Campaign Begins To Reduce Losses In Forest Fires

It's time to get outdoors again and the annual campaign by the Forestry Division of the U. S. Department of Agriculture to prevent forest fires is being stepped up. This year an effort is being made to enlist the cooperation of the nation's youth as well as adults. Business firms also are being called upon to help. For example, arrangements have been completed for full color display pieces depicting an appeal by Smokey Bear, official symbol of the fire-prevention campaign, to be displayed in A&P stores across the land.

The Great Atlantic and Pacific Tea Company also is cooperating in the campaign to enlist the cooperation of the nation's youth by offering a Smokey Bear belt as a premium in its stores. Each youth who obtains one of these is eligible to receive an official Junior Forest Ranger kit from Smokey Bear Headquarters in Washington, D. C.

Although the Smokey Bear symbol was conceived in 1945, according to Clinton Davis, director of Forest Fire Prevention for the Forestry Division, it was not adopted by the Forestry Division as a central figure until 1947, and has been used extensively ever since. There was an average of 210,000 forest fires annually prior to the inauguration of the Smokey Bear campaign. Since then the number has been reduced to an average of 185,000, even though thousands of additional people visit forest and woodland areas every year for picnics, camping, hunting and fishing expeditions.

If it were not for the extensive fire-prevention program, of which the Smokey Bear symbol is the central figure, Davis estimates the number of fires would be running at the rate of between 300,000 and 350,000 annually because of increased use of forest areas. Because fires caused by people run in direct proportion

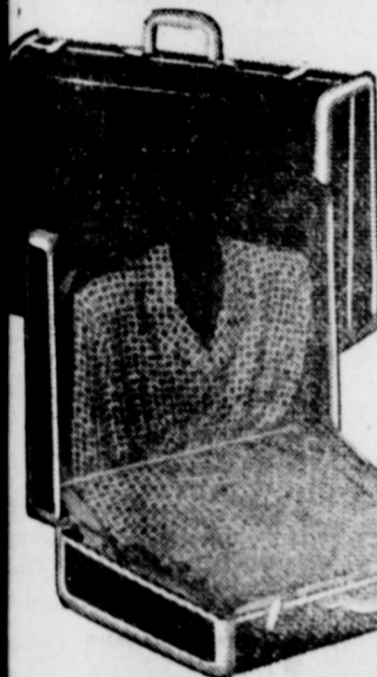

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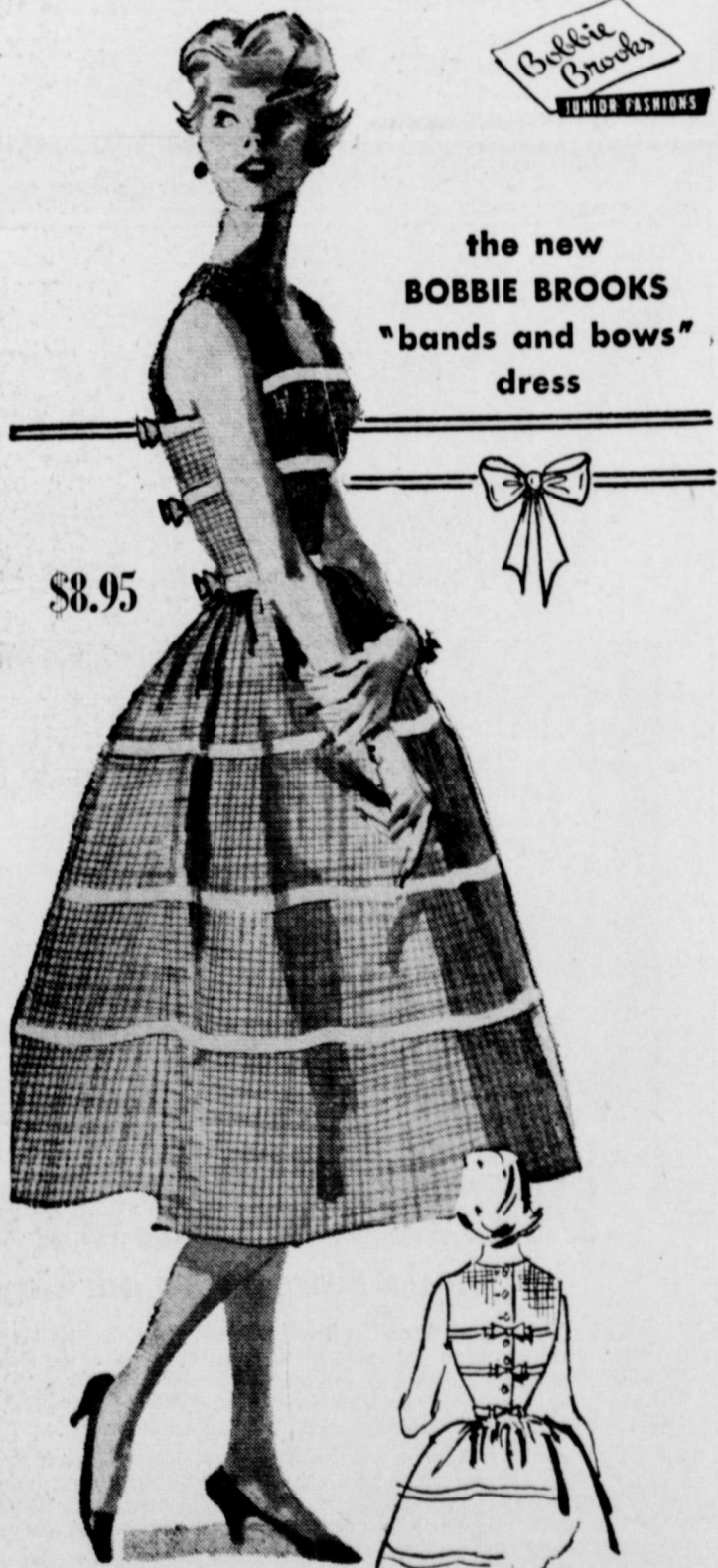

