The Henson company is operated by Mr. I. J. Show Exhibitors To Furnish Own Panels For Pens

Breeders exhibiting animals at the one day creep fed registered beef calf show to be held at the Cisco Show Barn on the Albany Highway on Friday, June 25, are asked to bring their own 8 foot by ten foot panels, show officials explained today.

The panels are to be four foot high and made out of six inch rough boards. They suggest that the panels be brought in the day before and set up if at all possible.

No entry fees are required. It is not necessary to list or enter the animals prior to the show. The show will be unique in that the calves to be shown in pens of three of the same sex will not be halter broke or will they know how to lead and will come to the show direct, off of the range.

All calves entered in competition must have been dropped after Sept. 25, 1953. Since some of the calves will not have been weaned it will be a one day show starting at 9 a. m. and being through by 3 p. m. No cash prizes are to be given. The winners, however, will get ribbons furnished through the courtesy of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce.

Howard Turner is general show superintendent and Ed Huestis is ground superintendent. Both are from Cisco. Breeders in not only Eastland but also in adjoining counties are eligible to show their calves at the one day affair. J. B. Humphrey, Jr., prominent Hereford Breeder of Old Glory, Texas, will judge entries.

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FORMER CISCO PASTOR ACCEPTS EDITORSHIP OF CHURCH PAPER

Dr. E. S. James resigned the pastorate of the First Baptist Church of Vernon Sunday morning to accept the editorship of the Baptist Standard, the denominational paper of the Baptist General Convention of Texas.

Dr. James will succeed Dr. David M. Gardner of Dallas, who will retire in November. Since becoming editor in 1944 Dr. Gardner has led Texas Baptists in building the largest circulation of any Baptist weekly in the world. The paper now has 280,000 subscribers; in 1944 there were 110,000.

The appointment of Dr. James as editor was made by the paper's board of directors, headed by the Rev. Charles Cockrell of Gariand. Dr. J. Ralph Grant of Lubbock was chairman of the committee making the selection.

Dr. James Sunday told his congregation at Vernon, "No minister has ever been happier than I have been during the 17 years as your pastor. The only reason I accepted this new position is that it affords Mrs. James and myself an opportunity to expand our Christian service.

Dr. James was born March 1, 1900, in Butler, Okla., and attended the Butler public schools. After graduating from Southwestern Oklahoma College with the A. B. degree, he taught in the public schools of Oklahoma for five years, two of which he served as superintendent and one as principal. He taught English one year at Oklahoma Teachers College.

Dr. James was converted and baptized at the Baptist church in Butler in 1921. He was ordained to the ministry the following year. In 1925 he married Miss Opal Clark at Leedey, Okla. They have had four children: Mrs. LeRoy Daniel and Mrs. Richard Hague, both of Wichita Falls, Bill James, now serving in the Navy, and Jo Ann, who was killed in an automobile accident in 1945.

Before going to the Vernon church in 1937, Dr. James pastored three other churches. These were in Leedey, Okla., 1922-26; Liberal, Kans., 1928-30, and Cisco, Texas, 1930-37. He was awarded the doctor of divinity degree by Howard Payne College in Brownwood in 1936.

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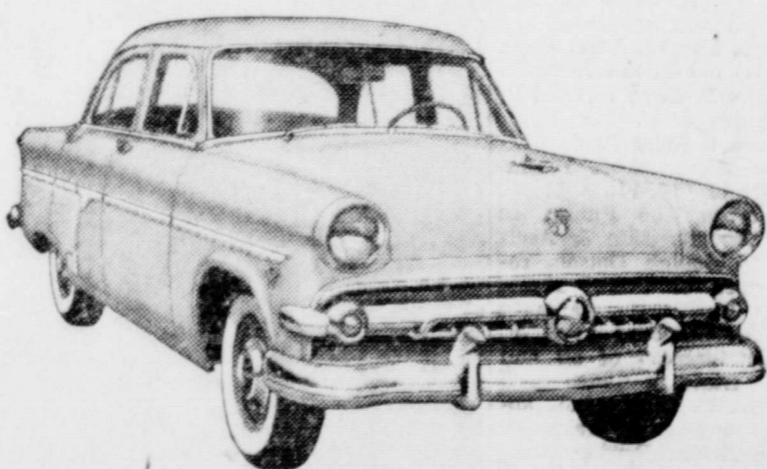
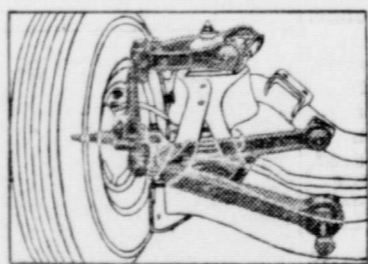

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Vets Questions And Answers

Q — Does the August 20, 1954 deadline for starting training under the Korean GI Bill apply to all post-Korea veterans?

Q — I'm a disabled Korean veteran in training under Public Law 16. I'm also eligible for Korea GI Bill training. I expect to finish my Public Law 16 training some time after August 20, my deadline for starting Korea

GI training. Will I be able to get Korea GI Bill training benefits, even though my cut-off date will have passed?

A — Yes. After you successfully complete your Public Law 16 training, you will be permitted to make further training under the Korea GI Bill, so long as it's a normal progression from the course you've already completed.

Q — I'm a Korean veteran and I was separated from service before August 20, 1952. Later I went back into service, and I've just been separated again. Will I have to start Korea training before August 20 of this year?

A — Not necessarily. For

post-Korea veterans who have had two periods of service, the separation marking the end of the last period is the one that counts. You will have two years from the date of your second separation in which to begin your Korea GI studies.

Q — I started Korea GI Bill training this past fall. Because of summer vacation, it won't be possible for me to be in training on the August 20 deadline date. Does that mean I won't be permitted to go ahead with my studies later?

A — No. So long as you began training before the cut-off date, it won't be necessary for you to be re-enrolled in school August 20. You will be permitted to continue with your studies at a later date, after the cut-off date.

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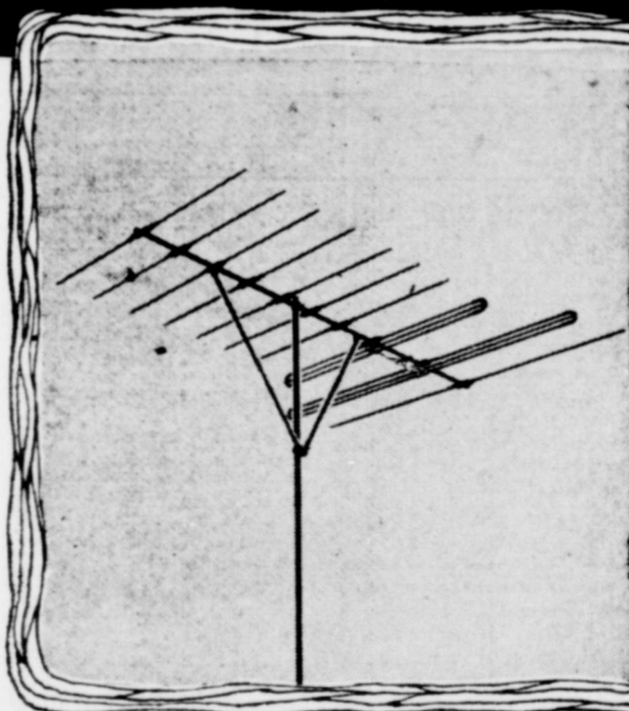
