THE MAIL BROUGHT us a recipe for Peach Bavarian Pie, and it sounds super. It probably came from Mr. Roy Huffmyer and it follows:

Chocolate Crumb Crust — 1 1/4 cups chocolate cracker crumbs, one third cup melted margarine. Crush crackers to fine crumbs with a rolling pin. Stir in melted margarine. Press evenly in a greased 9-inch pie pan covering bottom and sides. Chill thoroughly before adding filling.

Peach filling — Take 1 cup sugar, 1 teaspoon grated lemon rind, 1 tablespoon gelatin, 1/4 cup cold water, 1/2 cup boiling water, 3 tablespoons lemon juice, 1 cup crushed peaches, 1 teaspoon almond or vanilla extract, one-eighth teaspoon salt, 2 egg whites, 1/2 cup heavy cream, whipped.

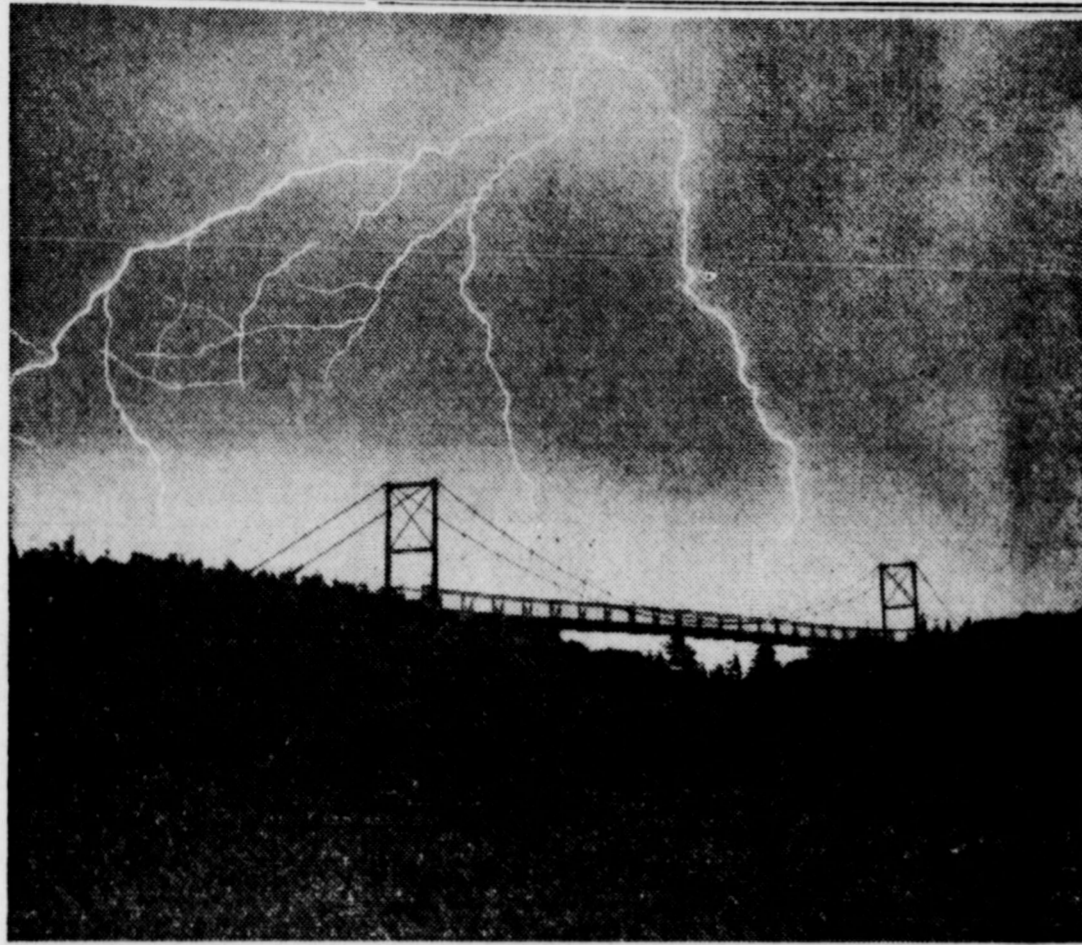
Combine sugar and lemon rind. Soak gelatin in cold water, add boiling water and dissolve. Stir in sugar until dissolved. Combine lemon juice, peaches and extract. Add to gelatin mixture and chill slightly. Beat with a rotary beater until light and fluffy. Add salt to egg whites and beat until stiff. Fold gently into peach mixture. Fold in whipped cream. Pour into crust. Chill at least 4 hours. Yield is 8 to 8 servings.

Control Program For Cotton Will Be Given Study

Cotton acreage under crop control allotments for most West Texas counties will be increased if a three-year average on cotton acres in cultivation is substituted for the present formula which is based on a five-year average.

Hearings were due to start in Washington before congressional committees during this week on House Bill 5655 and Senate Bill 2106, which propose the substitution of the present formula for the five-year average.

The county commissioners' court may not use funds from the General Fund Hospital Reserve Account to build an addition to the county hospital.

A court-appointed defense attorney should be paid \$40 for defending four separate felony causes against the same defendant on the same day.

THE LAW now provides that allotments be based on an average acreage of five crop years — 1947, 1948, 1950, 1951 and 1952. The year of 1949 was specifically omitted.

