

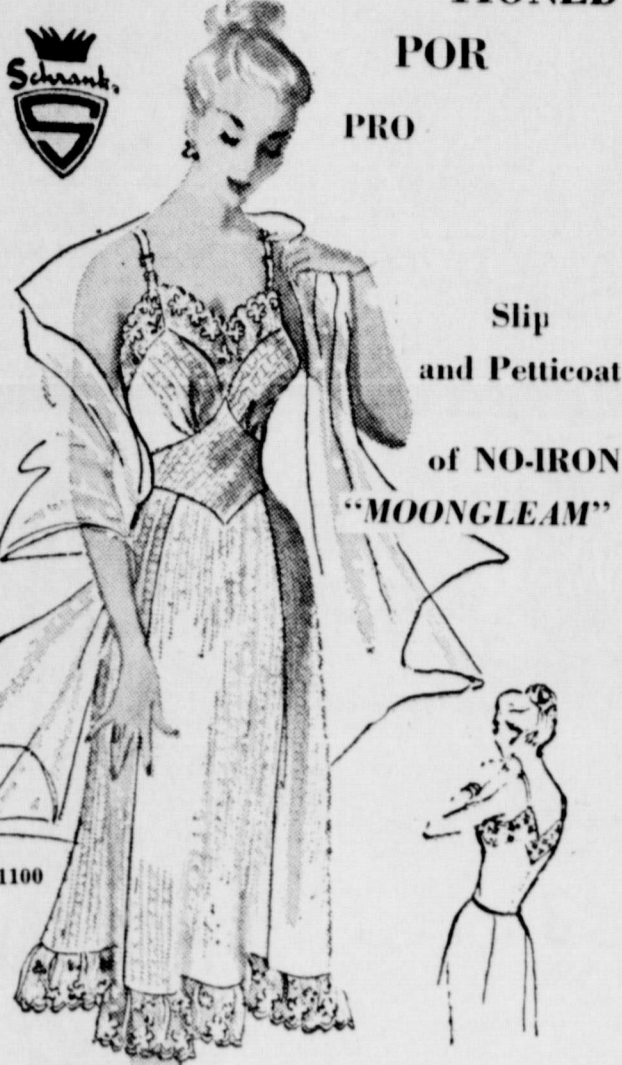

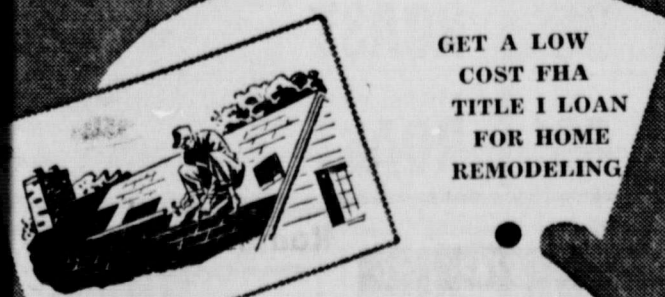

IT'S THE LAW in Texas

A public service bureau of the State Bar of Texas

Self-evident is the fact that all citizens are in need of the services of an attorney at various times. Some citizens are not able, due to circumstances beyond their control, to properly compensate such services.

Texas lawyers, recognizing this need, have formed Legal Aid Clinics in several of the larger cities of the state. In a number of towns too small to support a clinic, a Legal Aid Committee has been formed. Its members are attorneys furnishing necessary legal services to the indigent. In other towns, legal aid services are provided by each private practitioner as worthy cases are brought to his attention.

