## The Gay Philosopher

A NEW EDITOR took over down at Rising Star this week, and we like the way he wrote his first article. The new editor, of course, is Mr. B. A. Butler, who completed ten years as manager of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce on July 1. As you know, the Butlers purchased the Rising Star Record from the F. D. Hickses recently.

We quote part of Mr. Butler's first article, as follows: "It is customary when a new publisher takes over a newspaper that he write a piece welcoming himself to the community and reassuring the folks about his character and good intentions. These intentions are usually honorable and his promises sincere, although as it turns out in most cases, his ability to deliver is limited by the same conditions that his predecessors contended with, namely, the qualification of the publisher and the amount of business he gets.

"I strike this practical note at the outset of this piece for two reasons: to keep in mind that newspaper publishing is a business before it can be an art and, second, to let you know that we are not here expecting to perform any miracles. If there be any fruit in our newspaper experience it is the knowledge that successful publishing is a matter of hard work, common sense, and the ability to get along with people.

"Good journalism is not a matter of quantity, but of quality. The Record has long been known as one of the best small weekly newspapers in this section. It is our hope and our purpose to keep it so, to continue the work of its former editors.

"We have no literary ambitions to fulfill, no burning questions to resolve, no enemies to harass and no candidates to elect."

Without Mr. Butler's knowledge, a full page ad came in to "welcome the Butler family." It was a dandy tribute. We're sure that the Butlers and the Rising Star newspaper will get along well together and that they'll be appreciated by their community. The record of the Butlers as useful citizens of Cisco for many years was such that their friends know they'll succeed in a fine way at Rising Star.

THE ALCALDE, a magazine for University of Texas alumni, pays tribute to a former Ciscoan in its May edition, according to Mr. Leon Maner, a UofT ex. The former Ciscoan so honored is Dr. Wilson H. Elkins, who served as athletic director of Cisco High School in 1932 and 1933. He gave up the coaching career to accept a Rhodes Scholarship for study at Oxford from 1933 to 1936.

The occasion for the tribute in the alumni magazine was Dr. Elkins' election to the presidency of the University of Maryland, a job he takes over on Sept. 1. Dr. Elkins has been president of Texas Western University at El Paso for the past several years. His salary at Maryland is reported to be \$22,500, which will be the highest salary paid any official in the Maryland State government.

Burial was to be in the Putnam Cemetery with Wylie Funeral Home in charge of the arrangements. The body was to lie in state at Wylie Funeral Home until time for the services.

## ARMY OF GRASSHOPPERS INVADE COUNTY FIELDS AND PASTURES

Eastland County farmers, long plagued by drought, now face another danger — a heavy invasion of grasshoppers, according to County Agent J. M. Cooper, who recently made a survey of the county.

Cooper said that the heavy infiltration of the hoppers was the first trouble the county had had with the hearty eating insect in several years.

Hardest hit was C. M. McCain. His farm south of Eastland was invaded by hoppers and 175 acres of alfalfa was literally mowed to the ground.

Cooper said most of the damage in the county was being done by the yellow hoppers (defoliant). It was the yellow hoppers that left McCains field in destruction.

The hoppers destroyed several acres of cotton on the Ray Norris farm in the Flatwood community and even ate off 40 acres of his pasture land. Cooper said he had also spotted them west of Cisco.

The only outbreak of jumbo grasshoppers spotted so far in the county by the county agent was in the Bluff Branch community, eight miles west of Cisco.

"It's not serious yet," Cooper said, "but if weather conditions are favorable next spring we can expect the worst grasshopper year in a long time. What I mean

by weather conditions being favorable is that if we don't get a flood right at hatching time we can expect a lot of hoppers."

Cooper said that the invasion this year was almost at an end. By the middle of July the hoppers will slow down and start breeding and laying eggs. After that they will die. Then we have to worry about them next spring.

Cooper suggested the use of one of three insecticides. Taxaphene, Dieldrin or Chlordane were his suggestions.

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MR. CHURCHILL'S VISIT

President Eisenhower announced that the visit of Sir Winston Churchill and Mr. Eden to Washington was the Prime Minister's own idea. This in itself is an indication of the tremendous seriousness of the world situation...

The obvious fact is that, from the Western point of view, the world problem has worsened very materially in a brief period of time. The clearest example is the Geneva conference where, due to circumstances beyond his...

time, the President could get Congressional sanction for ordering American forces into action. And the French situation, in American officials' eyes is depressing in the extreme. There is no evidence that a French government can be formed which will have any permanence of real authority.

All this, along with confused and conflicting public opinion in this country, has forced the Administration to reappraise the whole situation. Little is being said now in official quarters in support of armed intervention in Southeast Asia.

The Admiral has publicly advocated aggressive intervention in Indochina, particularly with air attack from carriers. He has urged this on the President and the security council. General Ridgway has not spoken out publicly, but it is reliably reported that he has argued an opposite...

case before the council. He observed, it is said, that the majority of the people would be hostile to us or any other whites, and that all the military problems involved would be far more difficult than in Korea. To quote Marquis Childs, "Basic to Ridgway's thesis is the premise that America's main enemy is Soviet Russia. A corollary to this thesis is that the area essential to keep out Communist hands is western Europe with its great...

reservoir of industry and trained manpower." Those who agree with that line of thought feel that if we move in Southeast Asia, a cruel land war will become inevitable — and that we would waste away our manpower and materials to the ever-increasing benefit of Russia.