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Farm Bureau To Have Meetings In Legislation Study

WACO, May 14.—The Texas Farm Bureau has called three area-wide mass meetings this month to discuss pending farm legislation, TFB President J. Walter Hammond has announced.

Sessions will be held May 26 at the Baker Hotel, Dallas; May 27 at the Lubbock Hotel, Lubbock; and May 28 at the Plaza Hotel, San Antonio. John C. Lynn, legislative director for the American Farm Bureau Federation in Washington, will be main speaker for all three meetings.

Lynn's talks will touch on agricultural legislation being considered in Washington. This includes all phases of farm programs that have been or will be introduced in Congress during this session.

In addition, he will explain in detail the major provisions of the Agricultural Act of 1949. This is the basic law under which agriculture will operate beginning next year unless present temporary amendments are extended or new amendments are tacked on. Lynn is an authority on the 1949 Act.

The sessions are not intended to rally support for or against any proposed farm legislation. They were called at the request of Farm Bureau members who expressed a desire for unbiased, factual information in order to get a better understanding of past, present and possible future farm laws.

Each of the meetings will get underway at 10 a. m. and will be concluded by 3 p. m. The sites

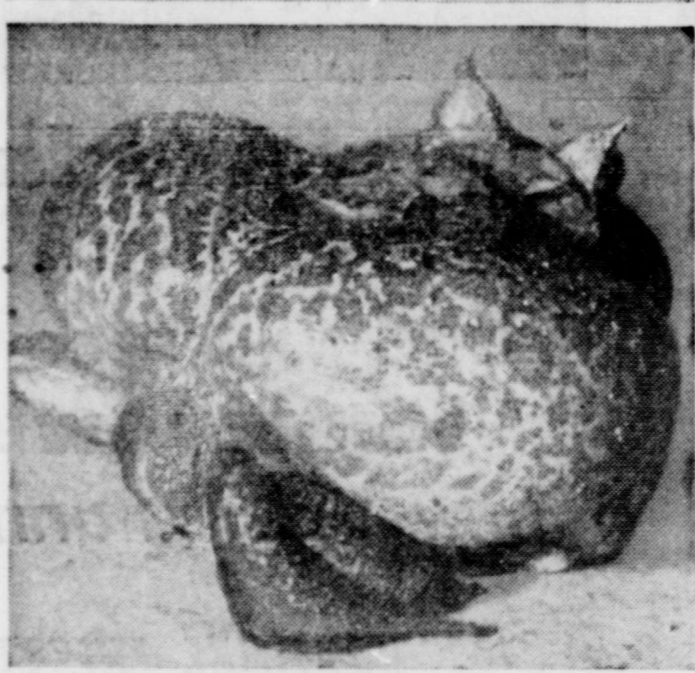
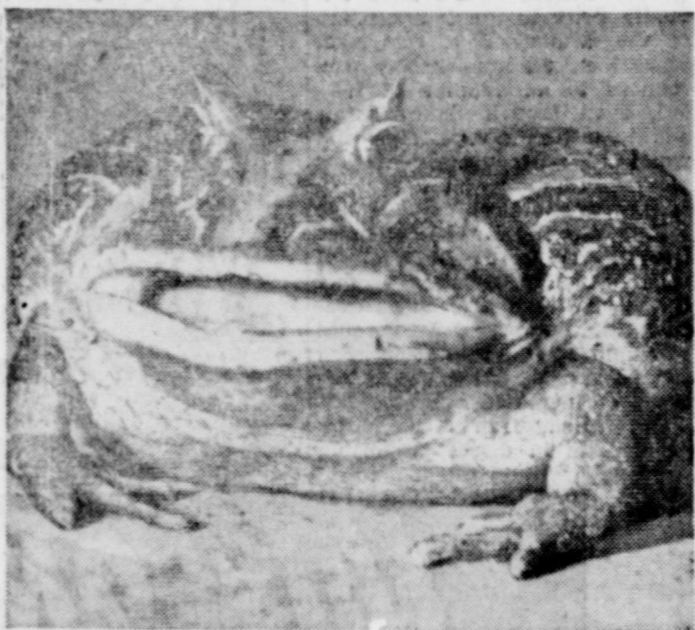

