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Plan Is Readied To Trap Big Game In Fall Months

AUSTIN, July 24. — Plans are going ahead to begin big game trapping this fall under the expanded transplanting program recently approved by the Game and Fish Commission, according to the Commission's Executive Secretary.

The Executive Secretary pointed out that other ranches or farms having a surplus of big game may qualify providing the demand justifies it.

The program, which augments the standard trapping pattern for approved restoration areas, permits ranches seeking deer and turkey for marginal areas to obtain the desired stock by paying trapping and production costs.

All permits will be processed through Commission headquarters in Austin.

The Executive Secretary said the new Commission regulation liberalizes restocking provisions primarily to distribute surplus deer and turkey over a broader area.

"Obviously, the cost of this undertaking will be substantial to the person seeking this game," said the Executive Secretary. "The overhead will include a reasonable price to the rancher producing the game, raised in competition with livestock, and also Commission costs of trapping."

He added that some smaller ranchers may qualify under this trapping program if they have surplus big game not available for harvesting by hunters.

The Executive Secretary pointed out that the new program does NOT affect existing regulations permitting trapping of surplus game for exchange with other states on an equitable basis.

Mr. and Mrs. M. O. Cheves of Iowa Park visited this week in the home of their son and his family, Mr. and Mrs. E. H. Cheves.

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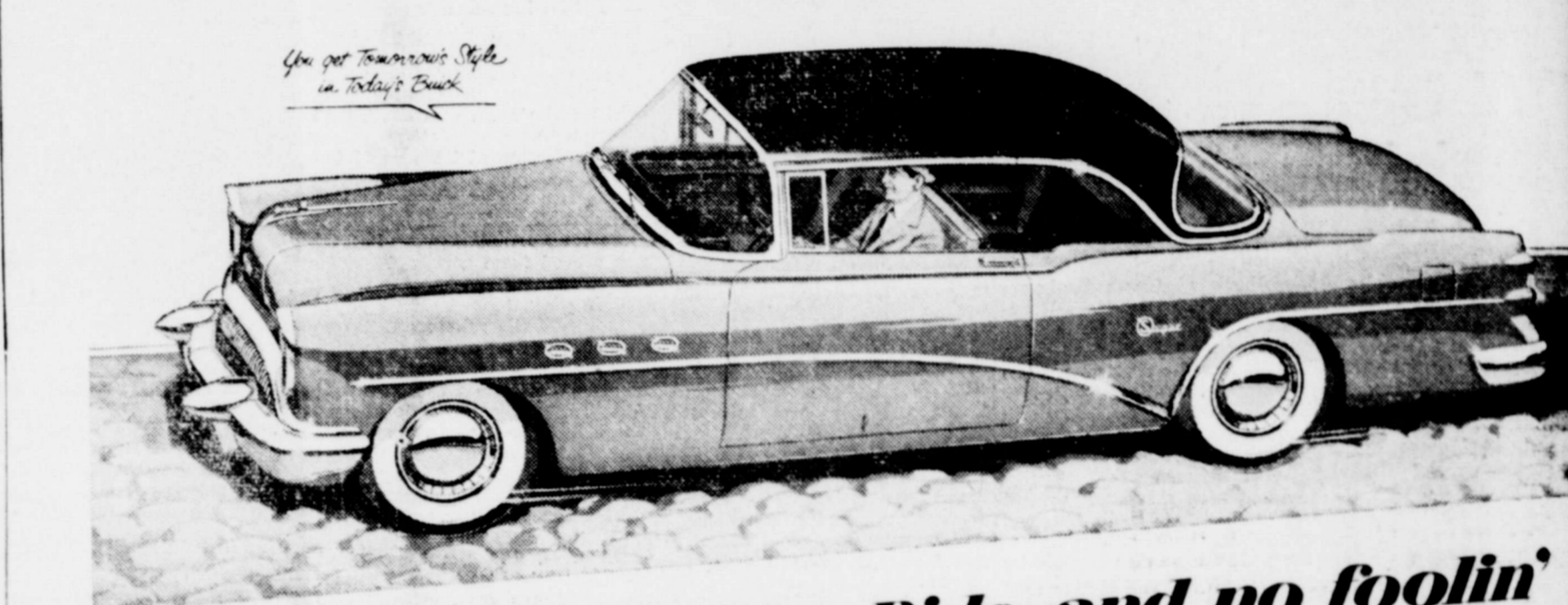
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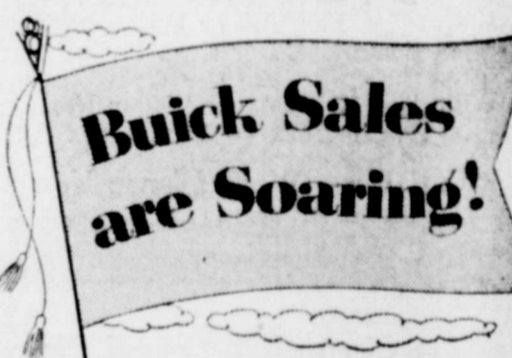
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
