BUILD A GOOD NAME AND TAKE CARE OF IT, SENIORS ARE TOLD

"It takes a lifetime to build a good name, but it can be destroyed in a moment," Dr. Rupert N. Richardson, president emeritus of Hardin-Simmons University, told the 52 graduating seniors of Cisco High School in his commencement address at the high school auditorium at 8 p. m. Friday.

In his talk, Dr. Richardson stressed the importance of making a good name for one's self, and said that every name meant something. He called upon the seniors to make a good name and to live up to the name. Dr. Richardson pointed out that the individual alone was responsible for the manner in which the world looked upon his name.

Dr. Richardson's talk was the highlight of the commencement exercises which concluded the year's work in Cisco schools. To begin the program Carlene Holder played the professional class entered the auditorium and were seated in a reserved section in front of the stage. The Rev. E. H. Lightfoot, pastor of the First Methodist Church, said the invocation.

Leon McCrary, salutarian, talked on the subject, "New Worlds Before Us," and said that members of the class faced new problems and should prepare themselves to take their place in the new world they were facing. Nancy Cluck, valedictorian, talked on the subject, "Youth's Place in Today's World," and told members of the class that they had a place in the new world, and urged them to seek the proper place.

Monte Ingram, president of the senior class, introduced Dr. Richardson, who at one time was principal of Cisco High School.