Questions and Answers

Q—I know a disabled World War II veteran who's taking on job training under Public Law 16. He recently was injured while in training. Would he be eligible for VA compensation because of his training injury?

A—He might be eligible, provided that his injury resulted from some training activity, and

provided that it is serious enough to warrant compensation payments.

Q—Is it possible to get a GI loan to buy residential property containing more than one family unit?

A—Yes. However, if one veteran is buying, the total number of separate units he can get is four.

Q—A World War II veteran friend of mine died recently, leaving his wife a \$10,000 GI term insurance policy. He had failed to pay his last premium on time, but the grace period hadn't expired. Will his wife get the full amount of the policy?

A—His wife will receive the full amount of the policy minus the unpaid premium.

Q—In computing annual income for VA pension purposes, does a veteran have to count his gross salary, or only his net take-home salary?

A—He must include his full, gross salary — including deductions made for retirement and amounts withheld for income tax.

Army Reservists To Train At Fort Hood This Year

AUSTIN, MAY 15. — Concerning on Fort Hood May 30 for two weeks of summer field training will be approximately 4,000 Army reservists from the 90th Infantry Division and attached units of the 75th and 95th Divisions, Colonel Karl E. Henson, Chief of the Texas Military District, announced this week.

The May encampment, first of eight scheduled this summer, is the only one at which units of three Reserve divisions will train simultaneously. This is the first year that elements of all three divisions have been assigned at one camp during the same period. The 90th and 75th Divisions trained at Fort Hood last year but at different periods while the 95th trained at Camp Chaffee, Arkansas.

All basic trainees — reservists without prior active military duty — will be attached to the 90th for their military indoctrination. Scheduled to attend the basic training this summer are 535 basics from Texas, 33 from Arkansas, 61 from Louisiana, 28 from New Mexico and 111 from Oklahoma. They will supplement the 455 officers and 1,272 enlisted

men training with the 90th. Elements of the 75th Division will represent sections of Texas and Louisiana while the 95th Division will be made up entirely of reservists from Oklahoma and Arkansas. The 90th Division is composed entirely of Texans. In addition, non-divisional units from Texas and New Mexico will help round out the training program.

Over Fort Hood's 205,000 acres of sprawling ranchland, the Army reservists will improve their various military skills and practice the lessons learned the past year during local home-town training periods.

This is the fourth year that summer training for active reservists has been made mandatory by law.

