





Illicit Stills Are Seized by Agents

AUSTIN, May 3. - Texas Liquor Boar agents set a high mark for seizure of illicit stills in the month of March.

The number was seven, whereas ordinarily the number of captures ranges from two to five.

With the stills, which had a cubic capacity of 375 gallons, the board's inspectors captured 2,620 gallons of mash and made four arrests. Destroyed were 10½ galons of moonshine liquor.

Three stills were taken in Ti tus County and one each in Mc-Lenan, Bowie, Lamar and Maron Counties.

The March report on enforcenent activities reveals that the board's agents filed 321 cases. Court action on liquor board cases esulted in 311 convictions and 35 ail terms, 51 dismissals, 6 acquitals, and \$66,193.15 collected in ines and costs.

The auditing division checked \$1,669,027.44 in alcoholic beverage revenue during the month.


