Crops, Pastures **Deteriorate Due** To Dry Weather

Feed crops, cotton and pas-tures deteriorated in all areas as droughty conditions intensified over practically the entire state during the past week. Light scattered showers in the southern high plains were welcome but generally ineffective because of the immediate return of very high temperatures.

Afternoon temperatures soared above 100 in all areas except along the coast and in the southeast for the second consecutive week. Over the high and low rolling plains temperatures ranged from 105 to 115 degrees. These high temperatures along with lack of moisture wilted cot ton and sorghums and fired corn. Combining the very short wheat crop in the northwest was well

Corn prospects continued to deteriorate in central, north and east Texas and some was cut for fodder or silage to salvage as much feed as possible. Lateplanted corn needed rain badly The crop was maturing rapidly in northcentral and upper Coastal counties. Very little progress was made in planting sorghums in the northwest because of dry soils and the growing crop was suffering.

Harvest was at a peak in the coastal bend with yields running light. Alfalfa was being cut for the second time in the high plains. A limited amount of hay was baled in other areas but late hays needed rain.

The peanut crop in the northern commercial area and in west and south Texas was showing the effects of dry weather, with the east Texas acreage still in fair condition. Vetch harvest was under way in central and east Texas. A few very good yields were reported but most yields tinued favorable.

> Dr. Cox said, "and then make their way to the intestines in the same manner in which food does. When they reach the intestines they find conditions favorable to their growth, and there they establish themselves at the expense of the person infected and produce their harmful effects.'

> Dr. Cox warned that dysentery affects young children more often and more seriously than adults, frequently resulting fatally; however, he said it may occur at any age. It is usually more prevalent during the summer season, and the great number of cases now being reported

> "The germ is always expelled with the excreta of persons sick discharge the germs after they recover are called carriers, and they occur more frequently in this disease than in the majority of other infectious diseases.

> "Food protection and adequate sanitary measures are more ur gently needed now than ever before if we control the potential possibilities of epidemic dysentery in this State."