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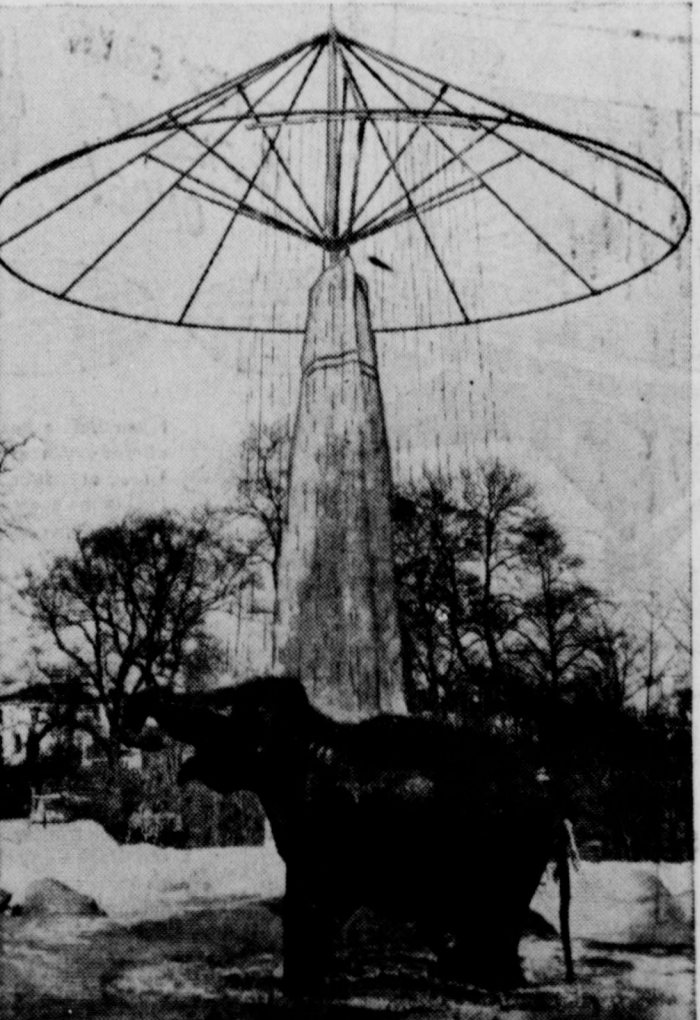

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IT'S THE LAW
in Texas

A public service feature
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Texas laws and court decisions regulate to some extent your dealings with your next door neighbor and his property. Adjoining landowners have many mutual rights and obligations, and your rights to the use of your own property may sometimes be limited by the effect of the intended use on your immediate neighbors.

Such limitations are in addition to those imposed by municipal zoning ordinances, building codes and other restrictions designed to protect the interests of an entire subdivision or city, or the public generally.

For example, say you have just bought the vacant lot next to Mr. Smith's property out on Main Street. Smith has a fine big tree on his property but it juts over onto your lot and those overhanging branches will interfere with the plans you have for building your house.

You can't go over to Smith's lot and cut down his tree even though the branches will make your proposed living room as dark as the catacombs at midnight. On the other hand, neither does Smith have a right to let the tree on his land extend over your property, especially when it is going to interfere with your use of that property, so you do

have the right to get rid of the offending branches.

However, before you start sawing you had better consider whether the removal of the branches will damage the tree. It is still Smith's tree and you don't want to cause it to die. The best thing to do is have a talk with Smith and see if you can arrange to have the limb cut off by someone who knows how to do so without harming the tree.

Of course, a boundary tree — where the trunk is on both sides of the boundary line — can be cut only by consent of both the owners.

Another possible problem: Let's say you want to cut down the front of your lot below the level of Smith's yard. The soil is pretty loose and you are sure that when you lower the grade, Smith's yard will slide all along the cut. However, you figure that it is up to Smith to do what is necessary to keep his land from sliding over on yours. He can put up a retaining wall or something.

The law says you had better slow up a bit in that instance. The way things stand, Smith's yard is not currently in any danger of sliding. If you change that condition by cutting your land down, then it is your obligation to see that it doesn't cause damage to his property. It is up to you to put up the retaining

wall if one is necessary to keep the adjoining land from sliding.

Suppose you and Smith build a driveway together so you can both save the biggest possible space for lawn. You get along fine with Smith, but he later sells his house to a new owner who wants to take up part of the driveway and plant petunias there. He can probably do it if you did not have a definite, written agreement with Smith by which the subsequent owner is bound.

Probably the best way to handle such a situation would be to have a written agreement with Smith and record it with the County Clerk before the driveway is built. Anyone buying the property later would thereby have notice of the agreement and be bound by it.

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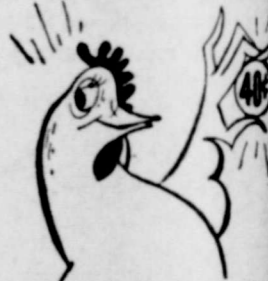
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
