# Year's Rainfall **Stands At 22.82**"

August's rainfall in Friona's official gauge came to 3.58 inches, and this shoved the yearly total to 22.82 inches. This year's moisture for the growing season has been

the most in years. The June-July-August total came to 12.64 inches, which is just .42 inches less than the entire total for calendar year 2003. The rainfall for April through August comes to 17.78 inches.

The January-August total is the most for complete yearly totals for all but two years since 1992: 1997, with 27.4 inches, and 1999, with 26.14.

Temperatures for August were on the mild side, with moisture registered on 11 different dates. Cotton farmers are now needing a lot of hot weather to mature what could be an outstanding crop.

Corn and maize growers should be guaranteed a much better harvest than usual, with less money invested in the crops.





# **Rural Residents Face More Unintentional Injuries**

Unintentional injuries—such as those related to motor vehicles, occupational and recreational activities, falls, and firearms-were the fifth leading cause of death in the United States David Minson of Lubbock and in 2001. Hero is a fantastic movie. I have never seen a live action movie with such a high level of creativity. Every scene overflows with a vibrant palette of colors. Movies such as Frida and American Beauty had some beautiful scenes but they only scratched the surface. Every frame in Hero could be a painting.

The cinematography of Hero isn't where the good things stop. The smoothly choreographed action scenes are frequent and top notch. If you liked Crouching Tiger, Hidden Dragon, you will love this

Each character is very interesting. The story is well written, and many images in this movie will stay with you long after the end credits have passed.

Unfortunately for the illiterate, this movie is subtitled. However, if you are reading this, you will have no problem following the story. At the end of the movie I forgot I was reading the dialogue.





# Think Texas


This summer, many parts of Texas have received nearrecord amounts of rain. Considering drought is usually the watchword in the Lone Star State, many farmers and ranchers have welcomed the rain, which has given a boost to the thirsty crops and rangelands that stretch across the state. Unfortunately, excessive moisture is also good news for mosquitoes, which become more and more active in damp weather.

Besides being annoying at outdoor picnics, mosquitoes aggravate horse owners who are trying to protect their animals from West Nile virus, which can cause encephalitis in horses, donkeys, mules, humans and several other species of animals. The virus is transmitted by mosquitoes that acquire it from infected birds. Last year there were 717 confirmed West Nile cases among horses in Texas. With a population of more than 1 million horses in Texas, that number sounds like a drop in the bucket, but this virus can be devastating both physically and economically.

So far, West Nile has been found in at least five horses in Brazoria, Fort Bend, La Salle, Leon and Montgomery counties.

While a vaccination is considered the best line of defense to protect animals against West Nile virus, insect repellants are an excellent way to keep the mosquitoes away. It's also important to drain any standing water that could breed mosquitoes, and report any dead birds to local authorities. Thoroughly clean livestock watering troughs at least monthly, and, if possible, supply horses with screened housing to protect them from mosquitoes.

### **CRP Sign-Up 29 Offers Limited Opportunities**

LUBBOCK, August 27, 2004

Earlier this month USDA announced dates for the 29th CRP sign-up. The sign-up period will open August 30 and run through

Producers interested in submitting bids during CRP sign-up 29

Of primary interest to landowners wishing to submit a bid and acreage to be enrolled during this sign-up period. Only counties currently below the 25 percent acreage cap will be able to accept

Land that is not currently enrolled in CRP may be offered for Seeding rates for forage production should be around 100-120 lbs enrollment during CRP sign-up 29. Also, current CRP contract

To submit CRP offers, producers must visit their local FSA From 60-80 lbs of nitrogen is required for each ton of dry forage offices. FSA will accept offers only during the sign-up period

USDA expects there to be limited acreage available for CRP tance farmers and ranchers are being encouraged to work closely with their local FSA office to maximize the Environmental Benefits Index (EBI) score of their CRP offers.

FSA will use the EBI to rank the expected benefits of enrolling in CRP based on cost and five environmental factors: soil erosion; water quality; air quality; wildlife enhancement; and enduring benefits that continue beyond the life of the contract.

To be eligible for CRP enrollment, a producer must have owned or operated the land for at least 12 months prior to close of the CRP sign-up period, unless: the new owner acquired the land due to the previous owner's death; the ownership change occurred due to foreclosure where the owner exercised a timely right or redemption in accordance with state law; or the circumstances of the acquisition present adequate assurance to FSA that the new owner did not acquire the land for the purpose of placing it in

To be eligible for placement in CRP, land must be: cropland (including field margins) that is planted or considered planted to an agricultural commodity 4 of the previous 6 crop years from 1996 to 2001 which is physically and legally capable of being planted in a normal manner to an agricultural commodity; certain marginal pastureland that is enrolled in the water Bank Program; or certain land devoted to hardwood trees that was under CRP contract which expired on September 30, 2001, or earlier.

In addition to the eligible land requirements, cropland must also meet one of the following criteria: have a weighted average erosion index of 8 or higher; be expiring CRP acreage; or, be located in a-national or state CRP conservation priority area.

CRP rules limit the number of acres that can be enrolled in the program to 25 percent of the total cropland in a county. Several High Plains and Panhandle counties remain below this 25 percent county acreage cap for CRP enrollment. Producers and landowners interested in enrolling land during sign-up 29 should contact their county FSA office to determine if the county is below the 25 percent CRP acreage cap and will accept bids during sign-up 29.


Counties reported to be below the 25 percent CRP acreage cap in the High Plains region include: Borden, Carson, Castro, Crosby, Dawson, Garza, Hansford, Hartley, Hemphill, Howard, Hutchinson, Lipscomb, Lubbock, Lynn, Martin, Midland, Moore, Ochiltree, Parmer, Potter, Roberts, Sherman, and Terry.

In return for establishing long-term, resource-conserving covers, FSA provides rental payments to participants. FSA bases CRP rental rates on the relative productivity of the soils within each county and the average dryland cash rent or cash-rent

A maximum CRP rental rate for each county is calculated in advance of enrollment. Producers may offer land at that rate or offer a lower rental rate and increase the likelihood that their offer








Friona Contractor Seals Farwell
