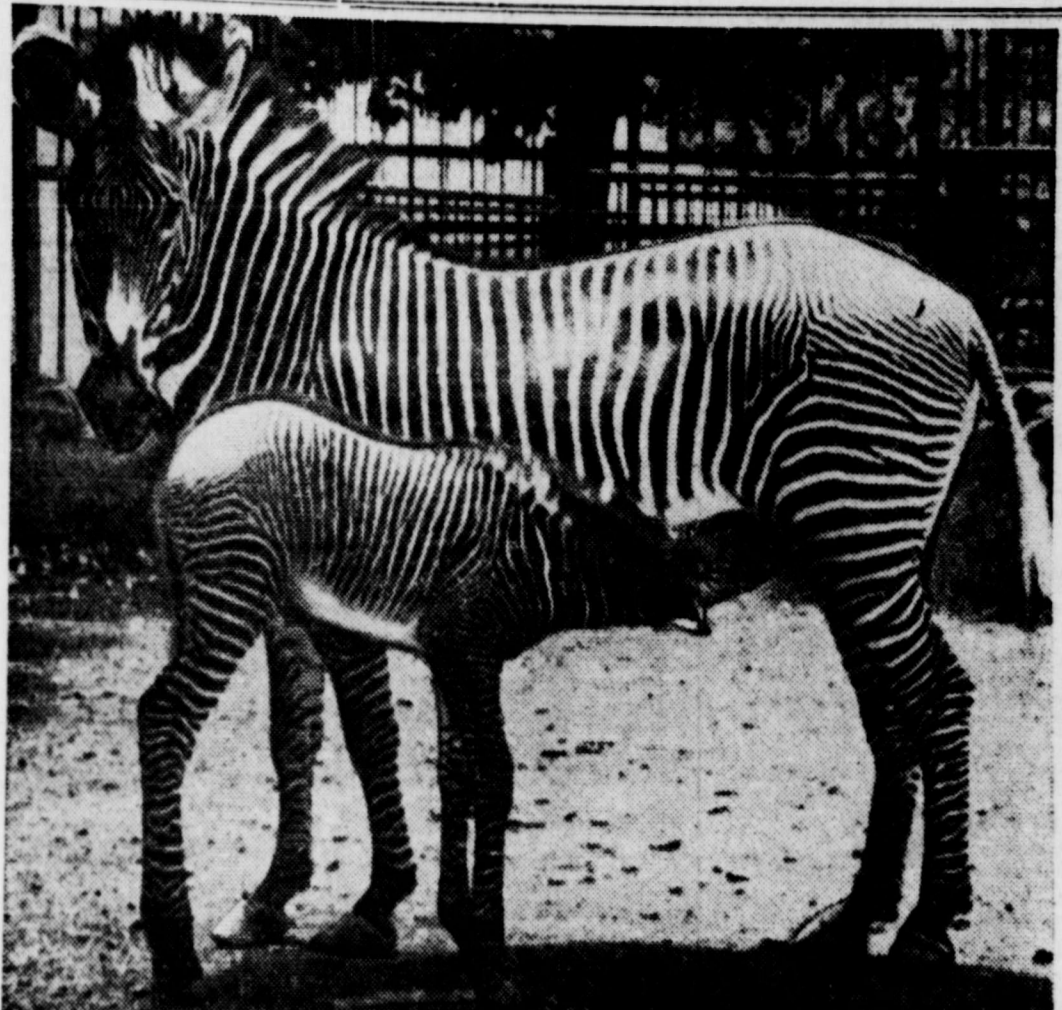

Bill Mitcham To Take Two Month Trip With Navy

NORFOLK, Va., June 22.—Scheduled to participate in a two-month training cruise aboard a ship of the U. S. Navy's 1953 Midshipman Practice Squadron is Midshipman third class William S. Mitcham, Jr., USNR, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. S. (Bill) Mitcham of 406 Avenue I, Cisco, Tex. The annual practice cruise, designed to give Naval Academy and NROTC midshipmen an opportunity to "learn by doing" aboard combat ships of the Atlantic Fleet, will be made by some 1,466 seniors and sophomores of 25 colleges and universities, as well as by the first and third classmen from the Naval Academy. This year, more than 30 ships, including the battleships USS Missouri and Wisconsin and the light aircraft carrier Saipan, will carry some 3,200 trainees to nine ports in South America and the Caribbean. They left Norfolk, Va. June 8th. The ports to be visited are: Rio de Janeiro and Santos, Brazil; Cartagena and Barranquilla, Colombia; Trinidad and Barbados, B. W. I.; Willemstad, N. W. I.; Colon, Panama; and Guantanamo Bay, Cuba. Each ship will stop at two of these ports and Guantanamo Bay. The midshipmen will be granted shore leave at the first port, in Brazil, from June 27th to July 5th, and at a Caribbean port July 22-25. The squadron, under the command of Rear Admiral E. T. Woolridge, USN, Commander Battleship Cruiser Force, Atlantic, flying his flag in the Missouri, returns to Norfolk, Aug. 5th. Turn to Page Four

