CJC Track Team Wins Third Place At Gorman Meet

The Cisco Junior College track team took third place in the annual Indian Trail track meet held in Gorman Saturday. The team made 20½ points in finishing ahead of Ranger Junior College and other Pioneer Conference schools.

Burl Moses took first place in the broad jump event and ran on the 880 yard relay team that took second place, and on the spring medley relay team that took third place.

Del Wright took third in the broad jump, third in the high hurdles, fourth in the low hurdles and fourth in the 880 yard dash.

Bill McGuire took second in the high jump and second in the discus throw.

Charles Atkinson took fourth in the 100 yard dash and fourth in the 220 yard dash.

Runners in the two relays were Johnny White, Burl Moses, Charles Atkinson and Bill Taylor.

32 Junior Boys Report To Open Midget Training

Coach O. B. Graham had 32 boys out for the initial spring football training program at Cisco Junior High School Monday afternoon.

Most of the boys were from the lower grades and lacked experience, but Coach Graham was pleased with the first drills. Most of his team last year will be lost because of graduation.

Of the 32 who reported for drills Monday 10 were seventh graders and 10 were sixth graders. The remaining 12 were from the fifth grade who will enter junior high next year.

Plans call for a lot of work on fundamentals during the spring practice sessions.

Shallow Oil Test Is Planned Near Cisco

Location was announced today for a 1,200-foot oil test on the E. N. Strickland farm two miles southeast of Cisco. The well will be drilled soon by McClung, West et al in the west quarter of the south half of Section 45, Black 3, H&TC Survey.

The location is approximately 500 feet northwest of a deep well drilled in the 1920s. A log of the old well was said to have showed free oil at 1,165 feet, it was said.

County To Plant Big Castor Bean Crop This Spring

Eastland County farmers are expected to plant at least 1,500 acres of castor beans this spring and the acreage might be increased to about 6,000 acres if moisture is adequate, Administrator Emmett Powell of the County PMA program reported today.

Castor beans can be planted as late as June 1 and make a good crop. The PMA is selling seed for 15 cents a pound. The government has supported the price of castor beans at nine cents per pound, Mr. Powell said.

The government's shelling plant at Carbon has been leased to the Pacific Vegetable Oil Company for operation this fall. Under this year's program, growers are to take their castor beans to the plant and will be paid for them there, Mr. Powell said.

The county's 1953 peanut program is expected to be ready for announcement in the near future, Mr. Powell added.

Myrick Talks At Seranton Meeting

President A. Z. Myrick of the Eastland County Farm Bureau gave a resume of the organization's work, locally and nationally, at a meeting last Thursday night at the Seranton School. More than 60 persons attended the meeting.

In his talk, Mr. Myrick pointed out that only 15 percent of the population produces the nation's food. He emphasized the importance of a strong farm bureau program.

J. C. Coats told the meeting of recent legislative activities in Austin. County Agent J. M. Cooper discussed new varieties of hybrid sorghums, winter legumes and peanuts. T. C. Cozart was in charge of the program, and refreshments were served by Seranton women.

Communities represented at the meeting were Eastland, Gorman, Desdemona, Cisco, Ranger, Cheaney, Flatwood, New Hope, Kokomo, Sabanno, Nimrod, Pleasant Hill and Bluff Branch.

Exchange Plan Is Given For Holders Of Treasury Bonds

Cyrus B. Frost, Jr., volunteer chairman of the Eastland County U. S. Savings Bonds Committee, today reminded all holders of F & G Treasury Bonds which will mature between May 1 and December 1953 of the Treasury offer which makes it possible for them to exchange their Bonds for the new Treasury 3½ percent fully marketable Bonds if they desire. The offer announced by Secretary of the Treasury Humphrey April 13 does not apply to Series E Savings Bonds which mature during the same period.

Holders of maturing E Bonds are still privileged to hold the same Bonds for an additional ten years with interest. Holders of maturing F and G Bonds must make application to exchange their Bonds for the new 3½ percent issue before May 1. Arrangements to make the exchange should be made at Federal Reserve Banks and Branches. Local banks will be glad to advise holders on making the exchange, Mr. Frost added.

