In the Mothers March, teams of workers will cover all residential streets. Those who wish to contribute to the polio campaign will turn on their porch lights, and workers will stop to accept the donation where-ever they see a porch light burning.

Horace Cornelius Henderson, 61, former Cisco business, civic and church leader, died at 4 a. m. Sunday in a Ranger hospital following a long illness. Mr. Henderson moved to Ranger 10 years ago from Cisco to take over management of the C. D. Hartnett Wholesale Grocery Company warehouse.

Funeral services were held at 10 a. m. Monday at the Ranger First Methodist Church where he was member of the Board of Stewards. The services were conducted by the Rev. Garland Lavender, pastor of the First Methodist Church in Weatherford, former pastor of the Ranger church. He was assisted by the Rev. Finis Crutchfield, pastor of the Ranger First Methodist Church.

Following the rites in Ranger, burial was in Oakwood Cemetery in Cisco. The Rev. Leslie Seymour, superintendent of the Cisco District of Methodist Churches, assisted in the rites at the graveside. The arrangements were in charge of Killingsworth Funeral Home in Ranger. Thomas Funeral Home in Cisco assisted with the rites here.

Mr. Henderson was born in Georgia on July 10, 1892. In 1910 he was married to Miss Hattie B. Sisk. In 1923 they moved to Cisco from Commerce. They lived in Cisco until 1943 when he was transferred to Ranger by his firm. While in Cisco Mr. Henderson served as city commissioner for several years and was active in church and civic affairs. He was a member of the Cisco Masonic Lodge and the Oddfellows Lodge here.

In Ranger he was a member of the Chamber of Commerce and the Rotary Club and was past president of both organizations. He was a member of the board of regents of Ranger Junior College, a member of the board of stewards of the First Methodist Church and on the property board of Methodist Churches. He was active in the affairs of the young people of Ranger and the area.

He is survived by his wife of Ranger; two sons, E. K. Henderson of Eastland and Leon Henderson of Albuquerque, New Mexico; a daughter, Mrs. H. L. Binion of San Angelo; his mother, Mrs. H. M. Henderson of Plainview; three brothers, Clyde Henderson of Oklahoma City; F. A. Henderson of San Angelo and H. L. Henderson of Amarillo; three sisters, Mrs. Jack Barton of Plainview, Mrs. G. R. Evans of Slaton and Mrs. N. R. Northcutt of San Angelo and four grandchildren.

CJC BASKETBALL TEAMS SCORE 3 VICTORIES IN WEEKEND TILTS

The Cisco Junior College Wranglers and Wranglerettes made a clean sweep in three basketball games played Saturday and Monday nights at the community gym.

Saturday night the Wranglerettes outplayed the Tandy Motorettes of Fort Worth by a 54-44 score. The Motorettes, one of the top teams in the Texas A. U. circle, were outclassed by the snappy Cisco girls, who had command of the situation all the way.

Cookie Barron led the way for the Wranglerettes when she netted seven field goals and six gratis shots for 20 points to sack up scoring honors for the game. It was her long shots that were most effective. Latrelle Riddle was in second place when she made 18 points for Cisco. Edwards was high for Fort Worth with 17 points.

Jim Birch, who usually leads the way for the Cisco team, was off in the shooting department Saturday night and failed to make a field goal attempt. She sank five free tosses. Mary Ann Gardner, a new recruit for the Wranglerettes, played an outstanding game and made nine of the Cisco points. She came to the college from Morgan.

The work of the guards was outstanding. They kept the usually high scoring Motorettes in check for most of the game. Barbara Illinsworth, Hallye Johnson and Joyce Edminston were the outstanding players in the guard posts.

Monday night the Wranglerettes plastered a 43-18 defeat on the Howard Payne Jackettes. The Brownwood team was held to four field goals during the contest and made only 10 out of 27 free throw attempts.

Jim Birch led the Cisco girls in the scoring department and took scoring honors for the game with 14. Riddle and Garner made eight each. Barron accounted for only three points for the Wranglerettes.

