

Neglect Cause Of Most Diphtheria, Dr. Cox Believes

AUSTIN, April 2. - Diphtheria is a disease of neglect, declared Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. If all babies, beginning at three months of age, were taken to a physician or clinic for immunization against diphtheria, the infant deaths from this disease would cease. Such immunizations may be given in conjunction with whooping cough

and tetanus vaccine for triple protection. Diphtheria occurs most frequent

in early childhood. It is caused by a germ that grows in the nose and throat and throws out a toxin muscle or it may cause a paralysis Sunday. known as peripheral neuritis.
