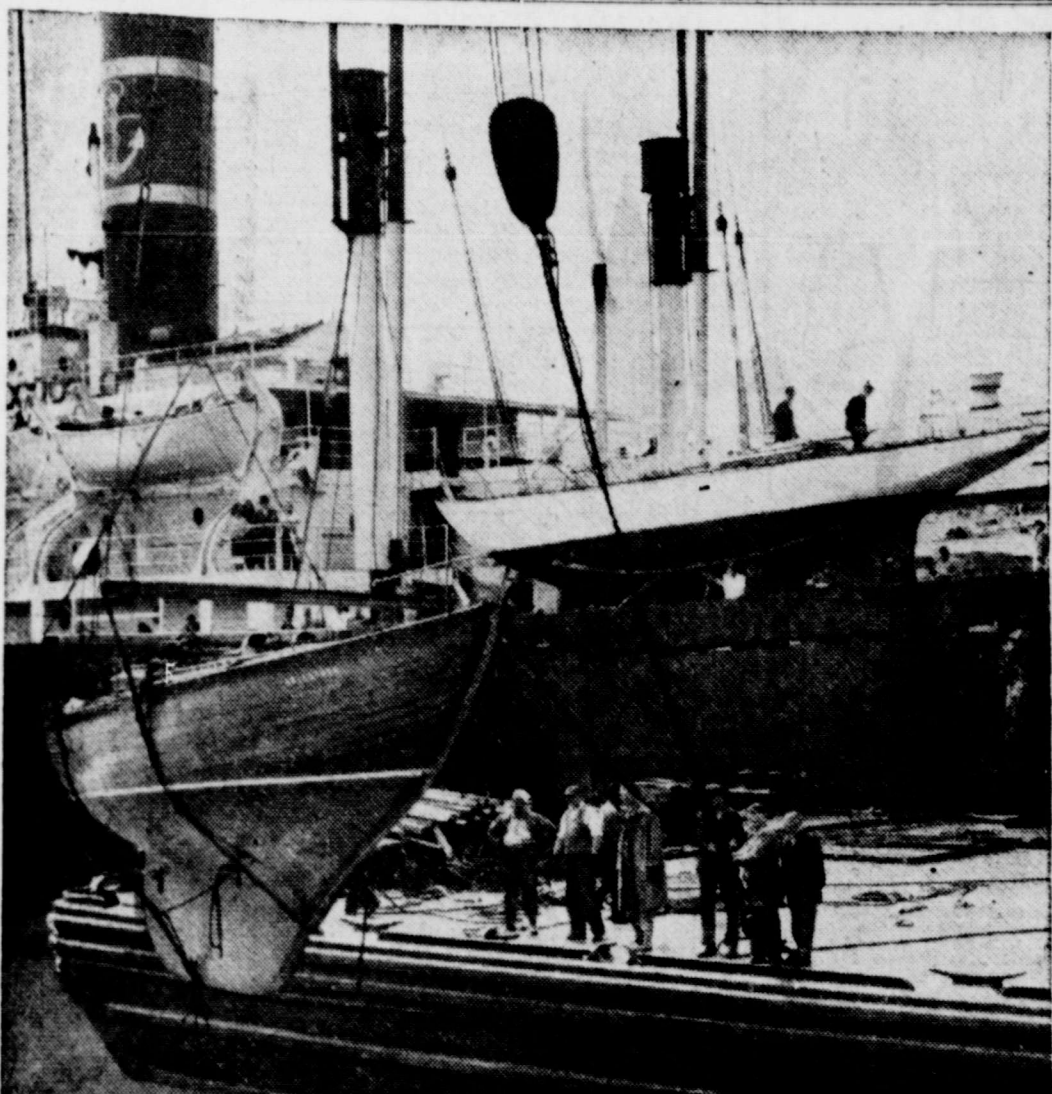

Redfish Placed In Fresh Water

ROCKPORT, May 18. — Two small shipments of redfish, taken from the Gulf of Mexico, have been placed experimentally in fresh water with undetermined results thus far, according to the Chief Marine Biologist of the Game and Fish Commission.

