





attractive. Premiums are either deducted from paychecks or paid directly to an insurance agent. Benefits may be in the form of service, in which the company pays the hospital; in cash paid to the patient, who in turn pays the hospital; or in service and cash. In some policies, medical service may be included, or an entirely separate policy may be necessary. An allowance to pay special nurses is included by some of the private insurance companies. The most popular types of coverage are (1) hospital, (2) surgical, and (3) medical (those not involving surgery). In many plans medical services rendered outside the hospital are not included because companies try to keep premiums within the reach of the average user. They have found that it's cheaper for the patient to pay small routine doctor bills, reserving his insurance


