SATURDAY IS election day in Cisco and Texas. And every eligible voter should make it his business to go to the polls and vote. You've no doubt seen a copy of the ballot by now, and you've noticed that there aren't many people running for office this year as last year.

We're not much of a politician. In the governor's race, we'd like to see Governor Allan Shivers returned to office. We don't believe the people of Texas would want a mud-slinger of the muckraker type in their highest office, particularly when the mud slings is composed of pure wash.

We feel that Lieut. Governor Ramsey merits consideration in re-election. Like Shivers, he is a conservative and is a splendid Christian gentleman. And, of course, John Ben Shepperd should be re-elected. In the U. S. Senate race, it's hard for us to forget the campaign of six years ago when the re-count in one of the South Texas counties' boxes gave the incumbent an 87-vote victory.

In the court races, Mr. Alfred L. Scott of Austin is a candidate for Place 1, Supreme Court of Texas. He grew up in Cisco, graduating from high school here in 1912. He went away to business college at Fort Worth and later went to France in World War I. After the war, he studied law at the UoIT and settled in Austin.

THE PRESS PLANS to work a little late Saturday night so you can have all of the election returns when your paper is delivered Sunday morning. Due to the comparatively few candidates, results should be known earlier this year than usual.

If you will study the ballot, a copy of which appears elsewhere in The Press, you will notice that you can vote by marking an "X" in the boxes or by scratching out the names of those you are against. It will be a lot faster if you use the "X" system.

FAMILY REUNIONS BRING LARGE CROWDS TO LAKE CISCO PARK

Reunions over the past two week ends were chiefly responsible for good crowds at the Lake Cisco Swimming Pool. Adult ticket sales reached 247 on Sunday, July 11, while last Sunday 197 was the total for 35-cent tickets sold.

Most of the swimmers on these Sundays came to this area to attend a family reunion. The skating rink, golf course and the kiddie rides were busy, too. Sometimes we wonder whether the residents of the Cisco area appreciate the business these "reunions" bring to town.

One of the large family gatherings over last week end, starting Friday, was the Maginnis reunion that brought families from at least five states. It all started when the chamber of commerce secretary relayed a letter from J. T. Shelton of Ashdown, Arkansas. This gentleman from the town just northeast of Texarkana wanted some good reasons why the Maginnis reunion should be held here. He needed some facts to "sell" family members on coming to Cisco.

As a result of our letter nearly 50 families camped out in the park last Friday and Saturday nights, coming from as far off as California. Mr. Shelton was happy about the many recreational facilities for young and old, the climate and the cooperation he received from everybody connected with the park.

We believe that he and his group will return in 1955, but a noisy reception from a 1934 or 1935 car late Friday night, while the reunions were trying to get some sleep could ruin any Maginnis reunion for 1955 at Lake Cisco. As one of Mr. Shelton's assistants said, "There were two boys and two girls in the car that circled round and round. They stopped and broke some of the big light bulbs, then dumped over some garbage cans and pounded upon the bottom of the cans with stones."

About 2,000 Are Expected To Vote In Cisco's Boxes

Voters of Cisco and Eastland County will cast ballots in six contested races for public office when they go to the polls in the Democratic first primary election Saturday. The local voters will also help Texans decide the outcome in six state races.

Approximately 2,000 Ciscoans are expected to take part in the election. East side residents will vote at the Cisco Gas Corporation, while residents of the west side will vote at the City Hall. W. R. (Bill) Huestis, chairman of the East Cisco precinct, has announced the appointment of election judges as follows: Mr. and Mrs. W. W. Wallace, C. B. Dill, Kent Word, Mrs. R. L. Justice, Mrs. C. P. Chick, C. W. Reed and Mrs. W. R. Huestis.

Fred Grist will be the presiding judge at the West Cisco polling place. His assistants will include J. V. Heyser, Sr., W. W. Fewell, Mrs. W. W. Fewell, J. W. Cooper, O. W. Kean, Mrs. Roy Camfield, J. V. Heyser, Jr., Mrs. B. F. Thomas, Mrs. Lee Heltzel, Mrs. S. C. Shaw, E. J. Poe, Mrs. B. S. Huey, Mrs. H. L. Thompson, O. J. Russell, Mrs. Jim Flournoy, J. A. Reagan and Mrs. F. B. Clampitt.

