The Gay Philosopher

WORD FROM Australia indicates that Mr. Robert Kamon of Cisco will leave that country at 7:15 a. m. Friday, April 17, by air liner. The flight schedule calls for stops at Singapore, Malaya; Calcutta, India; Karachi, Pakistan; Beirut, Lebanon; Frankfurt, Germany; London, England, and New York City. Robert is due in England on April 26. Unless he stops for a tour of England, he'll likely arrive in Cisco around May 1.

Robert, who has been in Australia looking for possible oil reserves, has closed a deal with the government there for a concession of some three million acres of land for oil exploration purposes. He reports that his concessions have railroad facilities through them.

With crews of men, Robert has been busy for the past five months finding and mapping the area and studying surface geology. He is satisfied that the country has very good oil possibilities. He reports that conditions there indicate that oil is present similar to that in Wyoming.

His reports home show that only one well has been drilled in the northern half of the eastern coast of Australia, and the 3,950 foot hole had free oil at 2,200, hollow wells in the country have showed gas. Robert has sent a good many rock samples home for study and analysis in the Kamon laboratories here.

When he arrives home, Robert expects to analyze his field notes and samples and decide on plans for the future. We believe he is sold on the outlook for oil in Australia after reading some of his reports home.

THE GREENS Committee of the Cisco Country Club is making arrangements for some water for the golf course, Chairman Norman Huston tells us. Under present conditions, the city has notified the club that unless Lake Cisco catches some water by May 1 the golf course will have to be a victim of the water shortage situation.

Present plans call for running a pipe line from the lake dam to pick up waste water. It would be pumped then to the golf course's pipeline. Meanwhile, the golf course has been using as little water as possible to cooperate in the conservation program.

THE PRESS OFFICE was honored this morning with a visit by a large delegation of Moran School students. They came to Cisco at 9:30 a. m. and spent the morning visiting industrial plants. Then, they boarded the noon train for a ride to Abilene. Their school bus drove over and picked them up to bring them home to Moran late today.

It was the first time many of the youngsters had ever been on a train. It was a fine outing.

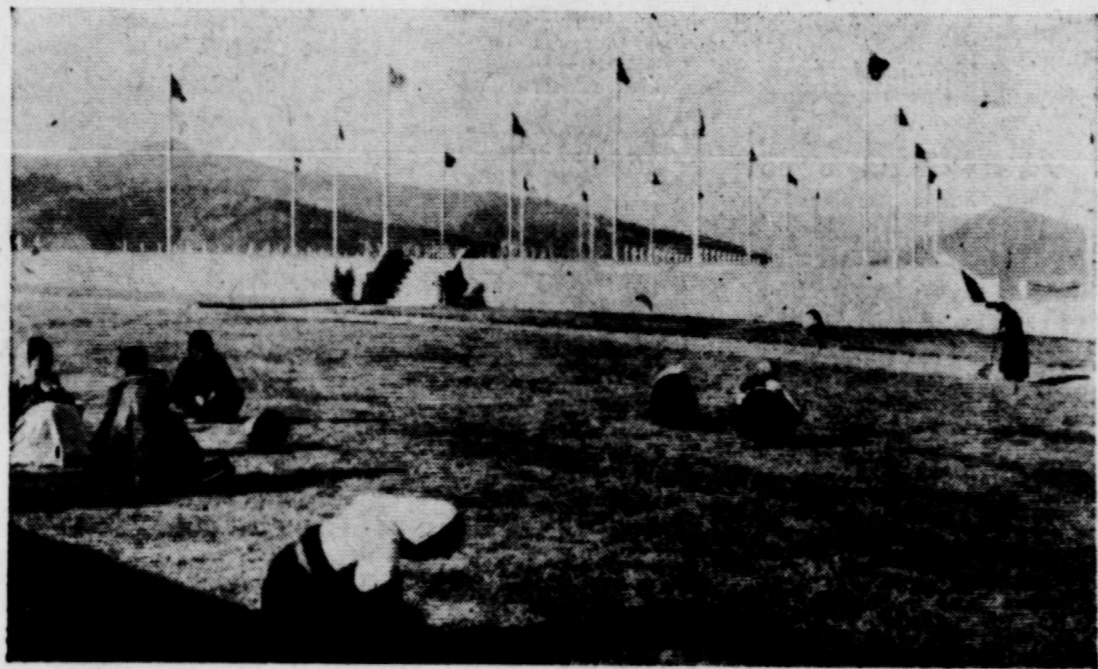

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Neglect Cause Of Most Diphtheria, Dr. Cox Believes

AUSTIN, April 2. — Diphtheria is a disease of neglect, declared Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. If all babies, beginning at three months of age, were taken to a physician or clinic for immunization against diphtheria, the infant deaths from this disease would cease. Such immunizations may be given in conjunction with whooping cough and tetanus vaccine for triple protection.

Diphtheria occurs most frequent in early childhood. It is caused by a germ that grows in the nose and throat and throws out a toxin or poison into the blood stream. This poison may attack the heart muscle or it may cause a paralysis known as peripheral neuritis.

Diphtheria is a dangerous disease for a child to have and it is highly infectious to other children. It starts with a sore throat, fever, and sometimes croup and hoarseness.

Adequate immunization early in life is the main defense against diphtheria. It helps the body build up immunity against the dangerous malady.

