### Stamey Elected For Coming Year

O. L. Stamey, president of Cisco Junior College and a member of the Cisco Lions Club for the past 17 years, was elected Governor of District 2-E at the closing session of the annual convention Monday afternoon at Mineral Wells.

The election of Mr. Stamey to the highest post in the district came as a climax to some two years of work on the part of Cisco Lions. The club began working on the project last year and stepped up the tempo of the work during the past year.

District 2-E includes 76 Lions Clubs from Fort Worth to Sweetwater and Vernon to Brownwood. A committee of Cisco Lions, composed of Jack Anderson, T. C. Williams and H. R. Garrett, was in charge of the Stamey campaign.

Mr. Stamey won the election after being nominated by the Wichita Falls club. The nomination was seconded by the Riverside Club of Fort Worth and the Abilene club. Following the nominating and seconding speeches, the only other candidate withdrew and the vote for Mr. Stamey was unanimous.

Some 550 delegates to the convention applauded the Cisco Junior College Madrigal Singers and Soloists Ruth Beatty and Jack Chambliss in a program at noon Monday. The program was directed by Robert Clinton, head of the music department at CJC.

Mr. Stamey, who will take office when the new club year begins in July, is now serving as deputy district governor. He has a perfect attendance record for his 17 years as a member of the Cisco club. He has served as a director, secretary and president of the local organization.

A native of this section, Mr. Stamey received his education at John Tarleton College, Sul Ross State College and holds a master's degree from Hardin-Simmons University. He has been active in school administration work for some 25 years.

Active in civic affairs, Mr. Stamey is a director of the Chamber of Commerce and is prominent in the affairs of the First Methodist Church.

**THE CONTINENTAL SHELF**

(First of a series of three articles by John Ben Shepperd, Attorney General of Texas.)

The recent action by the Congress returning Texas' tidelands within her 3-league or 10 1/2 mile historic boundaries was a happy event for all Texans.

It is hoped that the President will have signed the bill by the time you read this.

Through the years since the "big grab" of our off-shore submerged lands by the federal government, Texas officials, backed by the people of Texas, have battled for the return of what has always been rightfully ours.

There is danger, however, that although the area within our historic boundaries has been returned to us, we may have thus won a battle and lost a war.

Congress will now begin considering what to do with the "Continental Shelf" which lies outside the tidelands just returned to us.

Unless we now convince the federal government that any development of the Continental Shelf should be a joint State-Federal development, the federal government may achieve by mechanical means what they could not accomplish through political means.

That is, Federal wells on the "Continental Shelf" can drain res-

ervoirs within our historic State boundaries.

The first question which will occur to most of us is — What is the Continental Shelf? Strictly speaking, it is merely the underwater extension of the land mass which is our North American continent.

The outline of the United States as pictured in our geography books actually does not correctly show our borders.

Before the depths of the ocean are encountered off-shore a gradually sloping underwater plain extends out into the ocean. This, too, is part of the continent, part of the United States, part of the States and part of the Counties.

If we could see his underwater plain, we would observe a steep drop into the depths of the ocean at approximately 600 feet beneath the surface of the ocean or the Gulf of Mexico.

This depth of 600 feet underwater has been chosen by experts as the average edge of the "Shelf" which is an extension of our country.

Here in Texas we have a large Shelf off our coast because the Gulf of Mexico is rather shallow as compared to the ocean itself. However, some of the Eastern States — Massachusetts in particular — have a much broader Shelf even than our own. Rhode Island, New Jersey and Maine have sections of the Shelf larger than their present State limits.