DOUBLE SERVICE FOR ACCIDENT VICTIMS IS PLANNED FOR TODAY

Double funeral services for Mrs. Minnie B. Boatman of Cisco and her granddaughter, Margaret Elizabeth McGough of Albuquerque, New Mexico, who were fatally injured in an automobile accident early Saturday near Anson were to be held at 4 p. m. Tuesday at the East Cisco Baptist Church. Mrs. Boatman and her granddaughter were dead upon arrival at a Hamlin hospital following the accident which occurred about 6 a. m. some 15 miles west of Anson on the Anson-Hamlin highway. The accident seriously injured eight other members of the same family group, who were en route from Cisco to Albuquerque. Investigating officers said that the car in which the ten persons were riding overturned after the right front tire blew out. The car hit an embankment. The party had left Cisco at 4:30 a. m. for Albuquerque where the father of the dead girl is stationed. The girl's mother, Mrs. Darris J. McGough was said to be driving at the time of the accident. S-Sgt. D. J. McGough, Mrs. McGough, their five children, Mrs. Lucille Jones and infant son and Mrs. Boatman were in the car for the trip to New Mexico. The McGoughs had been in Cisco visiting Mrs. Boatman and Mrs. McGough's mother, Mrs. Dee Cobb. The Rev. F. C. Bradley, pastor of the East Cisco Baptist Church, and the Rev. Bob Sanders, pastor of Wesley Methodist Church, were to officiate at the services. Burial was to follow in Oakwood Cemetery with Thomas Funeral Home in charge of the arrangements. Mrs. Boatman, 60, had been a resident of Cisco for 40 years. She was born in Glencove on August 27, 1892. The McGough child was born in San Antonio on February 22, 1941. She had not lived in Cisco, but was a frequent visitor here. Surviving Mrs. Boatman are five daughters, Mrs. Hoytt Medina of Portales, New Mexico, Mrs. Vernon Norris of Cisco, Mrs. A. R. Vessels of Amarillo, Mrs. H. W. Jones of Aztec, New Mexico and Mrs. D. J. McGough of Albuquerque; one son, S-Sgt. Kenneth Boatman of Brooks Air Force Base, San Antonio, and eight grandchildren. Margaret Elizabeth McGough is survived by her parents, S-Sgt. and Mrs. Harries J. McGough of Albuquerque; two sisters, Sandra Kay and Gloria Jean McGough of Albuquerque; two brothers, Floyd Dale and Robert Jackson McGough of Albuquerque; her paternal grandmother, Mrs. Dee Cobb of Cisco, and her paternal grandfather, Mr. McGough of Strawn. Farm Bureau Asks Consideration In State Dry Areas

WACO, June 23. — The Texas Farm Bureau Federation has asked President Eisenhower to "give serious consideration" to five proposals designed to alleviate the hardship suffered by livestock producers in the drought-stricken area of the state. In a telegram to the chief executive, the TFFB board in session in Waco requested that immediate emergency measures be instituted to "relieve this drastic situation." The message, signed by President J. Walter Hammond, contained the following proposals: 1. That the drought-stricken portion of the state be declared a disaster area. 2. Provide through existing channels, or otherwise, a system of credit to enable livestock producers to maintain possession of foundation herds. 3. Provide necessary long-term credit for essential feed. 4. Make available surplus CCC feedstuffs at prices as low as those offered to foreign countries. 5. That the United States Department of Agriculture initiate a beef-purchase and promotion program that will restore confidence, strengthen the market and tide the industry over this emergency. The telegram also urged that a "thorough investigation be made of the disparity between producer and consumer prices" by Agriculture Secretary Benson's Livestock Advisory Committee which was to meet June 20 in Chicago. The directors stated that livestock producers and credit agencies in this state "prepare for ordinary droughts, but this unprecedented drought has not only depleted ranges of forage, but has also depleted the sources of credit."

