GARDEN CLUB FLOWER SHOW TO BE HELD HERE ON APRIL 10th

Members of the Cisco Garden Club are completing the final arrangements for the annual Flower Show to be held in the Reynolds Building here on April 10, it was announced Saturday.

The price of thirty-five cents for adults and ten cents for children will be charged for admission and will be used to pay for the expenses of putting on the show. Every citizen in Cisco and their friends have been invited and urged to attend the show.

Rules to be used for the show and other information was given as follows: Potted plants, 2-5 Friday, April 9; Horticulture and Artistic Arrangements, 8-10 Saturday, April 10th.

Late entries and material brought that is not included on the schedule will be marked "Special Exhibits" and is not to be judged.

Exhibits must remain until close of the show, 8:30, Saturday, April 10.

Entries are limited to members of the Cisco Garden Club and out-of-town Garden Club members desiring to enter the Invitation Class.

Exhibits must be governed by the State Conservation Law (no wild flowers).

Each Garden Club member must enter at least one arrangement class.

Only one entry in an arrangement class may be made by exhibitor and only 5 classes may be entered in all.

No colored ribbon, paper or artificial flowers and foliage will be permitted. No artificially colored flowers, foliage, accessories, or candles will be permitted unless specified.

Flowers used in arrangement classes need not be grown by exhibitor. (Preference will be given home grown material in close decisions.)

Foliage is permitted to be used, either self foliage or appropriate foliage.

Containers used in flower arrangements may be neutral (grey, black or white, tan, copper or brass), or a tone, tone or shade of your color scheme.

All horticulture specimens must be grown by exhibitor at least three months prior to show. (Do not loan or buy specimens.)

Naming increases the value of the exhibit in horticulture classes. Preference will be given named specimens in close decisions.

The different arrangements that may be entered are: Arrangements for the mantle, buffet, coffee table, kitchen, guest room, sun porch, den, hall, nursery, bedroom or dresser, all occasion arrangements, corsages, and table arrangements.

Others that may be entered are the invitation class which is a large arrangement featuring shrubs, and staged on a pedestal, and the miniature arrangement which is not to exceed three inches in width and height, including container and base.

Mayor Proclaims Industrial Week Observance Here

Residents of the Cisco area were urged Saturday to take part in the local observance of Texas Industrial Week which is being held here April 1-7 in connection with a state-wide program. Mayor G. C. Rosenthal issued a proclamation, calling on Ciscoans to join in the special week's observance.

The Chamber of Commerce, through its Industrial Committee, has made arrangements for area manufacturers to display their products in a special exhibit at the Reynolds Building. The exhibit will open Thursday, April 1, and remain intact for a week.

Some 12 firms have announced plans to exhibit their products, and any others not contacted have been invited to call the Chamber of Commerce for information. Speakers will appear at service clubs during the week.

Mr. Rosenthal's proclamation follows:

"WHEREAS, Texas has been experiencing a tremendous industrial transformation with new industries and businesses being established and older industries expanding, and

"WHEREAS, this rapid and continuing development has created for Texans additional opportunities to work and produce, and another outlet for their initiative, energy and productivity, and

"WHEREAS, this development adds immeasurably to the economic well-being of all Texans and through its continuance will assure opportunities for Texas youth who will be leaders of tomorrow, and

"WHEREAS, continuance of this industrial and business expansion is dependent in no small measure on the attitude of the public and the government which represents them toward business and industry, and

"WHEREAS, it is imperative that these industries continue to enjoy a favorable atmosphere in which to operate and that this atmosphere can continue through a more thorough understanding of business and industry and its problems, and

"WHEREAS, the honorable Allan Shivers, Governor of Texas, has officially designated the first week of April, 1954, as the fifth annual observance of TEXAS INDUSTRIAL WEEK in order to emphasize the part business and industry play in the well-being of all,

"THEREFORE, I, as mayor of Cisco, do hereby proclaim the first week of April as TEXAS INDUSTRIAL WEEK and respectfully urge all organizations and citizens to join their fellow Texans in recognizing the industrial development of Cisco and Texas."

Citizens of Cisco who are interested in the city manager form of government will have an opportunity to hear a complete discussion of the proposition at 7:30 p. m. Tuesday at the Junior High Music Room, it was announced Saturday.

Robert Bowers, Breckenridge attorney who headed a citizens charter committee recently in that city, has accepted an invitation to appear at the Cisco meeting Tuesday night to lead a discussion and answer any questions.

The local meeting was arranged by interested citizens. The general public has been invited to attend the meeting.

The people of Breckenridge held an election recently and approved a new charter, providing for the city manager form of government. Another election has now been called there to name a city commission as provided by the new charter.

Mayor G. C. Rosenthal, who has advocated the adoption of the city manager form of government here, suggested at a recent meeting of the local commission that if Ciscoans are interested in this type of government they could petition for an election.

All members of the city commission have indicated that they would favor an election on the proposition, Mr. Rosenthal said.

Cisco's city charter would have to be amended to provide for the employment of a city manager, the mayor said.

Questions on the subject will be answered by Mr. Bowers at Tuesday night's meeting. It was pointed out that the meeting "is to be one of citizens called by citizens who are interested in the future of our city."