This year's primary ballot is the lightest it has been in years. In only two races could a runoff develop. There are three candidates for the office of state representative and for county sheriff. Runoffs could develop in four of the six state races.

Highway Patrol Job Applications Are Being Taken

AUSTIN, July 23.—Homer Garrison, Jr. Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, announced today that the Texas Highway Patrol will accept applications between now and August 25th from young Texans for appointment to the Texas Highway Patrol.

The Public Safety Director invites all young men who are interested in a career of law enforcement to make application as early as possible. He pointed out that they must be between 21 and 35 years of age, inclusive, have a high school education, be at least 5 feet 8 inches in height and weigh not less than two nor more than three and one-half pounds per inch of height.

Garrison emphasized, too, that applicants must have been citizens of Texas for at least a year and they must be of good moral character and in perfect physical condition and able to withstand a rigid character investigation.

Application forms, Garrison said, may be obtained from all Texas Highway Patrol District Offices or by writing directly to W. J. Elliott, Chief, Texas Highway Patrol, at Austin.

A native of the Scranton community, Mr. Bradshaw is a veteran of five and a half years service in the U. S. Army, including a tour of duty in Europe. He worked for Cogdell Auto Supply for several years before taking over the Texaco station.

The new station operates 24 hours per day. Employees include Seferino Topez, Homer Taylor, Allen Garverick and Ed Garverick.

Voters of Eastland, Callahan and Shackelford Counties will cast their ballots to decide who will be their State Representative (76th district) for the next two years. Incumbent Omar Burkett is opposed by Paul Brashear of Cisco and Charles H. Dawson of Cross Plains. Brashear is a newcomer to the race, both Burkett and Dawson having been in the contest two years ago.

John C. Nicholas of Carbon is contesting Roy L. Lane of Eastland for District Clerk of Eastland County. Mr. Lane has held the office several terms, and Mr. Nicholas is making his second effort to unseat Mr. Lane.

County Judge John Hart is opposed for a third term by C. S. Eldridge of Desdemona. Eldridge ran against Judge Hart in two previous campaigns. In the county sheriff's race, incumbent J. Frank Tucker is being opposed for a third term by E. L. (Jug) Dennis of Gorman and J. B. Williams of Eastland. Dennis is constable at Gorman, and Williams formerly was sheriff of the county.

Two precinct races will be decided by local voters. J. E. (Ed) McCanlies and Arch Bint are candidates for county commissioner from Precinct 4. Mr. McCanlies defeated Mr. Bint for the office two years ago. Mr. Bint held the office several terms before losing to Mr. McCanlies. Incumbent Henry H. Curtis is opposed for re-election as justice of the peace here by Ross Griffith.

Interest has been high in the governor's race. Governor Allan Shivers has three opponents in his bid for re-election. He is opposed by Cyclone Davis, J. J. Holmes and Ralph Yarbrough. Shivers carried the county two years ago, 3,600 votes to 3,000 for Yarbrough.

In other state races, voters will elect a lieutenant governor, an attorney general, a United States Senator, a supreme court justice (place 1) and a judge for the court of criminal appeals.

Only 135 votes were cast by absentee ballot for the first primary, indicating that interest might not be as high as in former years when several hundred absentee votes were cast.

Returns from the various boxes are expected to be in earlier than usual this year due to the short ballot. A copy of the official ballot appears elsewhere in today's edition of The Press.