He said 150 were placed in the five-acre O. R. Mitchell lake near San Antonio about March 15. A second shipment was released there two weeks later. The Chief Marine Biologist was very hesitant in predicting the outcome, but said salt-water fish have been known to survive in fresh water but have never been known to reproduce. He said this failure to propagate was considered advantageous in that the redfish could not over-populate a given area of water, thereby overcoming the food supply.

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White Scours Is Top Calf Killer On U. S. Ranges

AUSTIN, May 18.—Farmers can save millions of dollars this spring by a drive to check the nation's top calf killer, white scours, the American Foundation for Animal Health said today.

Despite the fact that this disease has been recognized for centuries, it still costs the nation an estimated five to six million dollars every year, Foundation officials said.

White scours, also known as acute dysentery, usually occurs within 72 hours after the birth of calves. The first symptom may be diarrhea, followed by weakness and listlessness. Other symptoms include dry skin, rough coat, and poor appetite. However, officials warned that these symptoms also may indicate scours caused by coccidiosis or parasites, so a diagnosis is needed when such signs are noticed, to determine exactly what is causing the condition.

Veterinarians have reported good success in treating white scours with some of the newer medicines, the Foundation said, but prevention is economically more important than treatment. Major preventive measures include cleanliness, proper rations, the feeding of the cow's first milk, and protection from dampness and drafts.

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WOODEN CHURCH CRUSADE WEEK

Contributions totaling \$25,000 are being sought in Texas for construction of a church in Germany. The campaign, which is supported by Governor Allan Shivers, is part of a nationwide drive to raise \$1,000,000 to build a church for each of the 48 states and the District of Columbia, in western Germany.

Headed in Texas by W. H. Frank Barnes, attorney of Terrell, who was appointed by Governor Shivers, the campaign is known as the Wooden Church Crusade. Initial bequests have brought in \$17,455.26 toward the \$25,000 goal.

The idea was born when Baron Henning von Rojk-Lewinski, a German Lutheran layman and former German Navy Captain, seeing the ravages of war (45 per cent of all German churches were destroyed in World War 2), saw that there was need for a spiritual reawakening. Many sections, particularly those in west Germany near the east German frontier, were desperately in need of places to worship.

Baron von Rojk-Lewinski came to America and met Fulton Lewis, Jr., columnist and radio commentator. Mr. Lewis undertook the campaign that has to date achieved nearly half its goal. The third week in May was chosen for the Texas state-wide campaign to complete one church.

Mr. Barnes points out that contributions will go to the church of the denomination designated by the contributor. Governor Allan Shivers, in his sponsoring proclamation to Fulton Lewis, Jr., says: "I shall be glad to serve as a sponsor of The Wooden Church Crusade, designed to aid in the construction of houses of God in free Germany. Congratulations to those who are championing new buildings in which the eternal truths of spiritual life will be advanced right in the face of Iron-Curtain godlessness."

"I am glad to announce that my valued friend, Mr. W. H. (Frank) Barnes has accepted the honor and responsibility of representing the people of this great State in the position of State Treasurer for this campaign. Mr. Barnes is well and favorable known to all of you as a leader in the business and civic life of the state. He will approach leaders of the business community of the State for support and I am sure that we will far exceed our modest quota."

Among national organizations backing this movement are the American Legion, American Legion Auxiliary, National Grange, Daughters of the American Revolution, Junior Chamber of Commerce, Elks, Red Men, and the like.

In every church will be a Golden Book containing the names of individuals and organizations whose generosity made it possible. Contributions are deductible from taxable income according to a ruling of the United States Treasury Department. Checks should be made payable to the Wooden Church Crusade and sent to the State Treasurer, W. H. Frank Barnes, Attorney, Terrell, Texas.

State Capitol NEWS

AUSTIN — "Evidence of fraudulent and corrupt abuse of our insurance laws, and gross if not criminal laxness in their enforcement" was cited by Associate Justice Robert G. Hughes of the Court of Civil Appeals in Austin.