Just Say 'Gimme The Fire Station'

If you wish to report a fire, pick up your telephone and tell the operator "I want the fire station."

By using this procedure, which is outlined in the telephone book, your report will get to the fire department faster, Mayor G. C. Rosenthal reported. The telephone operators will connect you direct to the fire department on a special unlisted telephone.

Those who are calling the fire department for reasons other than reporting a fire should use the city number 538. Mr. Rosenthal said. Calls to this number are answered at the City Hall from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m. daily and from 8 a. m. to noon on Saturday, he added. The phone has an extension at the fire station. After office hours, Phone 538 is answered by men on duty at the fire station.

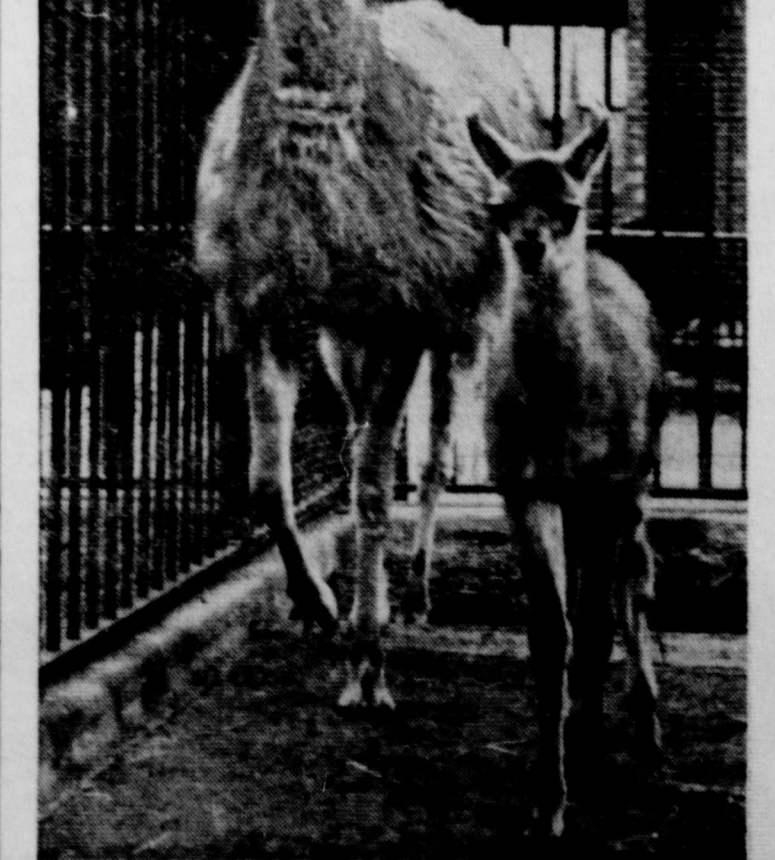

FREEDOM SHRINE PROJECT

A national project to erect a "Freedom Shrine" in Washington, D. C. as a living monument to American individual rights and aspirations was announced last week by Kenneth D. Wells, president of Freedom's Foundation at Valley Forge.

The financing for the Shrine will be carried out on a broad national basis, seeking diverse contributions to achieve widest individual participation.

Mr. Wells emphasized that "The project has a two-fold objective — to remind Americans of their individual rights and personal responsibilities, and to clarify to the world the fundamentals of the American structure."

General Bradley announced that to date 145 Chief and Associate Justices of State Supreme Courts have endorsed the "Freedom Shrine" project and constitute the National Committee of Origin for the Freedom Shrine.

Several possible sites for the Shrine in the Washington, D. C. area are under consideration, in cooperation with interested official, governmental planning and arts groups.

Freedom's Foundation at Valley Forge is a non-profit, non-partisan organization founded in 1949. It annually makes awards to individuals, organizations and schools for their work in bringing about a better understanding of the American Way of Life.

Mr. Wells described the Shrine as a 100-foot high monument, with the basic rights of free Americans enumerated on its four sides. It will take the general form of the "Credo of the American Way of Life."

It will be capped with a perpetual "Freedom Flame" and built of Washington, Jefferson, Lincoln, and Franklin. Its inner room will contain copies of America's Freedom documents and will provide facilities for all people who visit it to sign their personal pledge to maintain freedom, to be permanently sealed in stone.

The Shrine is a living monument to American individual rights and aspirations, a living reminder of the American Way of Life.

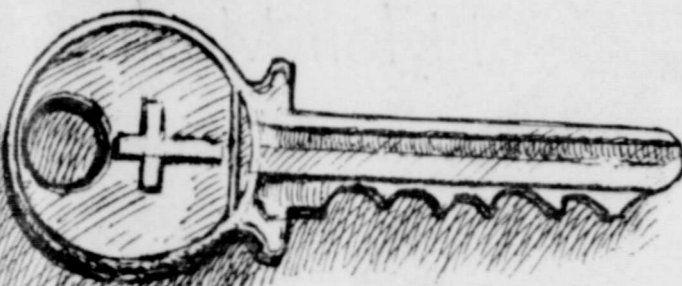