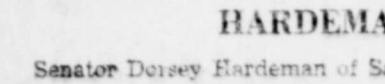

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BARDEMAN'S PLAN

Senator Donsey Hardeman of San Angelo, Chairman of the Texas Water Resources Committee has proposed a \$100,000,000 bond issue by the State as a possible means of assistance in the financing of Texas Water projects. He outlined the plan in a letter to J. B. Thomas of Fort Worth, Chairman of the Governor's Water Conservation Committee, mentioning the fact that it would most likely require a constitutional amendment. The Texas Water Resources Committee was set up by the last Legislature to study the over-all water problem in Texas and Chairman Hardeman outlines his water development proposal in detail herewith:

ters of the state and artificial canals connecting them with each other are concerned. Also, it is important to remember that the waters of the ordinary flow and underflow river and tides of every flowing river or natural stream, of all lakes, the storm, flood or rain waters of every river or natural stream, canyon, ravine, depression or watershed within the state of Texas are the property of the state.

Water rights do not generally attach to surface waters and the main question regarding them is that of liability for wrongful obstruction or diversion.

A right to use the state's water is restricted to "so much thereof as may be necessarily required when beneficially used" for the purposes outlined in the Constitution and statutes.

Percolating waters or ordinary small springs, not forming the sources of a stream, are usually regarded as belonging to the owner of the land upon which they emerge. The same is true as to waters of an artificial lake constructed on private property.

No discussion of riparian rights is attempted herein since such attach only to the waters found below the line of highest ordinary flow of the stream while those above that line are flood water or potential flood water and belong to the state of Texas and cannot legally be used by the riparian in the absence of a proper permit.

The policy of the law is that no agency, political subdivision or other legal entity or individual shall impound more waters, subject to appropriation, than can reasonably be expected to be beneficially utilized to accomplish the purposes prescribed in the Constitution and statutes of the state.

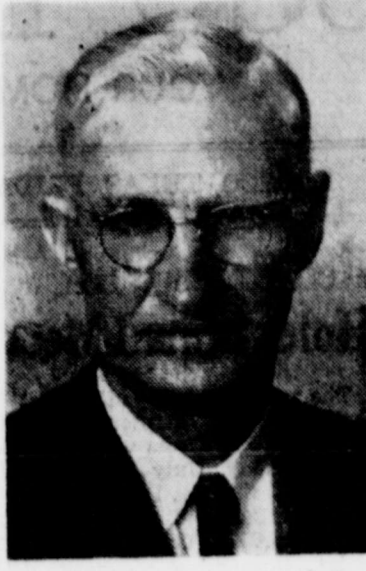
Too often uniformed enthusiasts advocate reservoir construction without due regard for the rights of the public generally. Unless a project is engineeringly feasible, economically sound and legally acceptable, it may as well not be undertaken. More harm than good results.

The State Water Resources Committee is devoting constant study to the purposes of taking a complete inventory of the water resources of the state and to develop a "long-range water policy and conservation program for the entire state of Texas."

From its study thus far, it appears that the matter of financing conservation and development projects is by far the most difficult of solution. Many political subdivisions without adequate water supply, find themselves near their debt limit and unable to finance necessary expansion and thus, lose the storm or flood waters that otherwise might be put to beneficial use.

It is for such reasons that I have suggested the issuance of bonds by the state, similar to the Veterans Land program to create a revolving fund to be used in assisting in financing feasible and justifiable programs by those political subdivisions or state agencies which are unable to bear the full and immediate financial obligations.

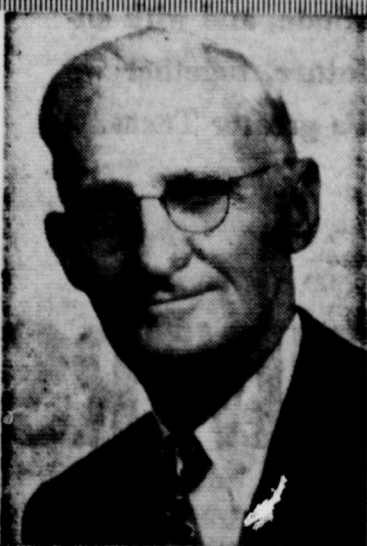

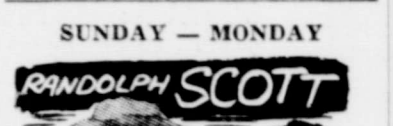