Exchanges of Series F and G Bonds will be made par for par and will be allotted in full. Since holders of Series F and G Bonds will receive interest on the new Bonds at the rate of 3½ percent from May 1, 1953, interest adjustments will be made as follows: In the case of Series F Bonds the subscriber will be charged an amount equivalent to interest from May 1 to date of maturity of the F Bond at the rate of 2.53 percent per annum. In the case of Series G Bonds, the owner will receive an interest payment at the rate of 2½ percent per annum borne by the G Bond, from the last interest payment date to May 1, 1953.

The lowest denomination of the new Bonds will be \$500, Mr. Frost pointed out. Holders of smaller denomination Series F and G Bonds may exchange them for the next higher multiple of \$500 upon payment of any cash difference.

Eligible F and G Bond holders who do not wish to make the exchange will have the opportunity of reinvesting the proceeds of their Bonds as they mature in Savings Bonds currently on sale, or to receive cash payment.

The Treasury has called the special attention of all F and G Bond holders, including those corporations and organizations which require directors' or finance committee action, to the limited time available for making application for exchange. The offer expires April 30.

Several Heifers To Be Presented

The Eastland County Dairy Show will be held at Rising Star on Saturday, April 25, according to an announcement by A. Z. Myrick, Cisco, president of the county dairy association.

The Rising Star Chamber of Commerce and the dairy organization, are sponsoring the show. This will be the first time for the county event to be held in that part of the county.

All animals must be in their places near the market building in Rising Star by 10:30 o'clock that morning. They may be removed and taken home by 4 p. m., Myrick said in inviting dairy men and farmers with good animals to enter them. The animals do not have to be registered or purebred but should be representative of their breed. Animals of the Jersey, Holstein, Ayrshire or Guernsey breed may enter.

Joe Bob and Don Shalton, prominent Jersey Breeders of Brownwood, will do the judging. T. D. Wheat, Eastland, agricultural representative of a utility firm, will act as master of ceremonies.

A junior and senior judging contest will be held in the morning, reports H. L. Geyer, vocational agriculture teacher in the high school there. Merchandise prizes will be given to the top five winners of each division.

Several Jersey heifers are to be awarded during the day as a continuation of the Eastland Co. Youth Dairy Program. Animals from other countries are eligible to enter the show.

The value of the milk sold off dairy farms over Eastland County is of tremendous economic value, Myrick concluded, and a dairy show helps to stimulate interest in better animals.

Course In Home Nursing Planned By Country Group

Mrs. Bill Tucker, home nursing chairman of the Eastland Co. Chapter of the Red Cross, announced today that anyone interested in taking the 12 hour home nursing course to begin April 28 should immediately contact Mrs. O. L. Hooper, 506 S. Daugherty St., Eastland.

The first class will be limited to ten students. Classes will be held in the City Hall from 1:30 to 3:30 p. m. on Tuesday and Wednesday of each week until the 12 hour course is completed.

The instructors for the first class will be Mrs. Otto Marshall and Mrs. Bill Tucker.

The room which has been supplied by the City of Eastland has been freshly painted and all the equipment needed has either been donated, loaned or bought. All is in readiness for the class to start. All persons desiring to take the course should contact Mrs. Hooper who is responsible for the class roll.

Other classes will be scheduled later. Many persons have indicated an interest in this program and the home nursing committee plans to have classes scheduled so that people who work during the day may also have an opportunity to enroll for night classes.

Students will learn how to meet simple emergencies in the home; how to recognize some of the early signs of illness; how to give simple nursing care to the sick and injured at home; how to keep the family well, and many other valuable skills in giving nursing care. Such skills as how to properly bath a bed patient, giving a steam inhalation to a patient in bed, how to prepare and apply hot compresses, how to give an enema, and many other essentials in caring for the ill. The danger of self-treatment will also be a part of the course.

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CANADIAN RELATIONS!

WASHINGTON — Is Canada really bigger than Texas? And how do American visitors to Canada learn to deal in pounds, shillings and pence?

