This depth of 600 feet underwater has been chosen by experts as the average edge of the "Shelf" which is an extension of our ountry.

Here in Texas we have a large Shelf off our coast because the Gulf of Mexico is rather shallow as compared to the ocean itself. However, some of the Eastern States - Massachusetts in particular - have a much broader Shelf even than our own. Rhode Island, New Jersey and Maine have sections of the Shelf larger

than their present State limits. Many Nations - and our own mong them - have assumed ontrol of the Continental Shelf off the coast, even though it is inderwater.

Due to the huge value of the il and other reserves under the ontinental Shelf, a wise adminstration of these reserves is vitally important - not only to the Nation - but also to the State has been estimated at \$100 billion A wasteful use of these Continental Shelf reserves could drain fields within our historic