The new proposal would change the basis to the three years of 1951, 1952 and 1953.

West Texas as a whole would gain 685,990 acres for 1954 if the new formula is approved by Congress. The WTCC urges every grower to give his Congressman his opinion of the more desirable formula.

Eastland County would be allotted 5,700 acres on the proposed three-year basis and 3,600 on the present five-year basis.

PEANUT FERTILIZER PROJECT IS PLANNED FRIDAY AT STARR FARM

Eastland County farmers are being invited to attend a demonstration of applying Anhydrous Ammonia fertilizer to peanuts on the W. B. Starr farm on Friday, July 3, beginning at 1:30 o'clock, according to an announcement today at the County Agent's office in Eastland.

Although it has been tried under small grains the new material has not been applied under peanuts, one of the major crops of the county.

An Eastland implement dealer is cooperating in putting on the demonstration. A dealer from Abilene will bring the equipment to apply the material.

The new material is about 82 percent nitrogen. A ton of it has 1,640 pounds of available

Area Youth Wins A&M Scholarship

COLLEGE STATION, June 30.—Eighty-one top high school graduates of this year have been named winners of four-year Opportunity Award scholarships at Texas A. and M. College, it was announced here today by E. E. McQuillen, executive director of the Texas A. and M. Development Fund. Winners were chosen by the Faculty Committee on Scholarships of the college through a statewide contest participated in by 356 candidates.

The Opportunity Awards are valued from \$800 to \$1600, recipients receiving \$200 to \$400 each year for four years, plus employment provided by the college. Winners were chosen after careful consideration of each candidate's character, scholastic record, evidence of leadership and financial circumstances. The plan was started eight years ago by former students of the college and is further supported by clubs, business corporations, foundations and individuals.

The 1953 winners include Johnnie Lee Dye, Route 3, Cisco.

Americans Are Marrying Early, Survey Shows

Americans are marrying earlier in life, and as a result the proportion of the married among young people is the highest on record, life insurance company statisticians report.

According to the most recent data available, nearly 17 percent of all girls at ages 15 to 19 are married now or have been married, as compared with only 12 percent in 1940. At ages 20 to 24 the current ever-married proportion is 69 per cent as compared with 53 percent in 1940.

For males the trend to early marriages is equally marked. Currently almost half of the men at ages 20 to 24 are or have been married, as compared with only 28 per cent in 1940.

Even in the older age groups, the statisticians point out, the married constitute a notably larger proportion of the population than was the case prior to World War II. This is associated with a marked increase in the marriage rate during and immediately after the war.

The war-time and post-war marriage boom also occurred in several of the nations of the British Commonwealth — England and Wales, Scotland, Australia, and New Zealand. Similarly, an appreciable increase in the proportion married at the younger ages occurred in Ireland, Sweden, and Norway, where relatively late marriages long has been common.

In France and Germany, where large numbers of young men were out of the country during the war, the experience ran counter to the general trend, and the proportion of married young women was lower after the war than before. In Germany the shortage of marriageable men was accentuated by heavy casualties.

The prospects of early marriage are brighter in the United States than in any of the other Western countries for which data are available, observe the statisticians. Among the factors stimulating early marriage in this country are favorable economic conditions, and the relative freedom with which boys and girls mix socially.

Long Heat Wave Is Ended Monday In This Region

A general rain that measured from one and a half inches to more than four inches over this area Monday night brightened the farm and ranch outlook, raised the water level at Lake Cisco some 24 inches, and brought cooler weather to a region that had gone through some 21 days of 100-plus temperatures.

A survey showed that all of Eastland County received rainfall in varying amounts. Calahan, Stephens and Shackelford Counties also benefited from the regional rainfall.

In Cisco, the city hall rain gauge registered 2.2 inches. At Lake Cisco, the rain gauge caught 2.6 inches. City Water Superintendent John Rodden reported that Lake Cisco had gained 24 inches of new water by noon today, and Lake Bernie had registered a similar gain.

Elsewhere in the area, the Scranton community received about 4.5 inches of rain. Pioneer received 4 inches, Nimrod over 2 inches, Baird 3.5 inches, Putnam from 2.7 inches, Eastland 1.32 inches and Rising Star got about one inch. Moran reported a good rain.

County Agent J. M. Cooper predicted that considerable peanut and feed planting would result from the rain. He estimated that some 25 per cent of the allotted peanut acreage remains to be planted, and considerable land will be planted in feeds.

The rain, Mr. Cooper added, will do much for range pastures, and stock tanks are in excellent condition.

Water Superintendent Rodden reported that Lake Cisco now contains some 14 inches more water than it did on July 1, 1952, and is two or three inches higher than it was after catching some six feet last month.

Mayor G. C. Rosenthal estimated that the new water would be sufficient to carry the city through July and August with conservative use. He suggested that "we should continue to practice conservation."

Clouds moved into this area Monday morning and light intermittent rain fell during the day. Monday temperatures were in the high 80's — the first day in some three weeks when the temperature did not exceed 100 degrees.

The rain began falling in a steady downpour about 1:30 a. m. Tuesday and continued until after daylight. Forecasts called for mostly cloudy and probably showers for Tuesday afternoon and night.