Mary Jackson was high for Howard Payne with six and Mary Walton made five. The game Monday was the third one this season by the Cisco girls over the Brownwood team.

The Wranglerettes are one of the top girls teams in this area and have been invited to attend the A. A. U. Tournament in San Antonio in March. The tourney is open only to top teams in the state and is an invitation affair. The winner of that tournament is eligible to contend for national honors. Bill Pringle and Edd Farmer, members of the Wrangler squad, have most of the coaching responsibilities for the Wranglerettes.

In the last game Monday night the Wranglers won a conference thriller over Navarro County Junior College by a 67-70 score. The game was one of the best ever played at the community gym, with the lead changing hands at least a dozen times.

The Wranglers displayed a lot of hustle in downing their taller rivals and staged off a rally in the last three minutes to win their second conference contest in four starts. They have wins over Blinn and Navarro and have lost to Allen Academy and Decatur.

Coach Red Lewis' wrangler squad was strengthened this week by the addition of Bob Lloyd. The former Lobo cager became eligible at mid-term and showed up well in his first contest Monday night.

There were no individual stars Monday night. All team members played a hard, fast game. Stevens led in scoring with 20 points. The Lamesa recruit made eight field goals and four free tosses to take game honors. Clubb of Navarro was in second place with 18 points. Joe Murphy played a little over half the game and made 16 of the Wrangler points. Bud Miller and Lloyd were effective under the baskets and Ed Farmer, Ed Palmore and Don Carman played fine floor games.

The Wranglers play Goodfellow Air Force Base in San Angelo Saturday night and meet Blinn here Monday night.

Furniture Plant Is Formed Locally

Organization of a corporation to engage in custom and contemporary furniture manufacturing in Cisco was announced today as arrangements were completed for the new firm to open around Feb. 1. The new business is Thomas-Moore, Inc.

Oliver Moore, retired employee of the Humble Pipe Line Company here, is president of the corporation and will be the plant manager. Other officers are Harry Moore, veteran employee at Humble Pipe Line Company, vice-president, and G. R. (Pete) Nance, secretary and treasurer.

The firm's board of directors is composed of the three above named officers and Raymond Thomas, Ralph Glenn, Nick Miller and James P. McCracken.

Raymond Thomas, who is the son of Oliver Thomas, grew up in Cisco, attended local schools and is a graduate of the school of architecture at the University of Texas. He is now associated with an architecture firm in Fort Worth and is due to complete his apprenticeship in August. He will design contemporary furniture for the concern.

The company will open its plant in half of the downstairs of the old Denslow Hotel Building on Avenue D.

Mr. Thomas said the company was organized at a meeting of some 15 stockholders last Friday night. The firm was incorporated for \$7,500 and the full amount has been subscribed, he said. The stockholders elected the directors, and the directors elected the officers.

Thomas-Moore, Inc., will take over a small factory at Bridgeport and move its facilities to Cisco about Feb. 1. The factory has a number of contracts underway. In addition to furniture manufacturing, the plant will be completely equipped to do all kinds of cabinet work, Mr. Thomas said.

The firm is bringing M. H. Oliver of Bridgeport to Cisco to be the shop foreman. Mr. and Mrs. Oliver, who expect to move here in the near future, have five daughters. Other labor will be hired locally as needed Mr. Thomas said.

Mr. Thomas has lived in Cisco since 1925 when he was transferred here by the Humble company. He was a mechanical supervisor for the company when he retired in November, 1952.

Mr. Moore, who is construction foreman for Humble here, has lived in Cisco for more than 20 years and he is scheduled to retire next year. Both men are well known in Cisco.

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Before You Trade!

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HEMEROCALLIS

Hemero callis, commonly called Daylilies, is a Greek word "hemero callis" which means "beautiful for a day."

Daylily not a bulb but an herbaceous perennial. Daylilies are over 400 years old were among the first flowers brought to America from Asia where it grows wild.