These questions, put to a Canadian citizen by U. S. visitors, are fairly typical. The first fellow was pretty sore when he was assured that the Lone Star state can't be stretched to cover Canada, while the second questioner was surprised to learn that Canadian money is the same as ours.

Yet interest in the vast northland sitting tip-top of our border is picking up in this country, according to the Canada-U. S. Committee maintained by the Chamber of Commerce of the United States and its counterpart in the Dominion.

For Canada, always a lusty infant, is becoming an ambitious adolescent with big ideas for the future. To put it more formally, Canada is discovering herself economically. She has reached the point where this country found itself a half century ago, but with the big advantage of beginning her industrial expansion in an age of jet-planes and atomic energy.

Oil and gas discoveries in Alberta are causing almost as much excitement as the California Gold Rush, and there are additional discoveries of uranium and iron ore to attract American capital.

And American investments in Canada are increasing rapidly. According to "The Economist" (London), new U. S. investments in 1948 to \$299 million in 1951. Our Canadian investments now equal our total investments in all Latin-American countries.

The Canada-U. S. Committee believes all this means that America business men can profit by a better understanding of their neighbor. It therefore has proposed some practical steps businessmen can take in this direction.

The first step is to encourage travel between the two countries. This might be done by offering trips to Canada as bonuses and other rewards to company personnel. Other suggestions:

Boards of directors in this country can profitably hold meetings in Canada, particularly when the United States company has interests in both countries.

Associations and business groups could arrange joint meetings with their Canadian counterparts.

Interchange of students can be undertaken by commerce and industry as well as schools. On-the-job training could be done in Canada by U. S. firms with interests in both countries, and in this country by Canadian firms with American affiliates.

Notaries Due To Get Reappointed

Secretary of State Howard Carney has announced that he will reappoint all persons who now hold Notary Public Commissions and that all such persons must qualify by filing an oath and bond with the County Clerk of their residence between June 1, 1953 and June 10, 1953. The law specifically required County Clerks to approve Notary bonds and individuals should not send money or requests for commissions direct to the Secretary of State. All Notary matters can only be received by the Secretary of State after the County Clerk acts thereon.

Any person who has not heretofore been a Notary Public should apply to his County Clerk between May 1, 1953 and May 23, 1953, if he desires to have this application given prompt attention in the State Department, as the rush of reappointing all old Notaries may slow up the ordinary process of making new appointments and issuing commissions.

Secretary of State Carney said, "Each person applying for a commission as a Notary Public must be at least 21 years of age and a resident of the County for which he is appointed; exact names and permanent addresses should be given to the County Clerk in applying for a commission, as location of the Notary may be necessary long after he has notarized a particular instrument."

