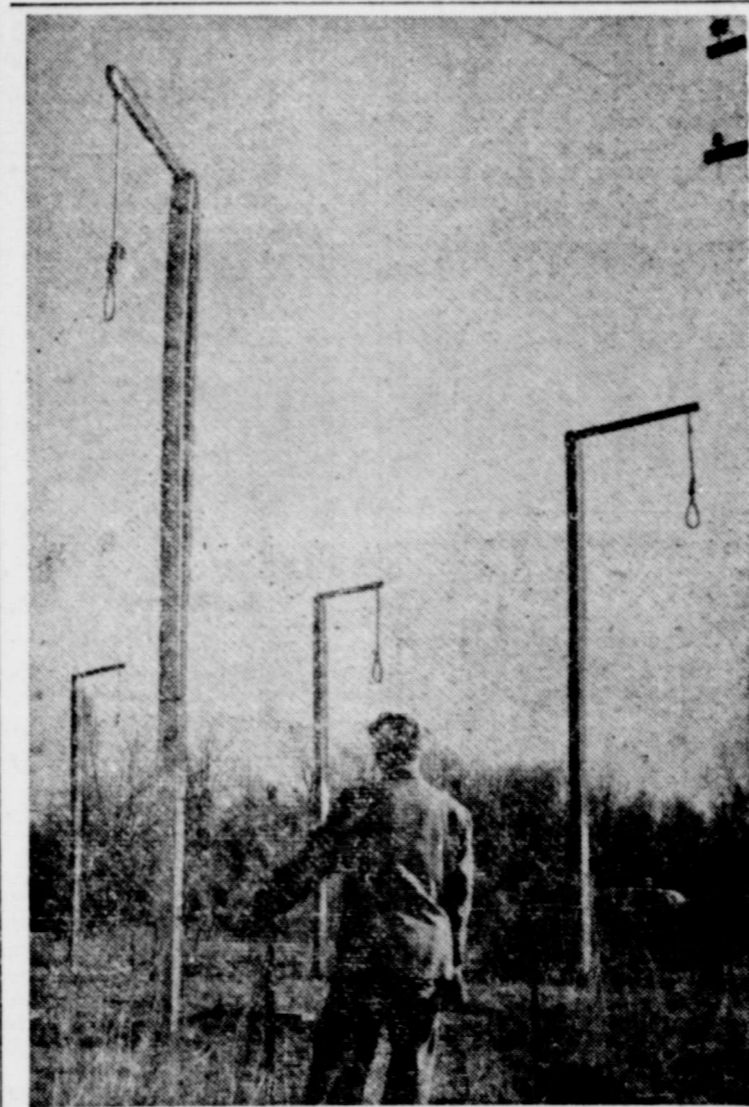

THE RIGHT TO WORK

The story of the fight for human freedom would fill endless volumes. A notable page recently was added in Texas.

Some time ago a small group of railroad workers sued for an injunction to prevent their employer and a union from signing a union shop contract, which would have prevented a man who didn't want to join from earning a living. Judge Nelson of the 108th District Court now has ruled that "Congress has no right to enact legislation making union membership a test of the right to work."

He said further, "That which denies a person the right to work denies to him his liberty, the pursuit of happiness, and life itself. There was a period of union busting and head busting and of 'yellow dog' contracts. That was wrong, but that time, thank God, has passed. But it is just as wrong now that unions should endeavor to compel men and women to join a union at the price of holding their jobs." How can anyone who believes in liberty refute that?

Dear Editor: Early this morning (Feb. 25) our small plane lifted off the runway at Darwin in the tropical far north of Australia, climbing over coarse bright green grass, and headed toward the interior cattle station of Wave hill, 400 miles to the south. As the plane climbed, the glistening deep blue water of Darwin harbor reflected the sun like a mirror and the buildings of the town of Darwin with its 4,000 carefree people lay lazily below. Flying south over very green grass land with scattered trees, with an occasional barren granite hill, we approached the Daly River, renowned for its peanut farms. In the intervening area, large uranium deposits have been discovered. For several miles we flew along the meandering Daly River with its tree covered river bottom flats. The streams, channels, and lakes of water made it nearly a mile wide. Leaving the Daly River the topography became more mountainous with a great green valley running through the rolling tree-covered pre-cambrian proterozoic mountains. In occasional exposures in the green tree and grass covered area, bedding planes in the rocks can be seen dipping at 60 degrees in huge cliffs. Flying on we came to flatter mesa-type country with light red soils and lots of trees; then the Victoria River, and into hilly grass country with scattered trees. The plane bumped to a stop on Victoria River Downs, which was the largest cattle station in world before subdivision. (13,000 square miles.) Flying south from Victoria River Downs, the green grass gradually gave way to parched and dry land where the drought was in its second year. Landing on the Wave Hill Cattle Station we saw drought at its worst. The soil is rich basalt

derived loam with basalt boulders scattered through it. The station is carrying 40,000 to 50,000 head of shorthorn cattle. In normal seasons the rich reddish brown soil produces an excellent crop of grasses. About one fourth of the 5,000 sq. mile area is fenced into pastures. Cattle water from the Victoria River and 14 water wells in the fenced pastures. We spent the night here at Wave Hill. There were wild parrots, and meals were served under a rope driven fan which the natives switched back and forth above the dining table.
