YARBOROUGH IS RIDING FENCE IN RACE, GOVERNOR CHARGES

Governor Allan Shivers charged today that his main opponent is riding the fence on the fundamental issues of the Governor's race.

his stand on segregation in public schools, the George Parr-Duval County cleanup and the Texas tidelands.

In a statement released from his campaign headquarters in Austin, Governor Shivers said Candidate Ralph Yarborough is evading direct questions as to

"I am on record, clearly and directly, on these and every other important public issue," Governor Shivers said. "The people of Texas know where I stand. They have a right to know where he stands."

Governor Shivers repeated three questions which he had asked in previous speeches and statements, and to which the opposing candidate had offered no reply.

"1. Is it true that you have promised George Parr that you will call off the Duval County clean-up campaign if you are elected?"

"2. If you had been Governor of Texas two years ago, and the Democratic nominee for President told you in person and in writing that he would veto any bill returning the Texas tidelands to us, what would you have done?"

"3. Is it true that you, like many of your backers, including the CIO-PAC and the NAACP, are in favor of an immediate end to segregation in the Texas public schools?"

Governor Shivers said he will elaborate upon these and other questions of public interest in his campaign speeches during his East Texas tour of the next three days.

"My opponent is hiding behind a smoke screen of false and fact-twisting personal charges, instead of discussing the real issues of this campaign," Governor Shivers said. "He continues to try to make something of a land transaction eight years ago in which I made a profit. I have reported fully to the people of Texas upon this transaction, which was a legal, legitimate, honest and aboveboard business deal which no one has ever questioned — except my opponent and his political henchmen."

"I do not propose to spend the rest of this campaign discussing personalities. I am going to continue to make my views known on important issues and call on my views known on important issues and call on my opponent to do the same."

Ben Ramsey Goes To West Texas In Bid For Support

AUSTIN, July 13. — Lieutenant Governor Ben Ramsey has stepped up his campaign for reelection with trips to West Texas and the Panhandle where he proposed stock piling oil for defense.

The East Texas lawyer, a steady but quiet campaigner, said the increasing importation of foreign oil is hurting the petroleum industry which foots about half the state's tax bill.

"A few Texas oil men could financially stand serious price cut-backs, but the majority of the people connected with our oil industry could not. Some of these include farmers and ranchers with leases and royalties. Others are having a hard time now keeping their exploration going," Ramsey said.

"Many of our state services, including schools, colleges and regular operating expenses, are paid for out of oil tax money," Ramsey said. "If our state revenues from petroleum steadily decline, we are in for a pinch which I think is unnecessary."

Ramsey, who consistently works to keep state economy and state services in balance for the welfare of all the people, proposed a solution to the impact of foreign oil imports on state and national economy. The lieutenant governor said, "as long as the national government feels the importation of foreign oil is necessary for defense planning, and as long as we keep spending dollars abroad in aid programs, we might as well put the two together and come up with something that bolsters, and not weakens, our own economy." Ramsey said engineers have advised stock piling oil is feasible. "I think," Ramsey said, "the national government might well consider stockpiling oil with funds in the foreign aid bill now being considered by Congress."

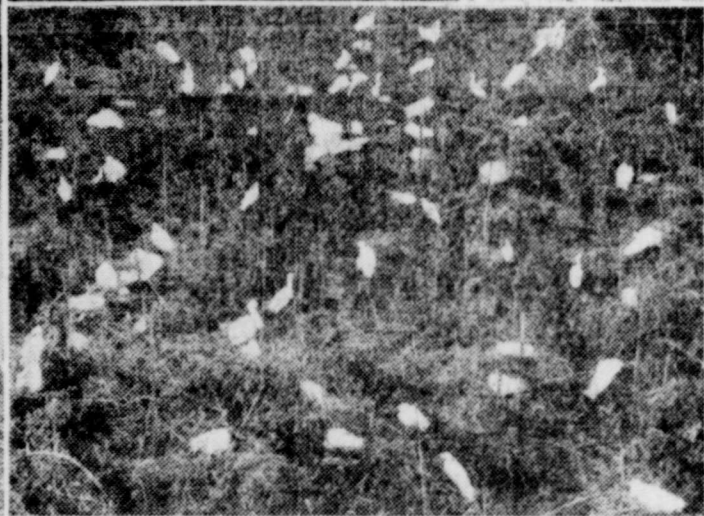
