with the Texas Senate.

The bill is officially known as HJR 16. If you would like to put your two cents worth in, you'd better write Senator Wayne Wagonseller pronto. We're mildly opposed to the matter, but it will probably be approved and become a law.

If women folks are approved for jury duty, it will be a costly proposition. The courthouses will have to build suitable quarters for housing women as well as men on extended jury duty.

ANOTHER BILL OF interest to small towns is before the Legislature. HB 43 would give the Texas Highway Department the power to set the speed limits, fix stop lights and generally regulate all traffic in towns of 2,500 or less population. Towns in the 76th District that would be under this law include Albany, Moran, Baird, Rising Star, Cross Plains, Gorman, Carbon, Clyde and Putnam and maybe some others.

EQUIPMENT MOVES IN TO BEGIN WORK

A contract to drill a test water well in the Lake Cisco Park area has been let to E. W. Griffin of Olden and equipment was being moved in today to begin work on the project, Mayor G. C. Rosenthal announced.

The test well, which is scheduled to go to 300 feet, is a joint project of the City of Cisco and the John William Butts Post 123 of the American Legion. Location for the well is at the south end of the park, near the state fish hatchery property.

Mayor Rosenthal said the city commission approved the project because it is anxious to learn about the possibilities of underground water. The American Legion, operators of Lake Cisco Swimming Pool and park properties, is interested in obtaining well water for use in the swimming pool.

"If we find abundant water," Mr. Rosenthal said, "the park area is near enough to the water treating plant that the water could be used for city consumption economically."

Mr. Rosenthal pointed out that "we're not too sure that we will find much underground water, but we feel that the current situation warrants an effort." He noted that the test well would be a comparatively inexpensive proposition.

A recent survey of Lake Cisco, the city's water supply, showed that the lake is at the lowest level in its history and is some four feet lower than it was at this time last year. The survey showed that the city has about ten months' supply of water in the reservoir with conservative usage.

At a meeting last month, the commission authorized the drawing of an emergency ordinance to be enacted May 1 unless rains replenish the water supply. Under the proposed ordinance, a strict rationing program would be inaugurated.

Mr. Rosenthal has urged Ciscoans to conserve water in every way possible.

Cisco students won first in spelling for sixth grade groups, first in spelling for seventh and eighth grade groups, and second in the arithmetic contest.

Fredda Plumlee and Linda Lucas took first in the spelling for sixth graders, and Vonda Lea Yeager and Rose Mary Berry took first in spelling for the seventh and eighth grade group.

The arithmetic team made up of Pat Donohoe and Beverly Ann Killingsworth lost in the finals to Dublin. The Dublin winner took top honors last year.

Saturday the boys and girls baseball teams went to Stephenville for the district baseball play. The boys lost their first game by two runs and the girls lost their first by one run.

The victories in the literary events gave the Cisco school a good lead for the district championship which will be decided at the district track meet in Stephenville on April 11. Record Number Of High Schools To Play Baseball

AUSTIN, April 1. — A record total of 652 high school baseball teams will compete in Texas this spring.

The official list of University Interscholastic League school-boy clubs was released today by Dr. Rhea H. Williams, director of athletics. The three-conference list contained 14 more teams than the former record high year of 1950, and 28 more than the count of last year.

League baseball began in 1947, with 467 teams, rose to 599 in 1948, and to 635 in 1949, when the first state championship was determined. The 638 of 1950 dropped to 629 teams in 1951 and to 624 teams last year.

Conference AA, which is the only conference to play to a state championship in baseball, this year will have 86 teams, a gain of two over last year. Midland, Cleburne, Corsicana, Hillsboro, Greenville and Paris are the newcomers to the conference, but Stephenville, Henderson, Sam Houston (Houston) and Alice are no longer on the list.

In Conference A, 144 teams will compete, a gain of 15 over last year's total of 129. Conference B jumped from 411 to 422, a gain of 11.

District champions must be determined by May 15 for all three conferences. Conference AA bi-district champions must be certified by May 26, with the state championship to be determined in Austin June 3, 4 and 5.

In planning a budget, one of your first questions should be whether you'll be able to meet medical expenses — whether expected or unforeseen.

Part or all of medical care may be furnished for members of the Armed Forces, war veterans, university students, or those in public institutions. Through Workmen's Compensation laws many workers are protected against medical costs resulting from accidents on the job or occupational diseases; in addition, the worker may receive disability benefits after he has been off the job a minimum number of days. Other laws require that victims of accidents in public places and those involved in automobile accidents be protected in some manner. The holder of the insurance policy usually doesn't help his own medical expenses but instead protects himself from liability suits which might follow the accident.

Premiums on life insurance policies may be waived in the event of total and permanent disability, and some policies provide disability payments.

Some of these provisions may

help one's pocketbook to a degree in case of sickness. However, the budgeter should consult his family doctor, his insurance agent, and perhaps his employer to see if a health or hospital policy would be helpful and, if so, to determine what kind of policy would be best for his particular needs.

Health or hospital insurance works on the principle of any other kind of insurance: The policyholder chooses the certainty of a periodic, small loss (the premium) in preference to the uncertainty of a big loss which he might have without insurance protection. The subscriber is relieved, knowing that nonoccupational illness or accident won't cut as deeply into his savings or income.

A person's needs can change. For instance a man being discharged from military service or someone changing jobs may wish to take out health or hospital insurance.

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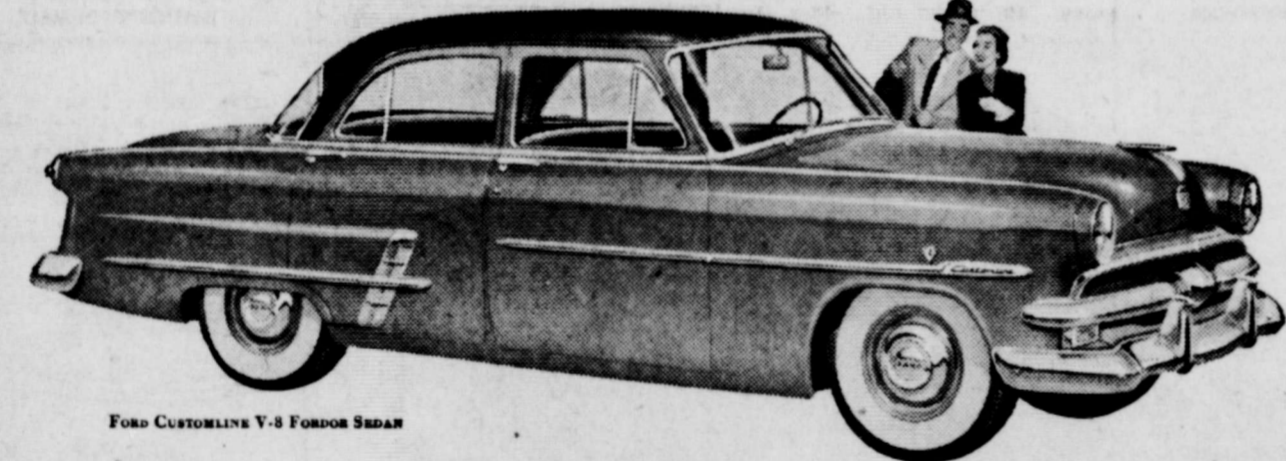