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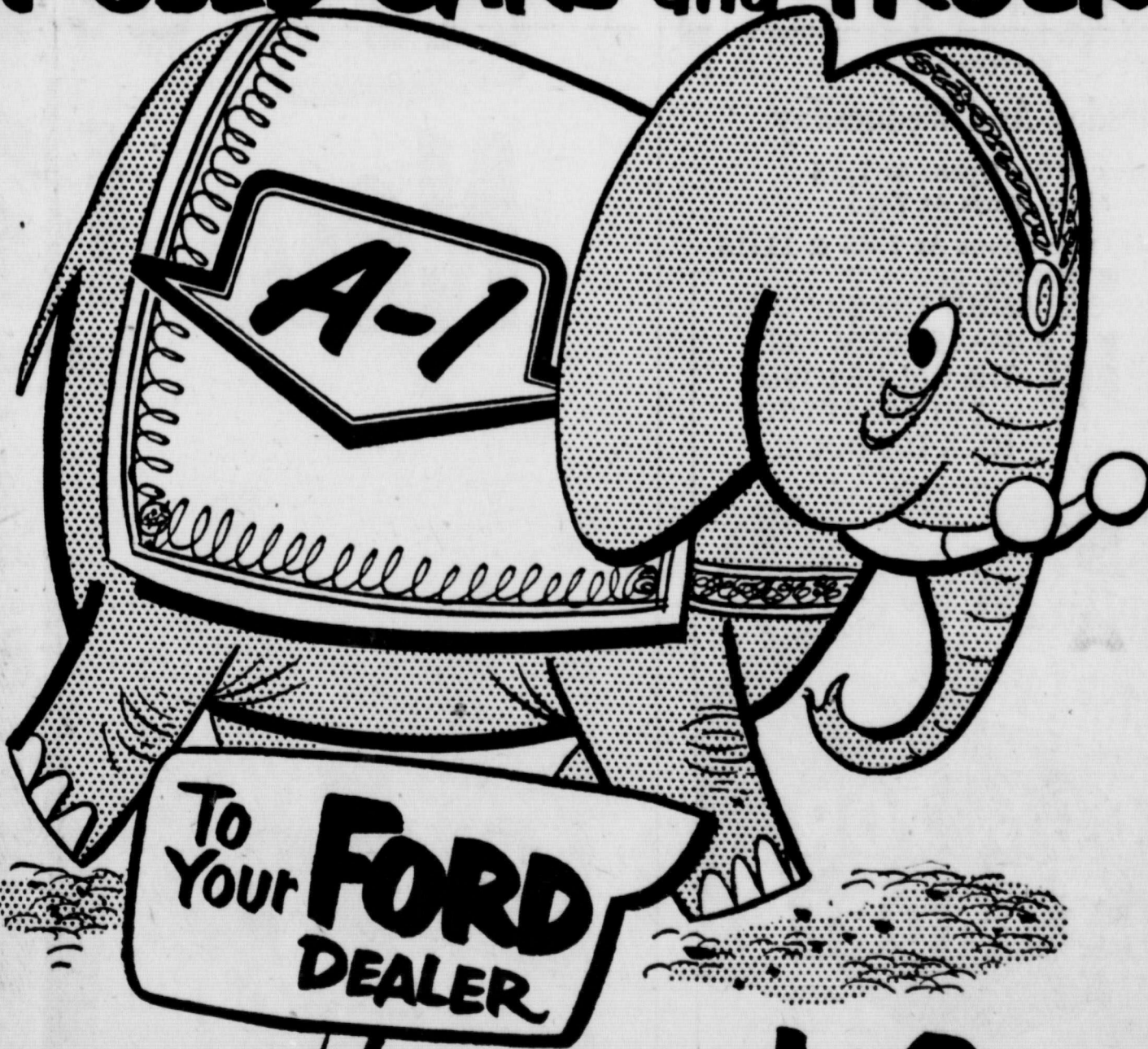

What is a real emergency in first aid? It is a condition which if not checked may cause death within a few minutes, such as too much or prolonged bleeding (hemorrhage), lack of breathing, or poisoning.

One way to stop bleeding is to press on the wound, using a freshly ironed handkerchief or sterile cotton gauze. Another is to press the fingers against a blood vessel as it crosses a bone above or below the wound. Finally, there is the tourniquet, a band of some kind (belt, necktie, handkerchief) tied around a limb to cut off the circulation.

Improper use of the tourniquet has been almost as dangerous as its proper use has been life-saving. When left in place too long, it has led to gangrene and perhaps the loss of a limb. A tourniquet should be loosened every thirty minutes to see if bleeding has stopped. It should never be hidden from sight because it might be overlooked.

What about the patient who quits breathing? First, any obvious cause, such as a heavy piece of metal on the chest, should be removed. Next, tight clothing should be loosened, seams being ripped if necessary. Also, the patient's mouth should be examined to see if broken teeth, loose dentures, or any other objects are cutting off breathing. Do not put your fingers between his teeth because you may get a bite which would be troublesome and dangerous. If all these measures fail, artificial respiration should be begun and kept up until the patient begins and continues to breathe naturally or is pronounced dead by a doctor.

If poisoning is suspected, the surroundings should be searched to try to determine whether or

not the patient has taken or been given poison and if so, what kind. Several glasses of water should be given to dilute the poison, the patient made to vomit, and the antidote given if it is known. If there are burns of the mouth or tongue, no attempt should be made to get the patient to vomit because the stomach wall may rupture.