In 1900 there were only 8 varieties -- now thousands. There are many hybridizers here and abroad. Mr. Russell, Russell's Gardens, Spring, Texas, is at the top. His "Painted Lady" was No. 1 on the National Poll three consecutive years.

Planting Time: may be planted any time but late September and October are best for this area.

Location: may be planted in sun or partial shade. Morning sun or sifted sunlight are best here. They may be planted in groups, masses or used as accents. They are nice in the perennial borders, in "bays" of shrub plantings to hide bare places at the base of old shrubs, or naturalize. They like to grow around pools, with their toes wet but no water over their crowns.

Keep in mind that blooms face strongest light, sun or reflected light. The New Hybrids do not "take the place."

Soil: Any garden soil, lots of humus and work deep -- 2 feet. Work in barnyard fertilizer or 1 tablespoon commercial fertilizer per plant. Plant 18 inches to 3 ft. apart. Allow room to spread. Will hold over with shrubs. Do not cover crown more than 1 inch. Will stand 15 to 20 degrees below zero. Best to plant in groups of 3 to 5. Own foliage sufficient winter mulch.

Transplanting: When clump becomes so thick it doesn't bloom well (3-15 yrs.) dig carefully and cut drastically, dividing into small new sections of 1, 2 or 3 crowns. Whole clump may be moved anytime with ball of soil -- water well.

In spring, feed but never overdo: use well rotted barnyard fertilizer, compost or 1 Table-spoon commercial fertilizer worked in around plant, or 1/4 cup commercial fertilizer to 1 gallon of water (1 cup solution per plant). Also like potash, sifted ashes. Every two years, feed superphosphate 4 lbs. per 100 sq. feet. Mulch loosely for summer. Water when dry.

Foliage: Some evergreen, some deciduous. Dead foliage in winter does not mean dead plant. Foliage looks nice anywhere.

Flowers: star-shaped, spider-shaped, funnel-shaped. Freesia flowering to true lily forms. Some reflexed, some curved; Petals twisted, frilled, fluted. May be double or single. Size 1 inch to 8 inches.

Colors: palest lemons and creams to orange, apricot bronze, rust, orchid, buffs, purples, wines, mahoganies, "pinks", "reds." Brilliant, Pastels.

Remember to plant reds and dark colors apart. For contrast, try reds to pale lemons and purples with golds.

Blooming Habits: Plant first establish selves. Do not judge until second or third year. Different varieties bloom at different times. Some bloom twice a year, some are nearly everblooming. Some of the newer varieties stay open in the evenings. Some stay open two days. There are some which stay open in the house at night. One can make a selection of varieties so that you will have a succession of bloom from April until frost. Remove withered flowers daily.

To Hybridize: Get H. Fulva "Rosaland" and cross with good variety. Plant hardy Amaryllis among clumps. (Lycoris Squamigera, pink) Blooms late summer without foliage.

Early Bloomers: Flava, Dr. Regel, Earlianna, Judge Orr, Baronet, Gold Dust, Duncan, Midden-dorff.

Mid-Season: Hyperion, J. Crawford, Florham, Painted Lady, Potentate, Debutante, Vespers, Flamboyant.

Late: August Pioneer, Gypsy, Mrs. W. H. Wyman, Dorothy McDade, August Orange, Sunny West, Hankow, Chengtu, White (Autumn Prince) Lady, Boutton-niere, Pink Charm.

That legume bacteria are of different kinds has been known for a long time. Those that work on alfalfa and sweetclover will not function on the clovers or on peas, beans, soybeans, and other legumes. Conversely, the clover organisms fail to work on alfalfa and sweetclover.

Not all agricultural soils contain the bacteria necessary to promote legume growth. Too often it is taken for granted that special inoculation is not necessary, because a legume has been grown in the same soil. Furthermore, many of the legume bacteria naturally present in cultivated soils are not high nitrogen-fixing strains. In Kansas, 217 strains of alfalfa and sweet-clover bacteria were isolated from nodules growing on these plants within a restricted area. When these strains were tested on alfalfa plants, 27% fixed a high amount of nitrogen, 21% fixed a small amount of nitrogen, and 52% fixed in-between amounts of nitrogen.

