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Letters

Dear Editor: Supplementing certain information I wrote you on the 17th inst., relative to State expenditures, teachers' pay raise, etc., I give you some more statistical information which will fit in with that already given you.

Teacher benefits are further supplemented by State matching of their funds as follows: For 1952-53 the State contributed—\$25,707,012.08.

The Teacher Retirement Fund has \$164,000,000.00 on hand in bonds bearing rate up to 3 3/4%. They have \$4,000,000 cash on hand at this time. Of course this appears to be of little interest to the average teacher.

Those now on retirement basis number 4189 and they receive from \$9.71, lowest, to \$359.63, and the average figure for those retired is \$112.41. The total payments to those on retirement as of March 31, 1954, is \$470,914.59.

I point out to you that for the two-year period the sum mentioned in the first part of this reference is for 1952-53. The figure for 1954 which will have to be contributed by the State will amount to more than \$13,000,000. The proposed bill as agreed to by the "Committee of 25" sets a floor of \$51,800,000, which must be contributed by

local school districts and under this proposed bill this can never be lowered, and the proposal is to require contributions for the future on a 20-80 basis. This latter figure in a very few years will greatly increase the necessity for further taxation on various counties of our State, especially areas outside of large cities.

Of course it is a well-known fact that by provisions of the Gilmer-Aikin law, our local school boards have been practically stripped of their authority. Merit can be rewarded by a School Board on a merit basis, but in such reward a nice increase in salary will have to come from local tax and the State pays no part of it. The purpose of this apparently is to centralize as much authority in our Capitol City through the State Educational Agency as possible.

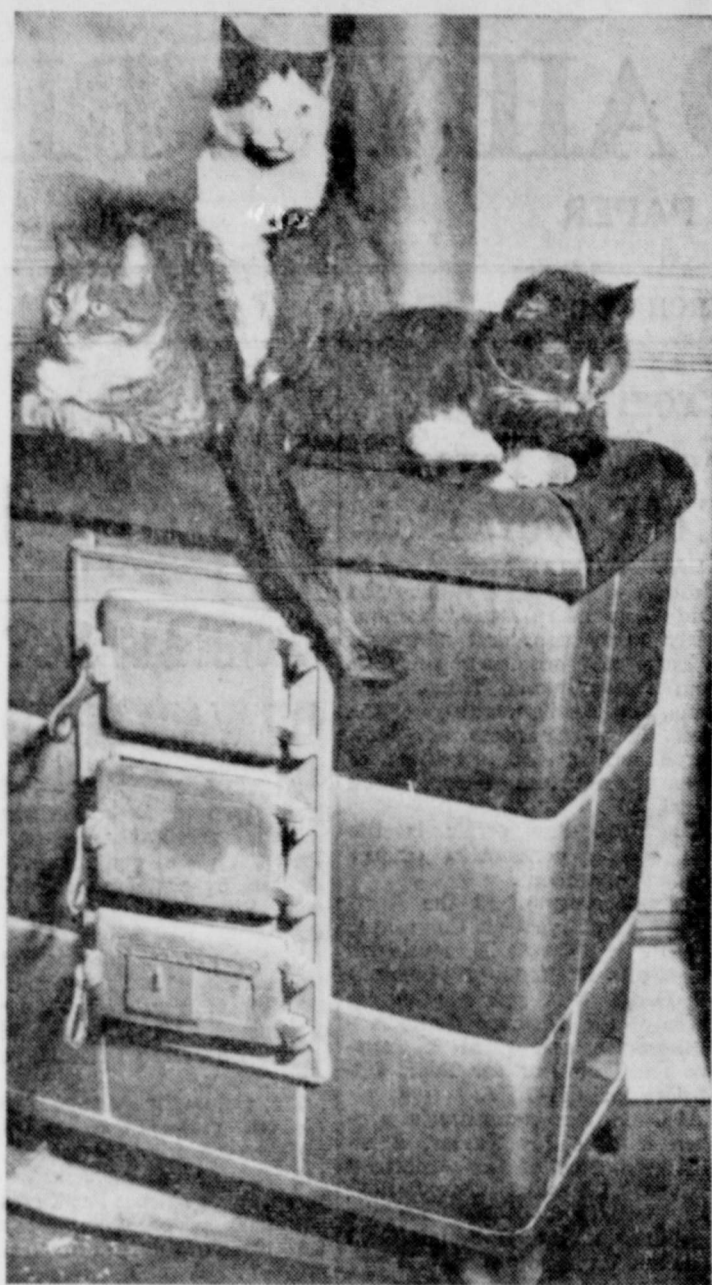
I think a better approach for benefitting the teacher is to set a minimum retirement figure. Looking to a provision on this matter, I have introduced a bill that sets a minimum of \$75.00 per month or as close to that figure as can be supported by actual figures. None of this money would come from additional taxation but from the teachers' own fund to which they have already contributed.

My stand on taxation remains the same. Of course my idea is that we should consider additional revenue only locally to take care of such matters as are necessary and not have a tax placed on us without our approval.

