AUSTIN, July 20.-Lieutenant Jovernor Ben Ramsey has urged farmers and ranchers, who will penefit first, to take the lead in the development of a state-wide water conservation program.

Ramsey said a water program to first assist farmers and ranchers would bolster state economy. 'When the farmer prospers," the lieutenant governor said, "I notice that the merchant, the manufacturer and the public generally do pretty well also.


