## Is Told In Talk To Rotary Club A history of the monetary sys-

tem of the world was explained to Rotarians by Louis Goodwin local authority on the subject, at the regular meeting of the club at the Hotel Victor dining room Thursday.

Mr. Goodwin, an Humble Pipeline Company employee, has made an extensive study on the subjects, and has been a collector of rare coins for the past 27 years. The former professional fighter brought a number of his coins to the meeting and showed them to members.

He said that for many centuries there was no medium of exchange, and that the population was divided into tribes or family groups that were self sustaining. As the tribes grew, he said, they became dependent upon other tribes and a system of trade was arranged in which the various nations traded or bartered goods for other goods.

It was soon found out that that method was not satisfactory, he said, and many of the nations started using precious metals as a medium of exchange, weighing the district will go into state play the metals at each transaction. That method was in use until about 700 years after Abraham. It was about 700 years before Christ that the use of coins was first instituted, and those coins were for local use only for some time. Mr. Goodwin said that since the origin of the coin system, coins had been made from all metals, both precious and others; glass, porcelain, leather,

silk and others. His collection contained coins made from most of the materials mentioned.






