Approximately 150 persons attended the area meeting of Alcoholics Anoymous recently in Breckenridge when H. T. Box of Dallas was speaker for the occas-

Twelve surrounding towns and cities were represented, the great majority of those present being members of the organization, the visitors including a few ministers from other places.

Delegations present represented Abilene, Coleman, Brownwood, Dallas, Ballinger, Strawn, Eastland, Ranger, Cisco, Mineral Wells and Throckmorton, besides Breckenridge.

The address of Box was preceded by the reading of preamble that set forth among other things, that the organization has no dues, nothing to sell and consists of people who have attempted to overcome their problems unsuccessfully through other means and find Alcoholics Anonymous a necessity. But there is nothing in the philosophy of living that conflicts with any other individual, or group.

Box described himself as an AA living in sobriety one day at time on a probation basis. There is no seniority in AA, he said, adding that he is one prayer and one drink away from a drunk. (AA speakers only talk about their own experiences).

He told how for a number of ears he has lived in sobriety, fter years of drinking during which he lost his job, his wife, his self respect, and lived in befuddled state, later to regain all including his job, and his wife, and had joined the Methodist "because my parents Church, were Methodists."

value of sericea, according to Maurer of the Soil Con servation Service. The dry summers of 1951 and 1952 emphasized its value for both hay and graz-

More than 1½ million acres have been seeded. Much of this land had been abandoned as crop land because of poor yields. When seeded to sericea, not only has soil erosion been stopped but the land has become a decided asset to the man who has cattle to feed.

Sericea's resistance to drought is due to its deep root system. Such a deep root system cannot be maintained by close mowing or grazing year after year. Like other perennials with deep roots ist be permitted to make a full top growth every few

To get the sericea back in made just before growth starts in the spring. This will increase the quality of the hay or grazing and the quantity of seed per acre. Five hundred to 1,000 pounds of an 0-12-12 or similar fertilizer is a good application. Like any other crop, sericea

Preparing for and Sowing Sericea

Start seedbed preparation two to three months ahead of seeding date.

2. Seed on time—usually about three weeks ahead of early corn planting season 3. Sow 20-30 pounds of recleaned and scarified seed per acre on a well prepared

4. Fertilize with 600 to 800 pounds of 0-14-10 or 0-12-12 on land that is fairly free from summer weeds.

5. Use method of seeding which will give the most even distribution of the seed A grain drill with a fine-seed box, a cultipacker seeder, or a cyclone seeder can be adjusted to do a good job.

If all the acreage of sericea that is contemplated at this time is seeded next spring, it will take a lot of seed. 