Selected strains of legume bacteria can increase the yield or protein content of legumes as much as 20% on the average, more than the natural legume bacteria in the soil. Bacteria should function normally if the chemical reaction of the soil is suitable, if sufficient moisture and plant food are available, and if temperatures are not too high. Acid soils tend to eliminate bacteria in proportion to the degree of acidity. Bacteria of alfalfa, sweetclover and red clover are among those not acid-tolerant.

Unless it is known that the soil already contains the right kind of bacteria of a highly effective strain, artificial inoculation should always be used when sowing legume seed. "When in doubt, inoculate." Never be induced to use the obsolete soil-transfer method of inoculation. Tests made by Erdman and others have shown that a high percentage of commercial legume cultures on the market today, put out by well-known concerns, and used according to instructions, can be depended upon to produce satisfactory results.

Selected strains of legume bacteria can increase the yield or protein content of legumes as much as 20% on the average, more than the natural legume bacteria in the soil. Bacteria should function normally if the chemical reaction of the soil is suitable, if sufficient moisture and plant food are available, and if temperatures are not too high. 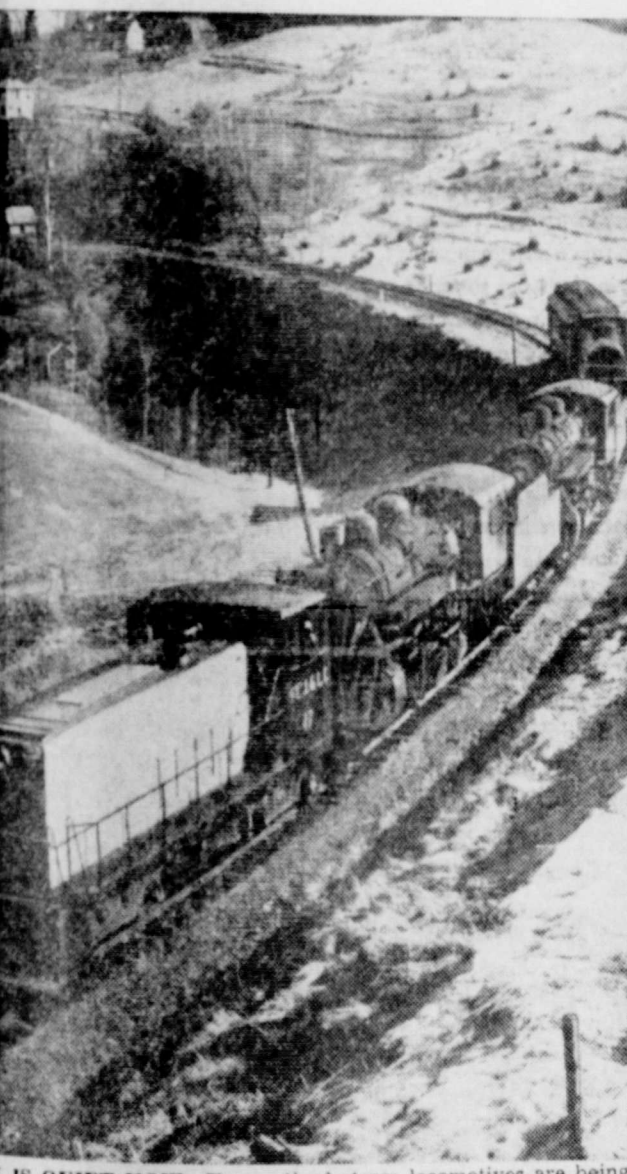