I hope you or any other citizen can pay us a visit during this called session and if so I will put forth every effort to help you with any matter in which you are interested.

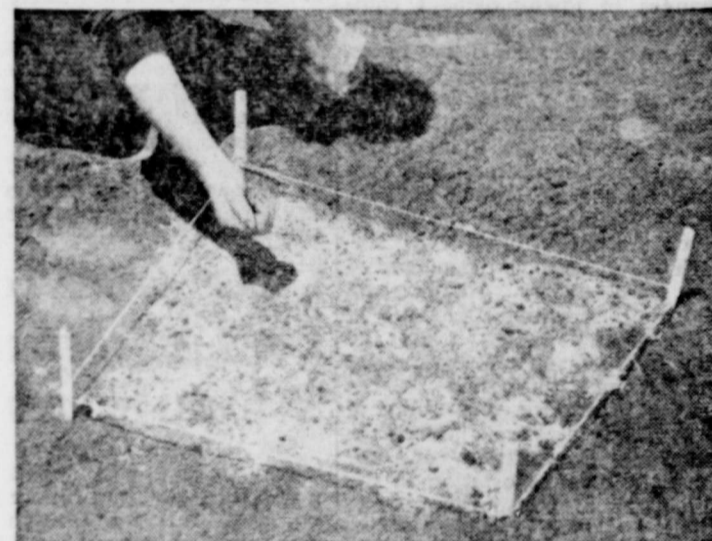
Thanks for printing the other letter. I have many letters commending my stand, — only one in opposition thereto.

Seven Steps to Success in Sowing Flower Seeds



Mix Seed With Sand, and Scatter Over Area as Evenly as Possible.

All annual flower seeds may be sown directly in the garden; and there are a number which should be, because they are difficult to transplant.

These include alyssum, California poppy, godetia, kochia, leptosyne, linaria, lupin, matthiola (evening scented stock), nasturtium, dwarf phlox, poppies, portulaca and salpiglossis.

Much the same technique should be used in the garden as in sowing in a seed box, particularly as to shallow planting, and covering the seeds with porous soil. Identification of the seeds, and of their location, are also important, since with slow germinators it is easy to forget exactly where they were sown.

Seeds are subject to many hazards which human skill cannot wholly avoid, but the careful operator may count upon a high average of success.

Prepare a smooth seed bed, loosening the soil to a depth of six inches. Work into it 4 pounds of plant food for each 100 square feet. Then outline with a string the area to be covered with each variety. Mix the seed with sand to help scatter it over the space as evenly as possible. Then sift a light covering of porous soil over the seed and firm it lightly.

Now, until the seeds sprout the soil must be kept moist; and this requires daily sprinkling with a fine spray, taking care not to wash the seeds out of the soil. You should know when to expect the seeds to sprout. The list shown is based upon experience in seed laboratories. In your garden the period may be more or

less by a few days, but it will serve as a guide.

- Sweet Alyssum, Antirrhinum (snap-dragon), Aster, English Daisy, Browallia, Mimulus, Nicotiana (sweet tobacco), Pansy, Petunia, Annual Phlox, Coreopsis, Mignonette, Schizanthus, Viola, Zinnia, Nasturtium.

Ten to Twenty Days.

- Ageratum, Cobaea, Scandens, Coleus, Primrose, Cypress Vine, Cardinal, Climber, Castor Bean, Scabiosa, Salpiglossis, Verbena.

