Crops, Pastures Continue Growth In Good Weather

Growing crops and pastures continued on the upgrade over practically the entire state during the past week. Moisture was generally ample and the return of hot, open weather late in the week stimulated fast development. Early in the week scattered showers, primarily in central blacklands, cross timbers and some plains counties held field work at a near standstill in parts of those areas.

In the southeast, where showers were generally light, field work was active. Fields dried rapidly in the hot, open weather as the week ended. Bulk of the remaining planting and replanting will be rushed to completion during early June, unless delayed further by additional rains.

Much wheat in the low plains, cross timbers and north Texas was ready to combine as soils dried. In many partially maturing fields, plants have sent up additional tillers which were still green. High plains wheat which survived earlier drought and freezes has staged remarkable recovery and is in full head. South of the Canadian River, fair to good yields are now in prospect. In the important northern and some western counties, however, where earlier abandonment was heavy, stands on remaining acreage are thin and fields are getting weedy.

Corn prospects continued to improve over the eastern third of the state. Combining coastal bend sorghums started. In other areas, particularly the plains country, early plantings were making excellent growth but much acreage remains to be planted or replanted. Some hay was cut and baled in scattered communities. Much additional alfalfa, Johnson grass and other hay crops were ready. Most rice was making satisfactory progress.

Lower valley cotton prospects remained very good. Picking started in the valley with the first bale ginned May 30. Rains early in the week improved dryland cotton in south Texas. Insects were being brought under control in the Coastal Bend. Upper coastal and southeastern cotton made good growth as the weather warmed up.

Throughout north, northeast and central Texas, early cotton needed warmer weather. In the northwest, wet soils kept planters out of the fields until late in the week. As fields dried, planting was pushed under conditions favorable for quick germination and rapid early growth.

Range and pasture grass continued to make remarkable growth over practically the entire state except in the lower valley where grass was dying. Supplemental feeding has practically stopped and some farmers and ranchmen were already in the market for replacements with stocker cattle and calves moving into the plains country in heavy volume. Stock were gaining rapidly on the increasing green feed.

In eastern and southeastern counties spring grasses were maturing but moisture was adequate to bring on summer grasses.

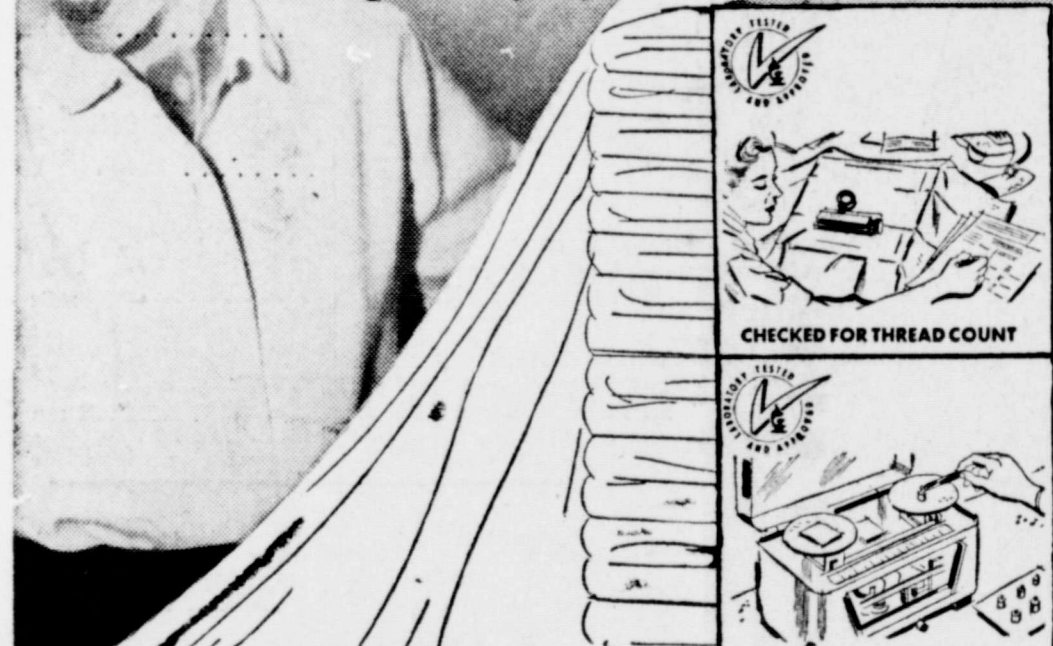
