The school week program got off to a good start at the high school Monday night. Let's all take part in the special program.


CHEER MAGAZINE, put out by a paper company, reports:

The Central Texas Division, of which the Cisco district is a part, has won the safe driving award of the Halliburton Oil Well Cementing Company for the second consecutive year, it was reported here today.

A large trophy is to be presented to the division at a banquet in Abilene's Wooten Hotel at 7 p. m. Tuesday (tonight). Expected to attend from Cisco were Mr. and Mrs. Mike Cunningham and Mr. and Mrs. Frank Jackson.

L. B. Meaders, president of the company, and other officials were expected to be present, along with district superintendents and fieldmen from Abilene, Albany, Anson, Cisco, Coleman, Silver, Rule, San Angelo, Snyder and Winters.

The Central Texas division won this year by having the lowest accident frequency for driving. The frequency for the past year was 0.15 accidents per 100,000 miles of driving. Last year, the division won with a frequency of 0.22 accidents.

During the past year, Halliburton personnel in the division drove 4,548,800 miles with only seven accidents, with no fatalities. The company has some 250 vehicles operating in the division. Each district in the Central Division holds a monthly safety meeting. The program is carried on by Fred Nussbaumer and Joe Tillman, both assistant division managers at Abilene.

## Motorists Are Complimented In Inspection Work

AUSTIN, March 1. — If Texas motorists continue getting their autos inspected at the same rate that they are currently, there will be no chance of a "log jam" at the inspection stations prior to the April 15th deadline.

That was the opinion today of Homer Garrison, Jr., Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, who complimented the 65% of Texas car owners who have already had their vehicles checked for mechanical defects. At the same time, he passed on a repeated word of warning to nearly a million other motorists who have neglected, thus far, to meet the requirements of the State's motor vehicle inspection law by reminding that approved stickers must be on cars after April 15th or the owners will face court action.

George W. Busby, Chief of the Safety Department's Motor Inspection Division, announced that inspections are now being conducted at the rate of 150,000 weekly and that no stations are experiencing a capacity business.

"In the six weeks remaining before the inspection deadline," Busby said, "the licensed stations will be fully capable of taking care of every vehicle in the State remaining to be checked without undue waiting or inconvenience unless too many folks put off having their autos inspected until the last minute."

She received critical injuries in an automobile accident some three miles this side of Breckenridge last week.

## Fruit Trees Due To Suffer Damage

The third norther in two days was expected to drop the temperatures to about 20 degrees Tuesday night in this West Central Texas region, the weather man said today in a cold wave warning. Temperatures were in the middle 40s at noon.

Little or no moisture was expected to reach this far south, the weather man said. Between two and four inches of snow blanketed the Panhandle and South Plains country Monday night. The forecast called for cloudy and windy weather in this section. Temperatures will be from 14 to 24 degrees, most likely around 20, the forecast said.

Wednesday is due to be cold and windy with the high around 40 degrees.

Fruit trees, many of which are already in bloom, oat crops and early gardens are expected to be considerably damaged by the freeze. Peach, pear and other fruit trees have been in bloom here for more than a week.

The cold weather was not expected to damage wheat and other grain crops. PMA Administrator Emmett reported that his office has been measuring wheat acreage for the past week. New cotton allotment acreage notices were due to be in the mails this week.

The land preparation program in the county was described as behind the normal schedule due to the dry weather. Virtually no rain fell during the month of February. The weather man's five-day forecast saw no moisture in prospect.

## Time Is Near To Pay Your Income Tax For Last Year

Less than three weeks remain to prepare your Federal income tax return and pay it to your district director of Internal Revenue. That was the word today from Ellis Campbell, Jr., director of the Dallas revenue district. He urged taxpayers of the Dallas District to get to work at once on their returns if they have not already begun such action.

A necessary preliminary to preparing a correct and proper return, Mr. Campbell said, is complete records of an individual's or business' financial operation during 1953. With these in hand, he pointed out, preparation of the tax form should not be too difficult a task.

The local office will be able to furnish information over the telephone where questions of taxpayers do not involve complex problems. Personal taxpayer assistance where matters of extensive security or property holdings are not involved may be obtained at the local office, but Mr. Campbell urged all taxpayers with complicated financial statements to obtain the services of qualified tax consultants in preparing more difficult forms.

Two benefits follow early filing and payment of income taxes, Mr. Campbell stressed. One is avoidance of last minute crowds, the other is the greater certainty of an accurate return. In addition, he said, taxpayers who prepare their returns now may still find out that they are due refunds from the government and are in a better position to substantiate the fact than if they wait until the last minute and are compelled to offer incomplete proof.

The district director emphasized that taxes should be paid by check or money order and not by cash. The revenue office prefers that they be sent by mail, and again pointed out that there is no necessity for taxpayers to bring their payments in person. The office to which payments should be sent by taxpayers of this district is 2101 Pacific Ave., Dallas, Texas.

## Wranglers Drop Tourney Opener To San Antonio

The Cisco Junior College Wranglers, winners of second place in the Texas Junior College Conference basketball race, were eliminated in the first rounds of the state junior college tournament in College Station Monday afternoon by San Antonio Junior College by a 78-59 score.

The San Antonio school, one of the strongest in the state, was to meet Frank Phillips Junior College of Borger in a semi-finals match Tuesday morning. In the game Monday afternoon Cisco jumped into a 5-0 lead early in the game, but San Antonio went to work and forged ahead 25-14 at the end of the first period. They were leading 43-30 at the half and 63-43 at the end of the third quarter.

Burnell Stevens of the Wranglers was high point player for the game with 23. He sank six field goals and 11 of 13 free throws to take game honors. Jerry Meyers, 5-3" forward of San Antonio, was in second place with 22 on nine field goals and four gratis shots.

Joe Murphy of Cisco made 11 and Edd Farmer made 10. The Wranglers missed 14 free throw attempts.

The game Monday wound up the season for the Wranglers. They were awarded second place in the conference when Decatur Baptist College was forced to forfeit all their games this season for playing an ineligible man. Decatur and Cisco had closed the season in a tie.

Decatur's games were thrown out Saturday when the conference committee met in Waco to act on a protest. It was charged that J. M. Reich, star Decatur guard, was ineligible on at least two counts. It was brought out that he had played at North Texas State in 1948 and that he had played at Texas Wesleyan in 1949 and 1950. It was also brought out that he had not completed sufficient hours to be eligible in the conference.

It was reported that Decatur officials would seek entrance in another junior college group next season. The school dropped last season and concentrates on basketball. It was believed that they would seek to play with other schools who also have dropped football.



Spading is essential to good soil conditioning. Outdoor planting can begin in your garden as soon as the soil has thawed out and dried sufficiently to work. If your soil is stiff, hard to spade and cultivate, slow to allow water to drain through it, every spring something should be added to make it more porous.
