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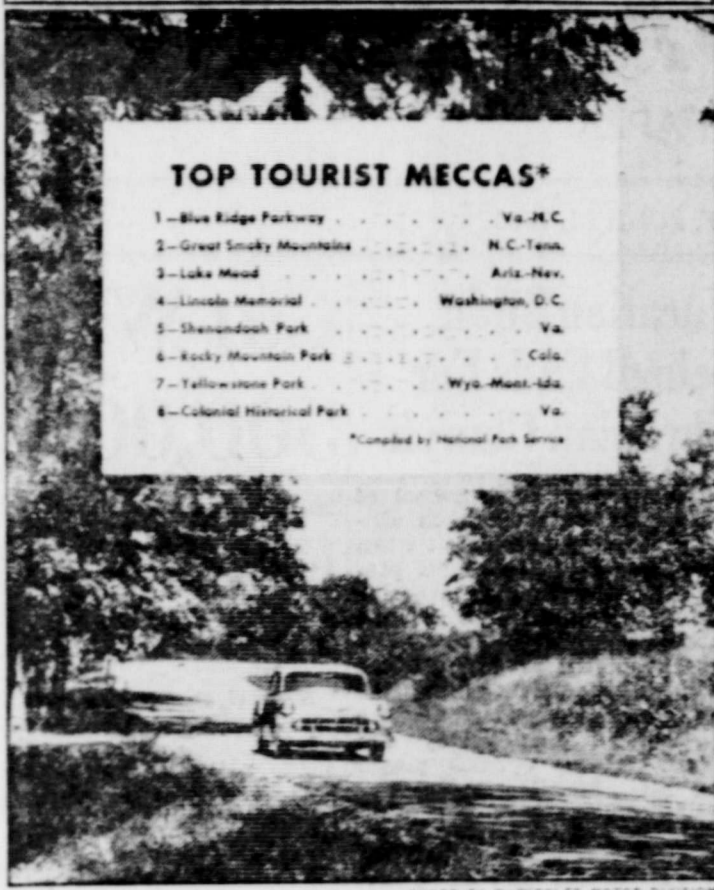
NEW HOPE FOR MANKIND

Some time ago Secretary of State Dulles observed that the Stalin era has ended and the Eisenhower era begun, "bringing with it new hope for all mankind." He also said, in discussing confusing recent changes in Soviet attitudes, that the Kremlin apparently has launched a "peace offensive" rather than a "peace offensive." He warned that we cannot yet tell whether this represents a basic change or merely a tactical shift.

The Iron Curtain is about as opaque as anything can be and a discussion of what may be going on behind it must lean heavily on speculation. But a belief grows that the death of Stalin involved much more than a transfer of absolute power from one man to another. The position of Malenkov does not seem at all comparable to that of his predecessor. He is not deified to anywhere near the same extent by the Soviet press. He shares power with Beria, head of the huge secret police organization, and with the marshals who command the red army. Indeed, some long-experienced observers are saying that the balance of power in Russia today may be in the hands of the army chiefs, some of whom are known to feel that Russia is not equipped to win a world war.

Too, recent developments in atomic weapons on our side of the fence may have made a strong impression in Kremlin circles.

More than 40,000,000 people visited national parks last year and the figure is expected to go higher in 1953 as America prepares to spend a whopping nine billion dollars on motoring vacations. Such a device as the atomic artillery shell, which is relatively small and light, yet enormously destructive, adds new and appalling risks to war. The horrors that another major war would bring to all are almost unimaginable. In the meantime, the Eisenhower Administration stands on five clear, basic precepts which the President put in these words in his speech to the American Society of Newspaper Editors: "First. No people on earth can be held — as a people — to be an enemy, for all humanity shares the common hunger for peace and fellowship and justice. "Second. No nation's security and well-being can be lastingly achieved in isolation, but only in effective cooperation with fellow-nations. "Third. Any nation's right to a form of government and economic system of its own choosing is inalienable. "Fourth. Any nation's attempt to dictate to other nations their form of government is indefensible. "Fifth. A nation's hope of last-

ing peace cannot be firmly based upon any race in armaments, but rather upon just relations and honest understanding with all other nations."

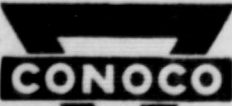

The meeting was opened with the group singing "Take Time To Be Holy." Mrs. John Shertzer led the opening prayer.

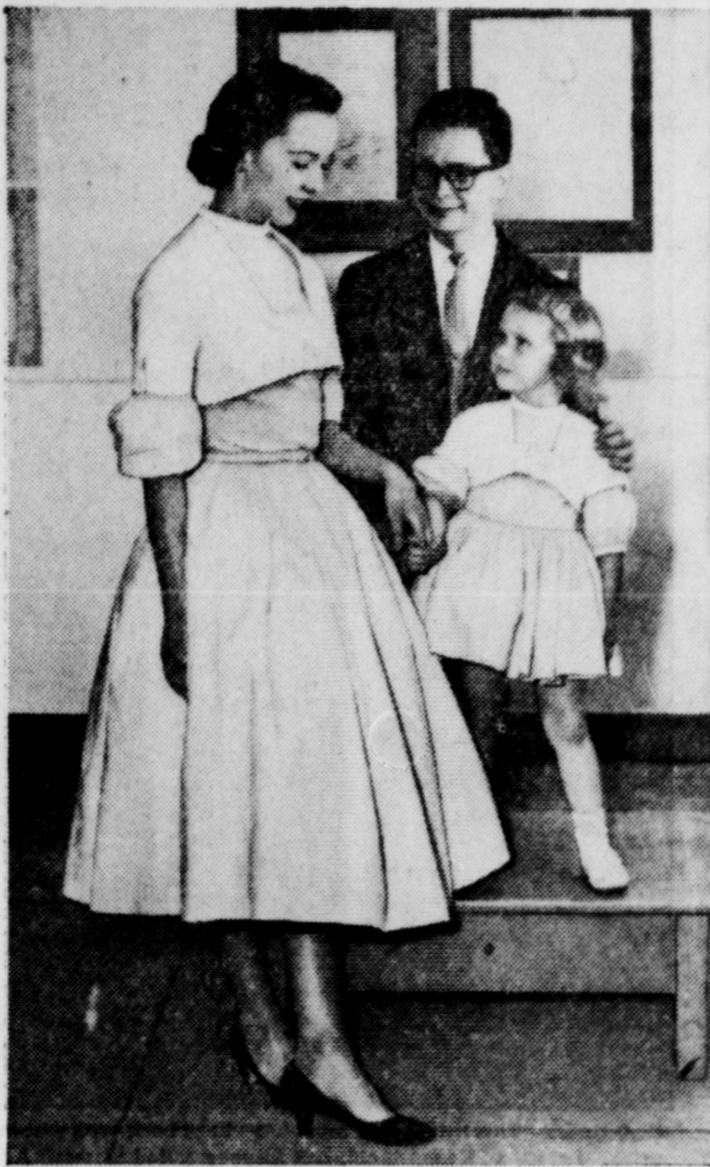

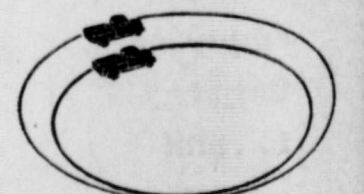