Being considered was a case involving the Texas Mutual Insurance Company of Beaumont. Garland A. Smith, chairman of the Board of Insurance Commissioners, agreed with Hughes' opinion that the company had been improperly organized. He said that the commission had changed its rules covering the appraisal of real estate for assets, as a result of the case.

Smith stated that "under the laws, a company can be solvent today and broke three months later." He pointed out that his commission has 28 examiners and that there are some 1,884 companies to examine every two years. "We aren't physically able to do it," Smith said.

He pointed out that Texas insurance laws are generally sound but that "a few termites are going through a few loopholes." Smith repeated his recent statement that the board will insist on corrections in the insurance laws by the next Legislature.

Office Padlocked Ralph W. Hammonds, attorney-in-fact for Lloyd's of North America insurance company, protested in 98th District Court here that he is "defenseless" because his Houston office has been padlocked.

Attorney General John Ben Shepperd charged that the company was established by fraudulent means and is now insolvent, having a \$427,000 deficit. The attorney general seeks a receivership to protect the policyholders. This question is expected to be a major one when the Legislature meets.

Road Problem Representatives of state, local and private highway interests form a special committee assigned by Governor Allan Shivers to the job of working out a road program that will be presented to the next Legislature.

Texas Good Roads Association, which has a member on the committee, is in favor of a one-cent increase in the gasoline tax to provide money for growing highway needs.

This question is expected to be a major one when the Legislature meets.

More Patrolmen Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, says he will ask the next Legislature for more highway patrolmen.

Four hundred seventy men now are on the job, says Garrison, and 200 more are needed to cut down rural traffic fatalities.