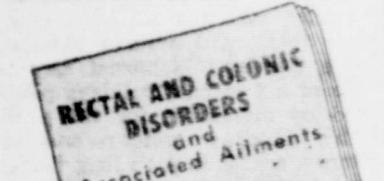

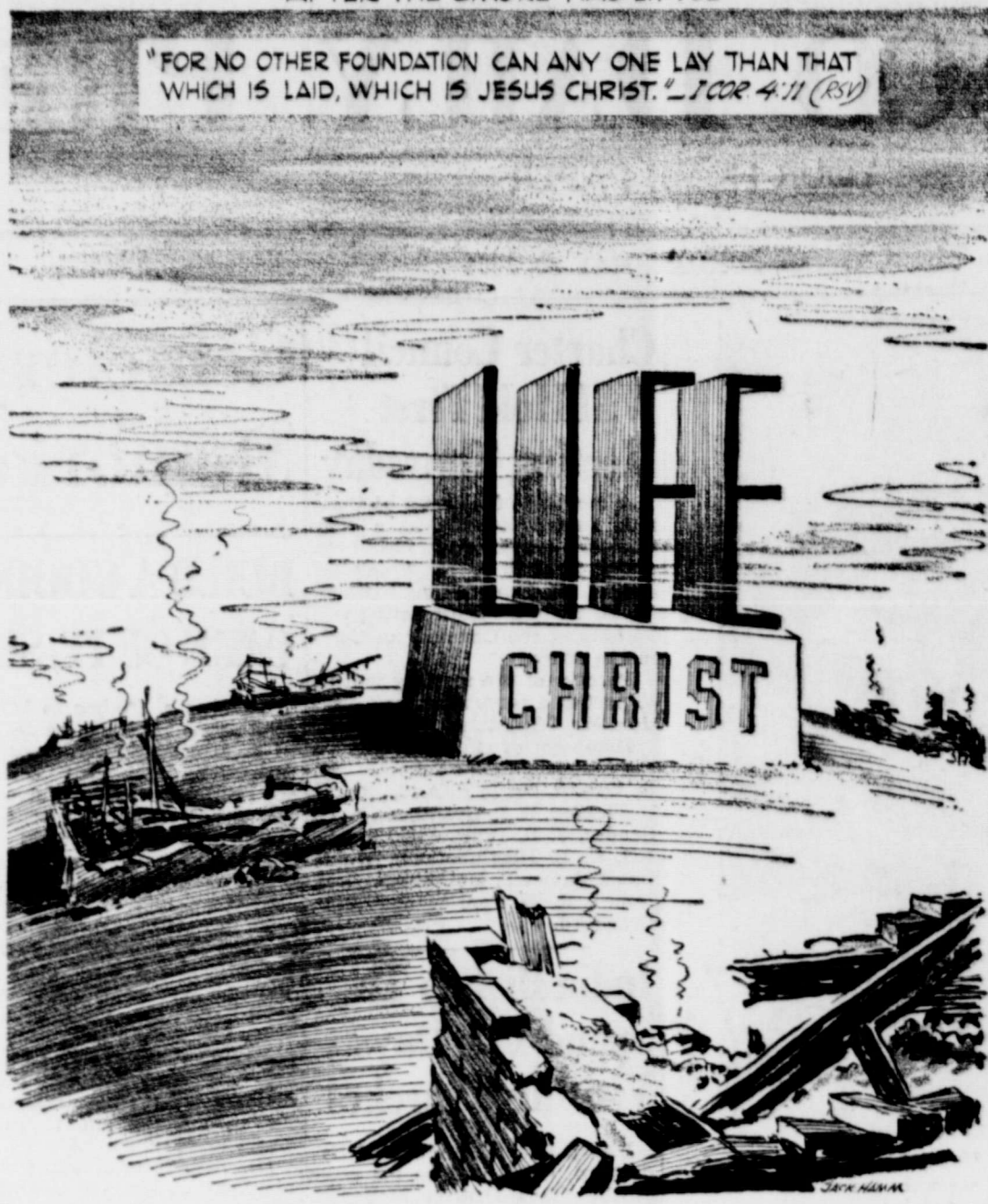

LEGAL NOTICE NOTICE OF ASSESSMENT FOR PAVING STREETS

Notice is hereby given that the Streets in the City of Cisco, West of Avenue D, from Third Street to Twenty-third Street, except 6th, 7th, 8th, 9th and part of 10th Street, and the Avenues from and including Avenue E to Front Street, are in urgent need of paving, and that any portion of any and all said Streets and Avenues where the owners of homesteads will execute contracts for such paving, will be paved, and that a hearing will be held by and before the City Commission of the City of Cisco, at the City Hall in the City of Cisco, Texas, on the 2nd day of June 1954, at 7:30 o'clock p. m., at which all persons owning property abutting upon such streets and avenues shall have the right to appear and be heard with reference to any and all matters relating to such paving. The estimated cost of such paving per front foot is \$99 cents per foot, based on a 20 foot pavement, this estimate would decrease or increase with the change in width requested by a majority of property owners, and the estimated cost of Curb and Gutter, where petitioned for, is \$150 per front foot, and all of the cost of Curb and Gutter in front of the property of each abutting property owner, and 45% of the cost of such paving, will be assessed against each owner of property abutting on the street or avenue and against the owners of same on each side of the street or avenue in accordance with what is commonly called the per front foot rule or plan as to frontage of the property of each owner of property abutting on each of such streets and avenues, and this notice is given as required by law of the time and place of said hearing, and that it is the purpose and intention of the City Commission of the City of Cisco, after such hearing, to assess the cost of such paving and Curbs and Gutters against the property abutting upon such streets and avenues and against the owners thereof, in order that all property owners and interested parties may appear and show cause, if any they have, why such assessment should not be made.

This company's success has had an influence upon the investigation of Cisco clays to determine their brick-making qualities, and only recently the Texas Brick Company of Brownwood purchased a large Cisco deposit and is now using clay to make brick of distinctive pink and buff shades and to combine with Brownwood clays in the production of unique red-brown and copper tones.

Other examples of "grass-roots" industrialization in Cisco are the Sandler Manufacturing Company, which has built a plant to produce steel tanks, and Thomas-Moore, Inc., a company organized to make custom furniture for the clients of a Dallas designer. An interesting feature of this small factory is the fact that it will utilize skills employed in another industry and shortly become fully available under the retirement program of that industry.

In addition to making tanks of heavy gauge steel, the Sandler Company produces an automatic timer for oil well pumps. The plant, just now getting into production, has a large backlog of orders. A large distributor of steel tanks of a sort not produced by the local plant, is considering establishing a yard and inventory

in connection with it to serve customers in this area.

Another local industry which is the result of Cisco business men becoming sold on the opportunities they offered outside capital is the Cisco Frozen Foods Locker Company. This organization took over a closed locker plant, remodelled it, installed a competent staff and is aggressively expanding in the foods processing field.

The Reynolds Manufacturing Company is a small Cisco industry whose product commands a national market. It makes an accessory automobile seat utilizing the evaporative principle of cooling for comfortable automobile travel in hot weather. Under its trade name, Remco, this company also produces cluster valves and oil field tools. It holds patents on a number of other items.

Cisco brooms and mops produced by the Tompkins Broom and Mop Company and the Ward Broom Company are sold in almost every part of the nation. Both of these companies have been in operation for many years and have had consistent success.

Two local industries utilizing agricultural products of the section are the Thornton Feed Mill, producing its own brand of feeds and doing custom grinding, and the Cisco Peanut Company which processes hundreds of tons of Spanish peanuts annually. The Thornton company has just installed machinery for making pellets.

The Cisco Ice Company is one icemaking plant which has survived the attrition caused by mechanical refrigeration. Now under local ownership it is doing a flourishing wholesale business over several Central West Texas counties.

Two other local industries, one a fabrication industry and the other to offer an oil field reconditioning service, are now being planned.

None of these industries is large, most of them employing from 10 to 25 people; but they are soundly integrated with the local economy and they form an important and diversified contribution to an industrial inventory that includes such organizations as the Humble Pipe Line Company's North Texas Division headquarters, the Boss Manufacturing Company, the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company and the Pueblo plant of the Lone Star Gas Company, not to speak of a considerable number of independent oil operators and oil development, producing and gathering companies such as the Hickok-Reynolds Company, the Ibe company's operations and others.

The Humble Company and organizations doing contract work for it have a Cisco payroll unofficially stated at approximately one million dollars. The Boss plant, manufacturing canvas and leather work gloves, now employs 175 people for an annual payroll of \$350,000. At the recent anniversary celebration of the Cisco plant, Boss company officials an-
