

## Man Is Found On Street Injured Early Saturday

A man who gave his name as Luther D. Shumake was in a Ranger hospital Saturday receiving treatment for serious cuts and abrasions after he was found early Saturday morning wandering in a dazed condition in a Cisco residential area.

The man, who gave his age as 31, was clad only in a thin shirt when he was found near Brown Sanitorium about 6:45 a. m. He was taken to town by Clarence Hendricks and turned over to police officers who took him to a local hospital.

Examining physicians found that the man was suffering from a deep scalp cut, lascerations about the face and deep abrasions about the arms, knees and feet. It was estimated that the injuries had been received some 24 hours before he was found. After receiving emergency treatment he was taken to a Ranger

He told hosptial attendants and police conflicting stories, it was reported. One story was that he remembered being in a truck. Another was that he had been on a train when the injuries were received. One story was that he had been in a bar and was beaten up by another patron.

He gave his home address as Dallas and the address of his family as Athens. A check by local officers with Athens officers revealed that his family was known there.