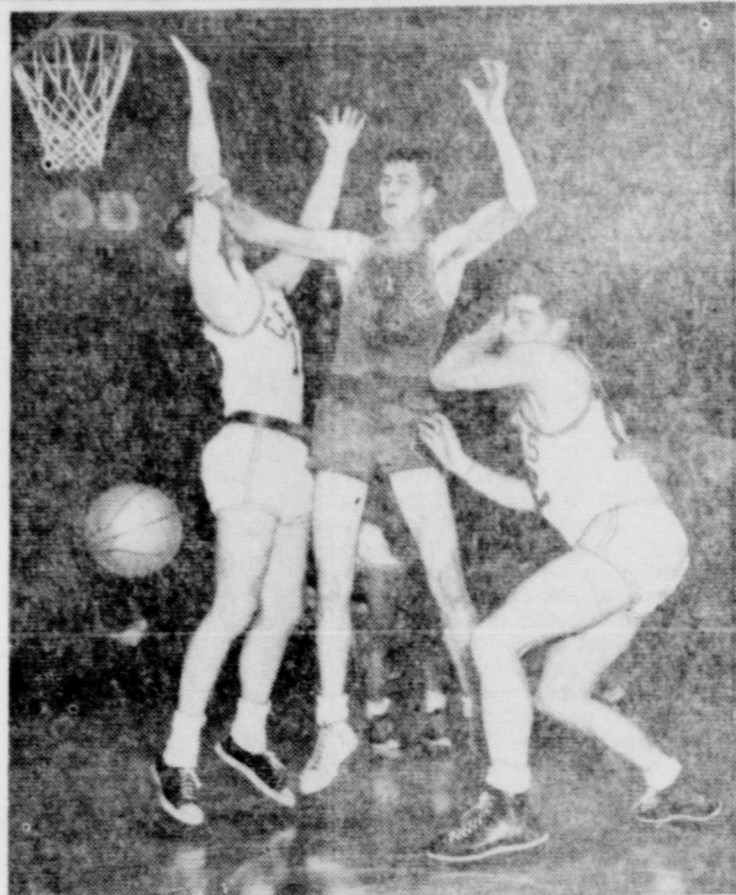
The Legal Aid attorney performs a vital function in our social order. To understand his role, we must begin with the basic fact that a legal aid client does not seek charity. The late Associate Justice Wiley B. Rutledge of the U. S. Supreme Court once said: "Equality before the law in a true democracy is a matter of right. It cannot be a matter of charity, or of favor, or of grace, or of discretion."

The legal aid client, therefore, is asking for what is his right — that he be given justice to which he is entitled under the law. His poverty prevents him from securing the legal assistance and advice needed for the protection of his rights.

In providing these professional services, the Legal Aid attorney serves the highest social obligation, that of securing justice to those who under the law should have it but who otherwise might not obtain it.

This function places special and serious obligation upon the Legal Aid attorney. In the first place, his duty is to accept the client who is financially unable to employ private counsel. He cannot reject a client for personal reasons or convenience or because the case may be difficult or uninteresting or disagreeable. To do so is to close the only door of justice and to defeat the very purpose for which the legal aid organization he represents was created.

Finally, a Legal Aid attorney must be more than a good lawyer. His daily work confronts him with more than legal problems. Innumerable problems of his clients submitted to him are of a personal nature and the legal problems are inevitably interwoven with financial, social and oftentimes domestic difficulties. He must have an insight into these difficulties and problems and know and make use of the social resources of his community available for their solution.

Washington

"As It Looks From Here"

OMAR BURLISON Congressman 17th District



WASHINGTON, D. C. — The Congress has passed and sent to the President the measure which will allow farmers and ranchers to legally employ Mexican Nationals to work on ranches and gather crops. Otherwise, Mexicans coming across the border would have done so illegally and be subject to deportation.

We were voting on this proposition at the time the shooting occurred in the House of Representatives. Of course, everyone has read about the incident or heard it on the radio.

To put it mildly, it was pretty exciting. The amazing thing about it all is that out of the twenty-four shots known to have been fired, only five Members of the Congress were hit. The worst part about it was that there was nothing to do but hope you were missed. At it happened, I was sitting just about in the center of the House Chamber and there was no escape.

The day following the shooting incident, the Governor of Puerto Rico, Luis Munoz Marin, and his wife flew to Washington from San Juan to express their regret and to visit the wounded.

It so happened that my wife, Ruth, was going to the home of Mrs. McGregor, wife of the Republican Congressman from Ohio, for luncheon on Wednesday of this week. Mrs. Clifford Davis of Tennessee, whose husband was one of the victims of the shooting, is a close friend of Ruth's, and she also was attending the luncheon. Since Mrs. Munoz Marin was to call on Mrs. Davis shortly before noon, it was suggested that the Governor's wife come along to the luncheon. Following lunch, Ruth and Mrs. Davis brought Mrs. Munoz Marin back to her hotel and had opportunity to know her better.

The situation in Puerto Rico, because of this small terrorist band, makes it necessary that the Governor and his wife remain under guard at all times. They were registered at the hotel here in Washington under an assumed name.

Many of you will recall that each year at about this time I have submitted a questionnaire to my constituents to determine the general feeling on issues on which I must vote here in the Congress. A great many of the questions on which I have asked your opinion remain current, since they were not determined in past Sessions.

The Congress is now up to the place where more voting will be done, since it necessarily requires considerable time for Committees to make their reports.

It has occurred to me that it may be a good time to submit a few questions each week in this column, and your response to them is invited.

For instance, at this time I would welcome your views on whether or not you favor the present support price on basic farm commodities at 90% of parity, or whether you believe the Administration is right in recommending the formula of flexible supports, the price to be determined by supply and demand.

The matter of increasing the Federal Debt limit above 275 billion dollars will also be up for a vote in the near future. I would like to have your opinions on this matter. As always, your views will be respected and appreciated.
