SUMMER HEAT SETTLES IN **Slight Relief Promised By Friday**

The National Weather Bureau was giving the county a "slight relief from heat" forecast, however.

That relief was a little hard to fathom, with the temperature hitting 100 degrees by ten o'clock that morning. By afternoon the sun blazed from an orange sky, and triple-digits were upon us again. Only the most dedicated of people were stirring about their usual affairs.

At press time Wednesday morning the National Weather Service had revised its forecast slightly. The temperatures are expected to go above 100 for the next two days, with a southwest wind bringing in more heat.

The Weather Service is sticking with that "relief" by Friday, however. A surge of air from the north is supposed to bring down the temperature, with also a


On Tuesday, July 14 most little gusts from the north sure felt good!

> The heat wave was worse elsewhere. A map of the country showed a big heat advisory area covering parts of Louisiana, Arkansas, all of East Texas, part of North Texas and much of Oklahoma. Eastland County was just on the western edge of that.

The highest temperatures were in Eastern Oklahoma and Southeastern Kansas, with the very worst in Southwestern The winds were varied, Arizona and Southeastern California. (Mojave Desert, near the Colorado River.) There it can be 98 degrees at midnight and 118 or more in the afternoon.

This heat was coming from a sub-tropical upperlevel high, weather forecasters said.

The high temperature in Callahan County was expected to be in the 100s on Wednesday, with area counties under "hazardous" conditions. The temperature was supposed to drop in the 70s that night, a welcome change for sleeping. Then the heat wave was expected to expand into Southern New Mexico and Central California, leaving most of Texas still hot.

Burn Ban Reinstated in Callahan County CALLAHAN COUNTY, TEXAS ORDER

PROHIBITING OUTDOOR BURNING

WHEREAS, in accordance with Section 240.906 of the Local Government Code, the Callahan County Commissioners Court had found that dry conditions in the unincorporated areas of Callahan County create a public safety hazard that would be exacerbated by outdoor burning; and, whereas, such a finding authorizes the issuance of an order which prohibits or restricts outdoor burning.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDERED that the following regulations are hereby established for all unincorporated areas of Callahan County, Texas.

(1) Action prohibited:

A. A person violates this order if he or she knowingly, intentionally or recklessly burns any combustible material outside of an enclosure which serves to contain all flames and/or sparks, or orders such burning by others.

B. A person violates this order if he or she knowingly, intentionally or recklessly engages in any activity outdoors which could allow flames or sparks that could result in a fire, or orders such activities by others.

(2) Enforcement:

A. A violation of this order is a Class C Misdemeanor.

B. This order may be enforced by any duly commissioned peace officer in Callahan County

(3) This order is effective and enforceable for 90 days after the date of adoption which is indicated below.

(4) This order does not apply to outdoor burning activities related to public health and safety that are authorized by the Texas Natural Resources Conservation Commission for firefighter training; public utility, natural gas pipeline, or mining operations; or, harvesting of agriculture crops.

(5) Further, a person is not in violation if prior to the setting of any outdoor fire, he or she first obtains the permission of the appropriate volunteer Fire Chief. In this instance the Fire Chief will have the authority to set the

slight possibility of rain. Things look grim on fire hazards unti then. WELDING WILL BE PERMITTED IF THE PROP-ER PRECAUTIONS ARE BEING TAKEN.

1. The individual welding must have a spotter.

2. Two wet fire extinguishers must be available. 3. Must have sufficient supply of water on hand at all imes.

4. Must have water sprayer available for use.

5. Must wet down sufficient area (and re-wet often as necessary).

These safety precautions must be taken and also, please use common sense and good judgment if the conditions are windy. If the job is not an emergency put it off until another date.

Violators will be charged with a Class C Misdemeanor, punishable by a fine of up to \$500.00. An individual or individuals, could be liable for damages, if fire occurs. If there is a fatality, one could face possible felony charges.

His work reflected the struggles he witnessed all around him came out of the civil rights movement and also was involved in the Chicano-Latino literary political-arts movement of the '60s and '70s and to the present," he says. Herreramarched for the United Farm Workers in the 1960s and '70s and against U.S. involvement in Central America in the 1970s and '80s-but for the most part his poems were his placards. In poetry he explored the issues of injustice, oppression, inclusion, and exclusion that fueled the rallies, debates, and conferences in which he participated. "We had a lot of concerns about questions of homeland, questions of cultural roots, reclaiming our culture, you know, questions of religious foundations," he says. "What is a community? What are our indigenous community roots? Questions of language: What is our language? What is language? Literature 'What is literature? What are all those things?" The first book on the long literary road to these two collections was Rebozos of Love-selections from which still find their way into creative-writing and Chicano studies curricula-published in 1974. The words in the volume can confuse monolinguals, as Herrera never sticks too long to English or Spanish, preferring that third language, the version of Spanglish common in and specific to California. we speak lluvia roja fuente song of our struggle "(Dawning Luz)" offers a characteristic mash-up of words and worlds: Iluvia means rain, roja means red, fuente means fountain, and luz means light. When you add connotations and double entendres in two languages, you can easily end up wondering what anything means anymore. It's an in-between world that Herrera still relishes. "I use words in those books on occasion that are directly from my childhood, and they're ways of speaking that farmworkers, campesinos, or working-class Mexicanos or Latinos employ every day to communicate," he says. "It's part of our linguistic universe and not necessarily valued in officialized language classrooms, but I choose to use those words because those are the words that I know. When I read those words in the classroom in California or the Southwest or any classroom where there's migrant students, they're going to know those words."

Herrera gives us his newest work in the final poems of Half of the World in Light: a section called "The Five Elements," divided into "Wood," "Fire," "Earth," "Metal," and "Water," and navigating the continents, conflicts, and tragedies of days recent and long gone. His sympathy goes out to the victims of Hurricane Katrina and the 2004 train bombings near Madrid; his characters inhabit Afghanistan and Austin, Texas. In "Follow Ró?ewicz," he writes, "all these years, he utters so many things / about days gone and villages raped and / winters that lasted decades / how the women / clenched their hands and held their backs." Will a writer who found his voice half a century ago, nurtured it in the academy and on the street, channeled it into more than 20 books, and still has so much to say find comfort in silence for long?
