Those West Texas golf veterans had best brace themselves. There are two young Cisco swingers coming up fast who'll be picking up those silver trophies in a year or two.

One is Ben Milton Tabor, 17-year-old Cisco High School senior. The other is his across-the-street neighbor, Buddy Deen, age 16, a junior at Cisco High.

Both boys made the championship flight in the Cisco golf tournament won Sunday by Doug Jones, the Abilene veteran. Deen went out in the first round, but he went to the finals in the championship consolation bracket before losing, 3 and 1, to Jackie Milner of Dallas and formerly of Cisco.

Deen's a slender, blond-headed youngster who wears a perpetual grin on his freckled face. Tabor is a more serious youth, dark-haired and of medium build. Each is starting his third year of tournament golf.

Tabor, a Golden Glover, too, went to the semifinals at Cisco before being eliminated by Hardy Loudermilk of Abilene, 4 and 2. Jones beat Loudermilk, 1 up, for the title Sunday afternoon.

This tournament marked the first time either had played in the championship flight of a tournament. Tabor had Loudermilk one-down at the turn in their semifinals match, but the boy carded bogies on the next three holes and never could overcome the deficit.

Tabor won the Abilene Golden Gloves high school flyweight title at the age of 14. He won the bantam crown the next year at Brownwood in the schoolboy class and last year lost in the feather-

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Lobo Band Wins Sweepstakes Award In District Contests

The Cisco High School Lobo Band, under the direction of Kenneth St. Clair, added two more first division ratings to its list of honors for the 1952-53 school year in area band competition last Saturday at Stephenville.

With the first division the band received in the marching band contest last fall, these honors for concert playing and sight reading entitled the group to the coveted Sweepstakes Award, the highest honor given to school bands under the Texas Interscholastic League Music Festival program.

According to league standards, a rating of first division indicates a grade of 95 to 100, and a competing organization must achieve this grade in concert playing,

sight reading, and marching band, before being eligible for the Sweepstakes Award.

This season's contest rating climaxed a three-year period of steady growth for the band under the direction of Mr. St. Clair. Ratings for the past four years show that the group has progressed steadily from two third division and one second division ratings in 1950 to three first division ratings in 1953. Last year, the band won two first division and one second division ratings.

Besides the group awards, members of the Lobo band also received several individual awards for solos and ensembles entered in the two-day contest held last weekend. These ratings were:

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Indians Triumph Over Ranger To Open New Season

The Cisco Indians, local American Legion team, opened their 1953 season Saturday night at ABC Club field with a 5-4 victory over the Ranger American Legion nine. It was the first game for the Cisco team and the sixth game for the visitors.

Dizzy Howell started on the mound for the Indians and pitched three full innings. He struck out seven of the first nine batters he faced. The visitors were unable to get a man on base off the pitching of Howell, who faced only nine men in the three innings he pitched. Howell was replaced by Love at the beginning of the fourth inning. Love pitched three hit ball for four innings but allowed four runs. Howell was credited with the victory since the Indians were ahead 4-0 when he relinquished the mound to Love.

The Indians struck quickly in their half of the first inning when Gilbert got on first on an error by the Ranger short stop. Emsley struck out and Weiser walked, putting men on first and second. Jackson singled, filling the bases. Rogers walked, forcing in Gilbert for the first tally. Tommy Reynolds bunted Weiser home and Cheeves bunted Jackson home leaving the bases still loaded. Veteran Doug Jones of Abilene, a native of Eastland County, won the 18th annual Cisco Invitation Golf Tournament here Sunday afternoon with a last-hole victory over his fellow townsman, Hardy Loudermilk, the tourney medalist.

The match was decided on the 18th green after Loudermilk had evened the count with a 30-foot birdie from off the 17th green. Jones had a par four on the final hole, and Loudermilk missed his par-putt by inches after his second shot missed the green.

A strong, cold wind cut the quality of the golf shots Sunday afternoon. In the final 18 holes, Jones was eight strokes over par while Loudermilk was ten over. Jones, who grew up at Eastland and won the Cisco invitation tournament in 1923, reached the finals with a third round victory over Walter Dixon, young Abilene star. Loudermilk beat Cisco's Ben Tabor, 4 and 2, to go into the championship finals.

In the consolation of the championship flight, Jackie Milner of Dallas won a 3 and 1 victory over Buddy Deen, Cisco.

In the lower brackets, several Ciscoans played prominent roles. Ralph Glenn went to the finals where he lost to Floyd Pearson of Stephenville in the first flight. In the second flight, Cisco's Claude Blackburn lost in the finals to John Hart of Abilene. W. E. Jenkins of Cisco was the fourth flight winner. Mike Cameron of Cisco won the second flight consolation, and Bob Woolley of Cisco won the fourth flight consolation.

Immediately following the tournament, the prizes were awarded to the winners in ceremonies in the club house. Tournament Director J. A. Robinson was master of ceremonies. E. T. Thomas of Cisco won a TV set given away by the club.

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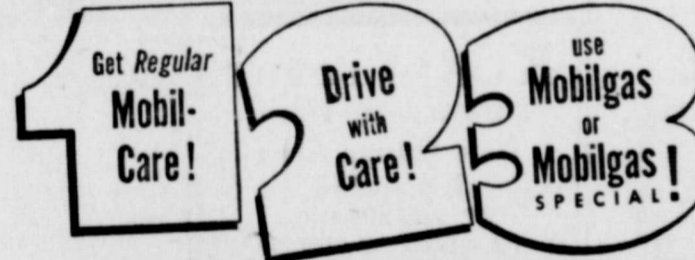