The decision is in the balance now. But it doesn't seem that it can remain so for long. The world moves with incredible speed these days.

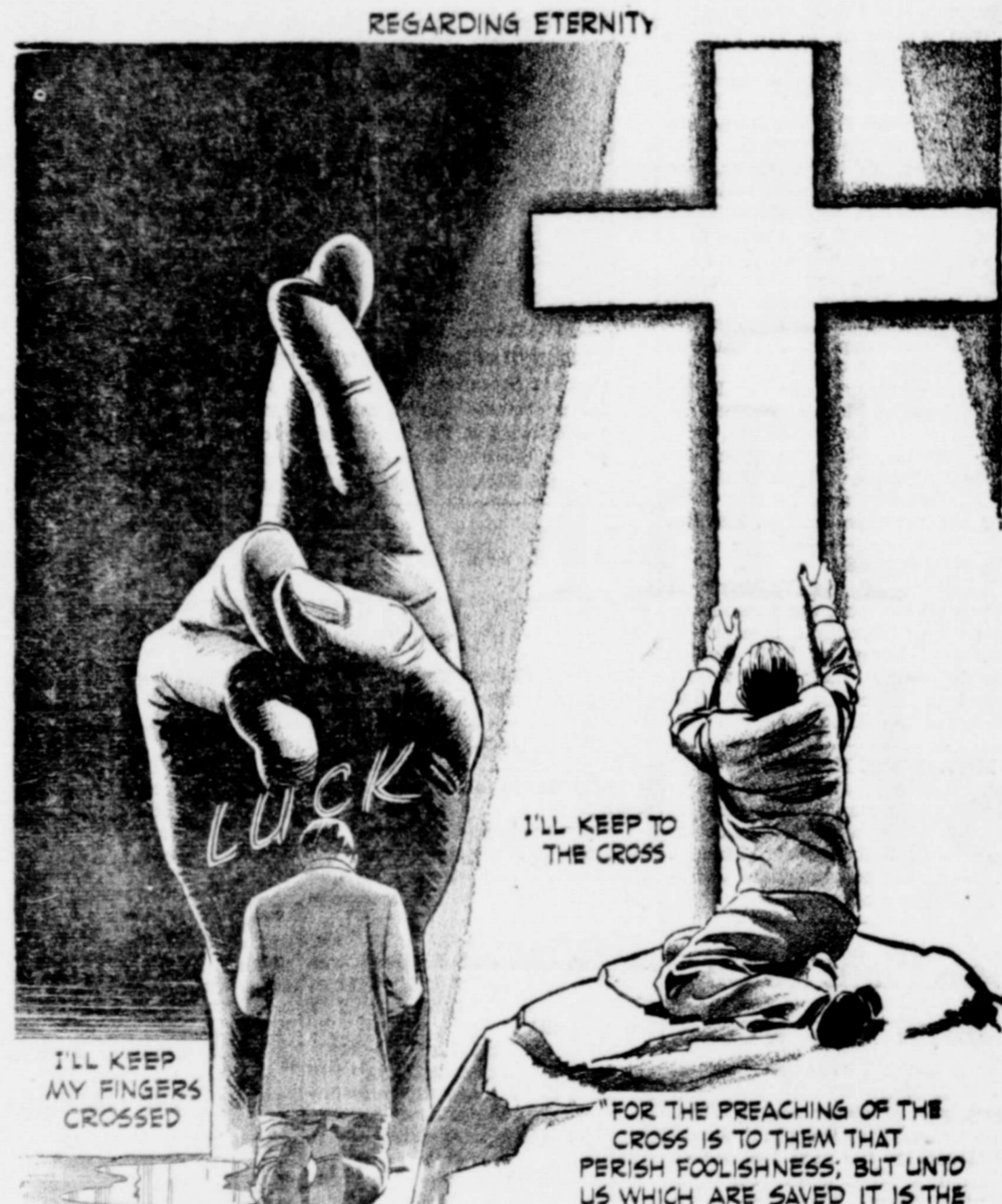

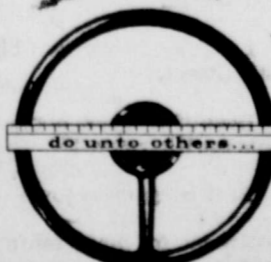

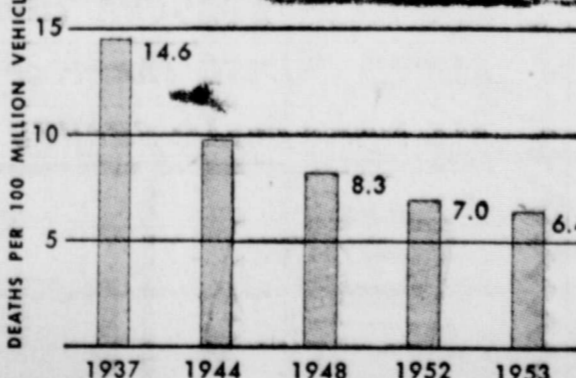