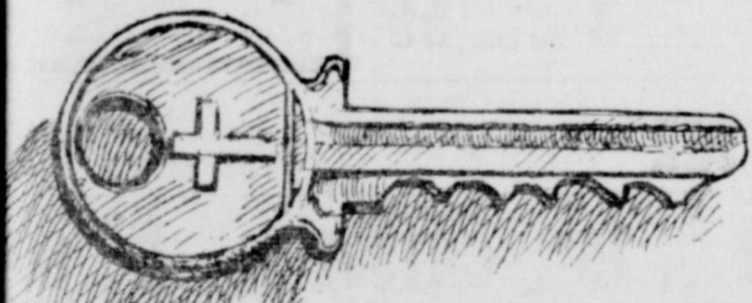

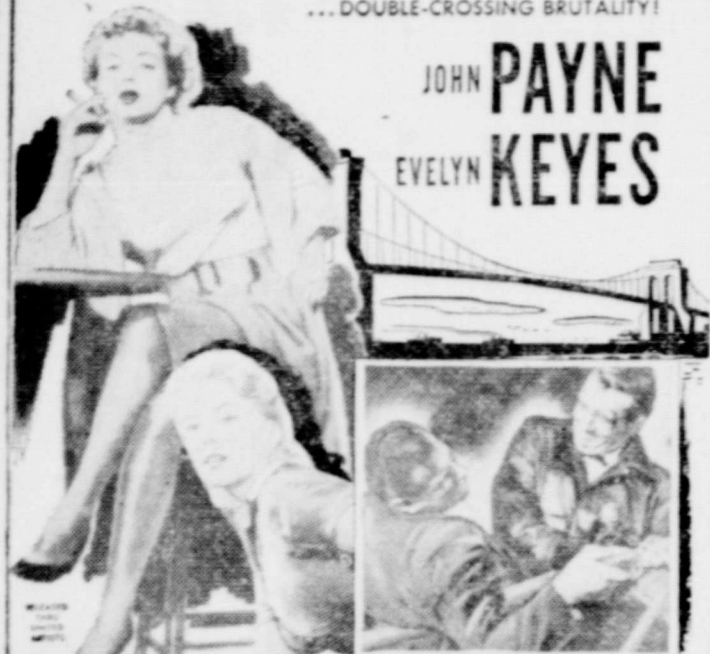

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Vets Questions And Answers

Q — About two years ago, a veteran-friend of mine applied to VA for disability compensation, but failed to take any further action on his claim. He did not show up for his physical examination, and did not contact VA in any way. At this late date, could he still follow through on this same claim?

A — No. VA considers that a claim is abandoned, if a veteran ignores VA's requests for evidence or an examination for one year after the requests were made. Your friend will have to file a new application. If he is awarded compensation, it will begin as of the date of the new application.

Q — I was awarded a VA pension around the middle of the year. In computing my income to see whether I come under the ceiling set by law, must I count income for the entire year, or only that part of the year dur-

ing which I was on VA's pension rolls?

A — You must include your income for the entire year, even though you were drawing a pension for only part of the year.

Q — I am a disabled Korean veteran. If I take vocational rehabilitation training under Public Law 16, will I have to give up my monthly compensation payments?

A — No. So long as you are eligible to receive the payments, you will receive them — even though you are taking training under Public Law 16.

Q — I was awarded a disability rating by VA, and I think it should be higher. I want to appeal. Is there any time limit on filing my appeal?

A — Yes. Your appeal must be filed within one year from the date VA made its original award.

New Seismograph Installed At SMU

Rumblings from "deep in the heart of Texas" and from other areas are now being picked up by a new seismograph in operation at Southern Methodist University in Dallas. The installation, most recent addition to a world-wide network of such observatories, gives physics and geology students at the Mustang school a chance to study earthquakes as they happen.

Using equipment presented by the Dallas Geophysical Society, technicians can measure nearly all types of earth motion. Three seismometers, each weighing about 400 pounds, are the nucleus of the laboratory, located in SMU's Fenderson Science Building. One unit detects vertical motion, and the other two are horizontal seismometers to respond to movement in the North-South and East-West components.

The devices are mounted on an "I" shaped concrete pier embedded in base rock to a depth of about five feet. The seismometers translate the mechanical energy that is transmitted from the earth to the pier into electrical energy, which is then relayed to a visual recorder in the foyer of the building, where one can watch a graphic report of any earth disturbance.

Hemphill Hosford, vice-president and provost at Southern Methodist University, predicts benefits for not only the school's science students, but for the surrounding area as well.

was partly digested but the biologist were able to determine that the bone structure was different than any other found in native Texas fish.

The Chief Aquatic Biologist urged fishermen catching walleyes to send or bring them to the Commission to aid in the vital research. He said walleyes have two separate dorsal fins on the top side and have no spots at the base of the tail like log perch and darters, which also are of the perch family.

He said there still is hope that

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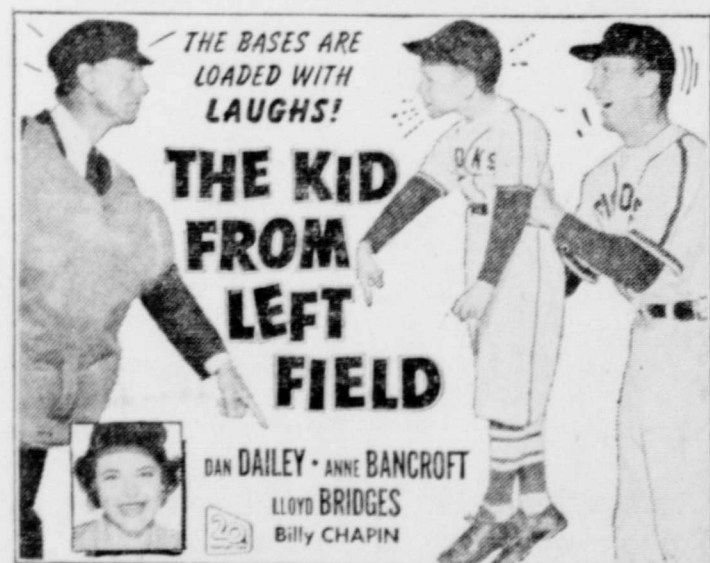

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walleyes can be established in Texas. New Mexico planted its first stock and then found no trace until four years later when anglers began catching big walleyes. He said the walleyes planted in Texas last summer could be as big as twelve inches long by May, and weigh up to one pound.