About a year after completion of the initial triple immunization against diphtheria, whooping cough, and tetanus a booster injection may be given and another at four to six years of age. Some physicians advise a further injection at nine to ten years of age.

Although the death rate from diphtheria has been markedly reduced in the past twenty years, infants were unsafe without immunization. It is only when all babies are immunized early in life that the conquest of diphtheria will be accomplished.

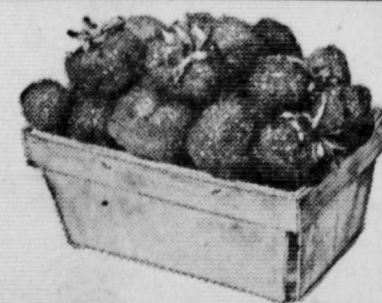

"As It Looks From Here"



The questionnaire which I fearfully submit to the people of my congressional District is now going out. Each year since I have been in Congress, I have sought the opinions of those whom I represent in order that I may reflect as best I can their wishes and desires.

This year I am submitting eleven questions on which the Congress may take action during this Session. Of course, there are many more issues which could be listed, and those who receive them are certainly not limited to these eleven.

The questions submitted are those which can more nearly be answered with a yes or a no, although qualifying comments are requested, if the voter feels it to be required to express his views.

It should be remembered that a Bill, in the complicated process of being considered in the Congress, can be amended in many ways before its final passage. In some cases, a Bill can be changed beyond recognition between its start and its finish. This is the reason why it is many times difficult to say whether you are for or against a measure when it is introduced, but we can express

ourselves on its intents and purposes. There are several reasons for my submitting the questionnaire. First, I like to have the thinking of the people whom I represent. Second, it makes us aware and acquaints us with some of the more prominent problems to be faced by the Congress. Third, it provokes thought in matters of Government, and I hope creates a greater interest on the part of everyone. It is every citizen's responsibility to be interested in the affairs of his Government, and this is one way to give everyone a more direct voice in what is done.

It is my hope that everyone receiving my questionnaire will fill it out and return it to me. As they are received, I will study each one personally and have the results tabulated. The results will be given to this newspaper. Let me assure everyone that your views will be valued and respected in the discharge of my responsibility in the Congress of the United States.

It is impossible to place the questionnaire in the hands of each individual, and I am bound to miss someone. It is not intentional, and for those who do not receive one, I shall ask this newspaper to retain several copies for the use of those who may wish to call for one.

A Reminder for World War II Prisoners of War April 9th is the deadline for filing prisoner of war claims un-

der Public Law 303. Funds for this purpose come from enemy assets in the hands of our Government. All communications should be addressed to War Claims Commission, Washington 25, D. C.

In a discussion of taxes the other day, a United States Senator observed that the subject of taxes was like bringing up the subject of ROPE in the home of a man who had just been hanged. In the same discussion, we were reminded of the old boy who said that if Patrick Henry got so riled up about "taxation without representation," how would he have felt about the taxation we have "with representation."

It is the present plan for Congress to recess for ten days beginning on the 3rd of April. If I find that I can spend as much as two weeks visiting in my District during this period, without missing important legislation, it is my intent to do so.

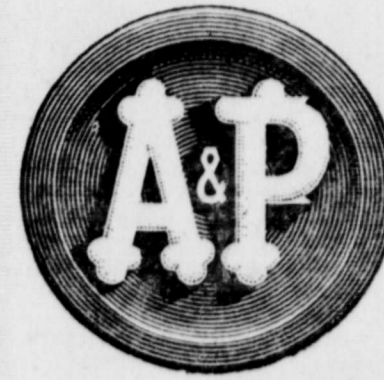

IT'S THE LAW in Texas

A public service feature of the State Bar of Texas

April 30th is the deadline on which social security payments for household workers for the first quarter of 1953 are due at the office of your Collector of Internal Revenue.

The federal law bringing household workers under the old-age and survivors insurance system went into effect January 1, 1951. However, lawyers say that many persons who employ help in their homes are still in the dark about requirements of the law.

Here are some provisions every-

one should know. Household workers covered by the law include maids, laundresses, housekeepers, cooks, nursemaids, gardeners, handymen, valets, footmen, grooms, chauffeurs of privately owned cars, practical nurses, and others.

Whether or not a household worker is included in the law depends on how many days she is paid. If the person works 24 days and earns \$50 during any one of the three month periods into which the calendar year has been divided, a tax report must be filed and payment made.

Only cash wages are considered, which includes bus fare if paid in cash, but does not include bus tokens, clothing, room and board, or other noncash items furnished the employee. A domestic worker does not have to put in a full day to count on the 24 day rule — any portion of the day worked counts as a full day.

The rule is different for domestic workers on farms operated for profit. In such cases the domestic is considered a farm worker and is covered only if he or she meets the test for farm labor.

The tax in all amounts to 3% of the cash wages paid. You, as an employer, must deduct 1½% from your household worker's cash wages if the person meets the 24 day, fifty dollar test. You

then include another 1½% which is the employer's contribution. After the close of each specified three-month period you should send the tax, with a report of the wages paid, to the Collector of Internal Revenue.

These three-month periods, or quarters, end on March 31st, June 30th, September 30th and December 31st. Reports and payments are due by the last day of the month following the close

The Bureau of Internal Revenue has a special household report form, printed on the back of a return envelope, which can be obtained from your Collector upon request. Just ask for Form 942.