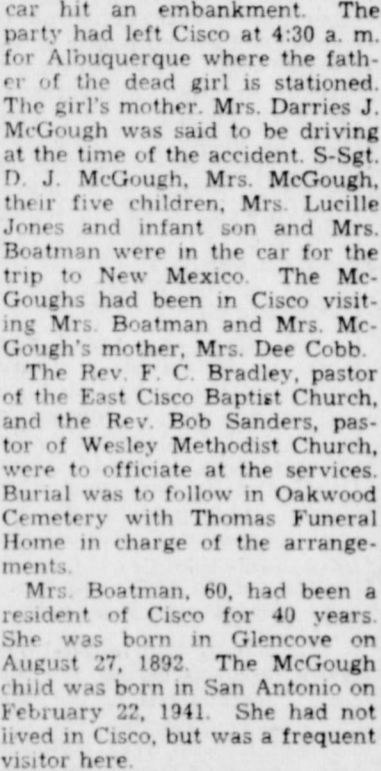
Indians Will Meet Ranger Here Tonight

Dr. F. E. Clark Called By Death; Rites Wednesday

Dr. F. E. Clark, 65, a practicing physician in Cisco for 35 years, died unexpectedly in his room at 3:45 p. m. Monday. Dr. Clark had been in ill health for several years, but was apparently in fair condition Monday morning. He came to Cisco first in 1912, shortly after graduating from the University of Texas School of Medicine, John Sealy Hospital in Galveston. He remained here for a year before moving to Jayton where he practiced for four years. In 1918 he returned to Cisco and had remained here since that time. Dr. Clark was born in Allen, Collin County, on December 21, 1887, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. J. J. Clark. On June 2, 1912, soon after receiving his degree, he was married to Miss Leila McCary in Center. For many years Dr. Clark was active in church and civic affairs of the community. He served on the board of stewards of the First Methodist Church for a number of years, and was on the Cisco school board for several terms. He served as president of the board for some 16 years. He was a member of the Eastland County Medical Society, the Masonic Lodge, and was active in the American Hereford Association. Funeral services will be held at the First Methodist Church at 10 a. m. Wednesday with the Rev. E. H. Lightfoot, pastor of the church, officiating. Burial will be in Oakwood Cemetery under the direction of Thomas Funeral Home. Survivors are his wife of Cisco; four daughters, Mrs. O. O. Odum, Jr., of Cisco, Mrs. Leo A. Hatten of Washington, D. C., Mrs. Carl Siddall of Fresno, and Mrs. Thomas Smartt of La Forte; a brother, Raymond E. Clark of Putnam; nine sisters, Mrs. Ida Montgomery of Jayton, Mrs. A. D. Purvis and Mrs. J. A. Hart of Ft. Worth, Mrs. Clyde King and Mrs. John Gilbert of Midland, Mrs. Jessie Vittitore of Rotan, Mrs. Bob McLamore of Galena Park, Mrs. Earl Rutherford of Putnam, Mrs. Earl Harper of California; and nine grandchildren. 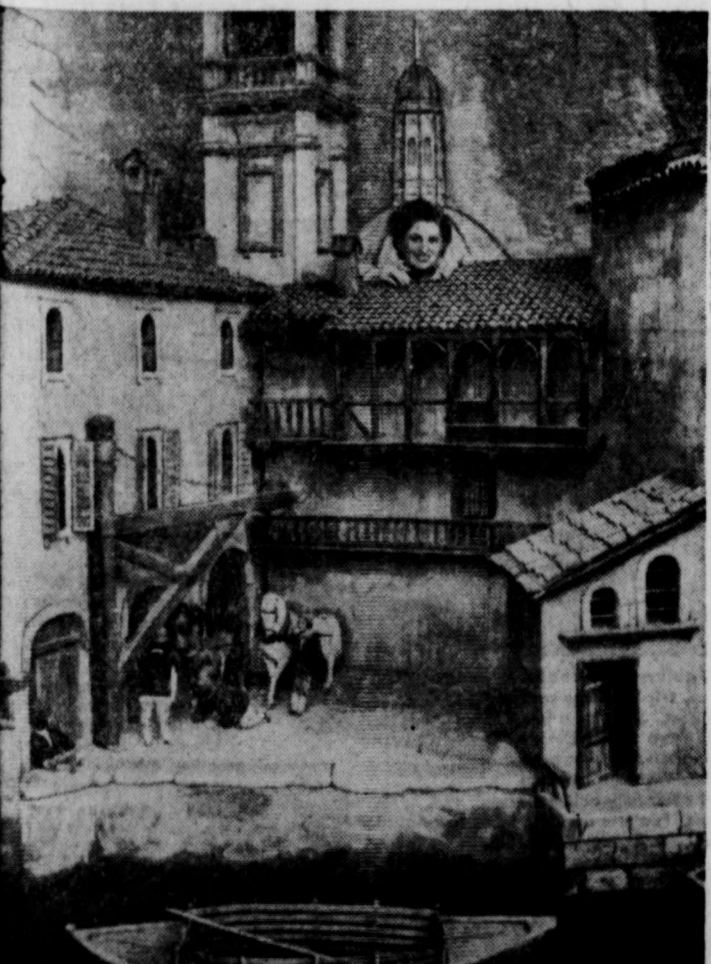