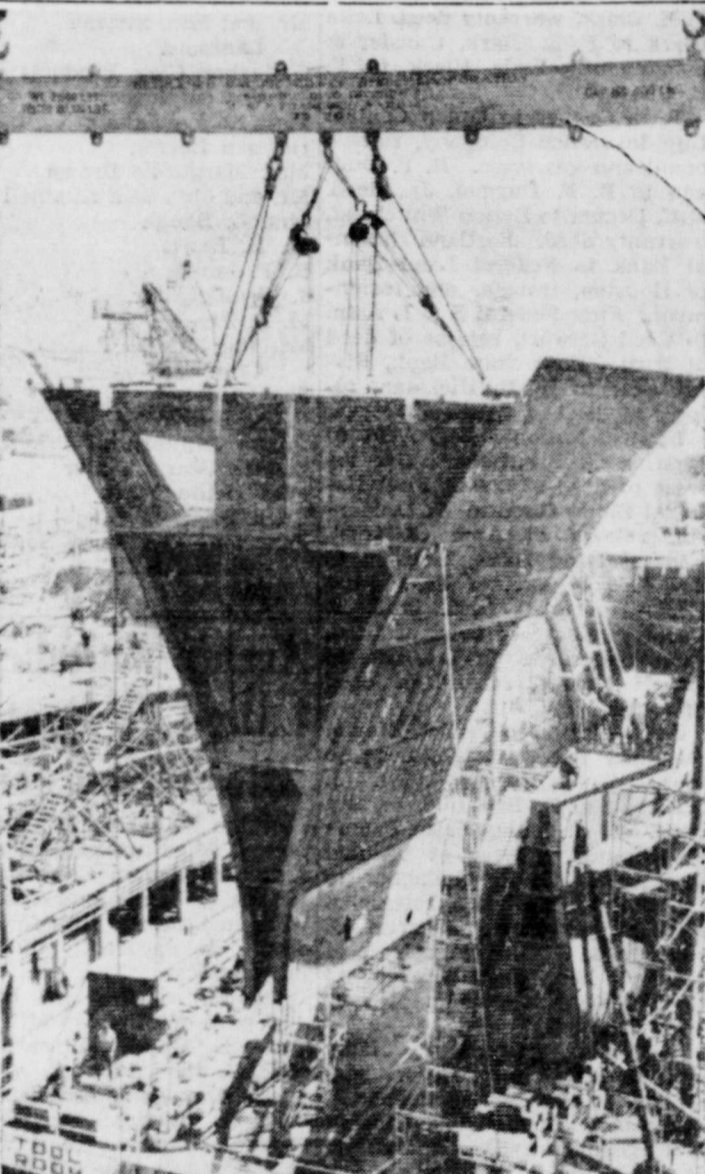
Many Nations — and our own among them — have assumed control of the Continental Shelf off the coast, even though it is underwater.

Due to the huge value of the oil and other reserves under the Continental Shelf, a wise administration of these reserves is vitally important — not only to the Nation — but also to the State. The total value of these reserves has been estimated at \$100 billion.

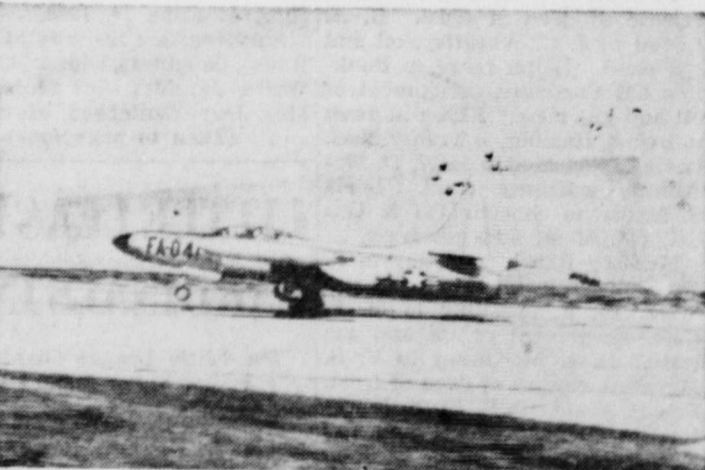
A wasteful use of these Continental Shelf reserves could drain fields within our historic boundaries.

In my next article I will discuss why Texas claims a rightful share in the Continental Shelf off our coast and outside our historic boundaries.

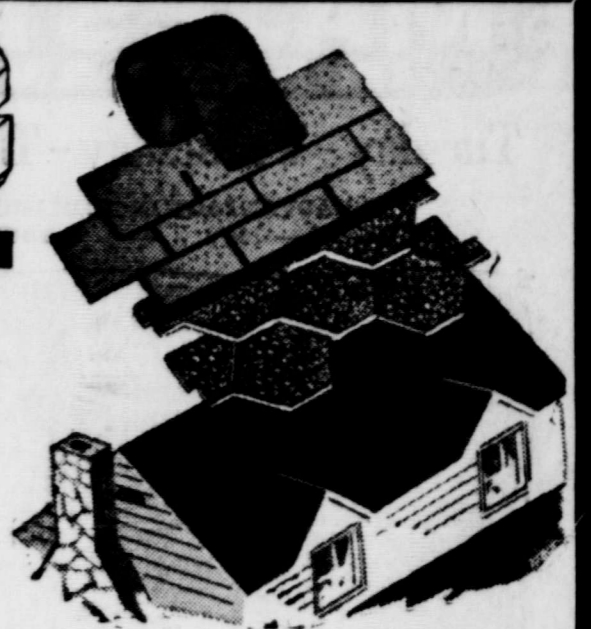

**Airway Positions Will Be Filled By Civil Service**