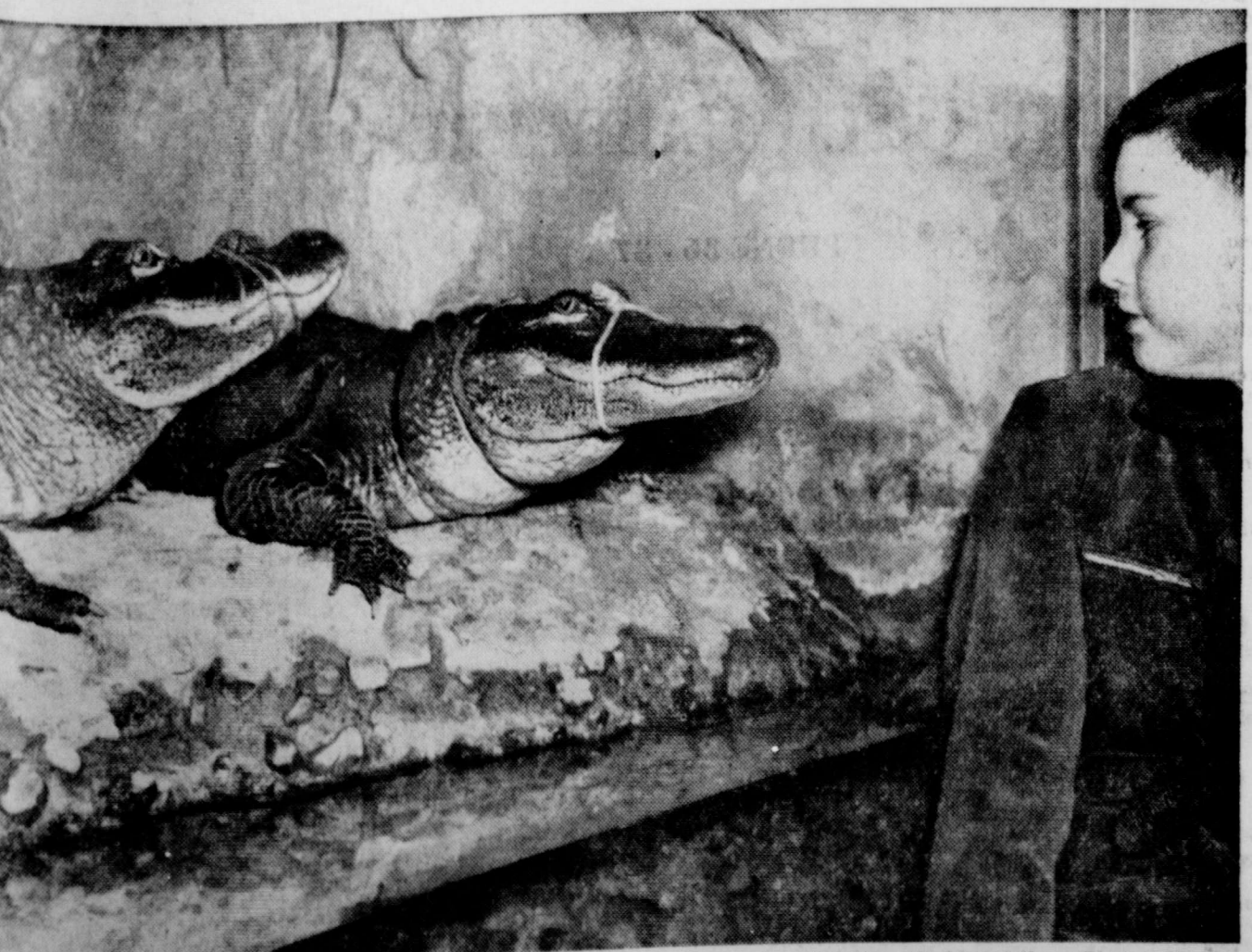

No written tests are required. Applicants must have had appropriate education, experience, or a combination of education and experience. The maximum age limit for nurse anesthetist positions on the lithiumus of Panama is 35 years, in the States, 42 years. There are no maximum age limits for the other positions.