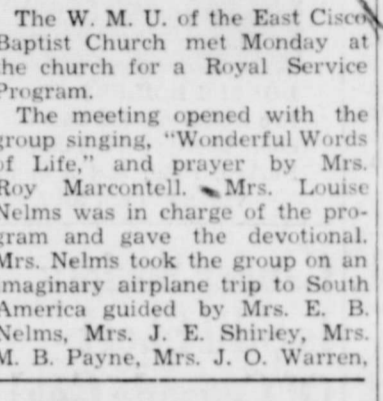

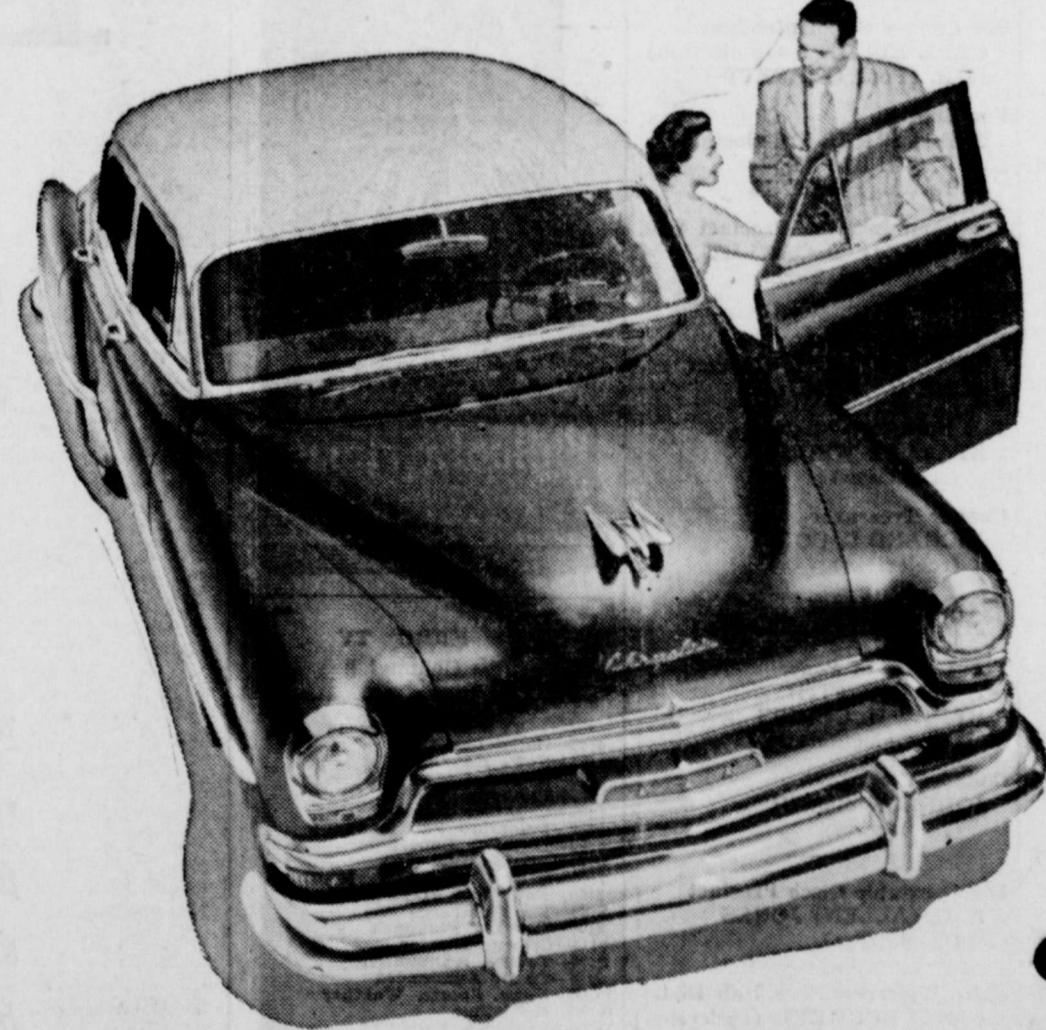

University Wins Praise For New Books Off Press

AUSTIN, May 18.—A sterling example of the bookmaker's art, "Renaissance Dictionaries," has been published by the University of Texas Press.

The book's design is a product of painstaking workmanship by VanCourtright Walton, University Press production manager, who worked closely with the author, Dr. DeWitt T. Starnes, English professor at the University, during its production.

Another member of the team was Walter Barnes, Austin photographer, who helped prepare illustrations. He copied photostats obtained by Dr. Starnes from dictionaries in American and British libraries. He also copied pages direct from dictionaries in the University of Texas Rare Book Collections.

Dr. Starnes gathered materials for the book on English-Latin and Latin-English lexicons over a period of 15 years at the Huntington Library, the Newberry, the Folger Shakespeare, the Library of Congress, the British Museum, the Bodleian, and the University of Cambridge Library.

"In the course of years since this study was begun, our own Library at the University of Texas has acquired an excellent collection of original texts and microfilms of early dictionaries, which have been extremely useful in the latter stages of this work," Dr. Starnes said.

Frontispiece of the volume is a reproduction of the title page of the 1519 edition of "Promptorium" printed by Wynkyn de Worde, from a copy in the British Museum.

Other illustrations from Renaissance bi-lingual dictionaries appear throughout the new volume. Decorative chapter openings and typographic "flowers" appropriate to the period are tastefully employed. Caslon type was used throughout.

During its three years of publishing history, the reorganized University of Texas Press has garnered 13 prizes for book design and production. Four books won two prizes each: "Life on the Texas Range," "Texas Range Grasses," "Big Bend" and "The Florida of the Inca." Other award winners were "Dearest Isa," "Addresses and State Papers of James Stephen Hogg," "Mexican Revolution: Genesis Under Madeiro," "Possums" and "The Tidelands Oil Controversy."

Cancer Society Is Still Short Of Crusade Goal

AUSTIN, May 17.—The 1954 Texas Cancer Crusade of the American Cancer Society has officially been extended, Travis T. Wallace, president of the Cancer Society's Texas Division, has announced.

The Cancer Crusade is held each April to teach Texans the facts about cancer and to raise funds to advance the Cancer Society's programs of research, education, and service.

In announcing the extension, Mr. Wallace pointed out that more money is needed because of increased demands for money to advance various cancer control projects, including research.

"This year some \$5,000,000 is being devoted to research by the Society," he said. "That's more than ever before, but not enough. For the Society only has funds to grant only about two-thirds of the money requested for research grants and fellowships."

For that reason, he said, Cancer Crusades in some areas of Texas will continue into May.
