ALL OF YOU read in The Press last Thursday that the sum of \$40,000 was raised in Cisco in three and a half days to provide a fund to be loaned to the City of Cisco for the erection of an addition to the Boss Manufacturing Company building. This was a pretty outstanding accomplishment for our town, and it was described by the Chamber of Commerce committee in charge as "a tribute to the initiative of our people."

As you know, the City needs \$40,000 to erect a 70x160 addition to the Boss building, which the city owns. The Boss company wants to increase its glove production here by 50% and needs the space. Boss is willing to pay rent at the rate of \$400 per month.

When these facts were announced in The Press, the committee — composed of James P. McCracken, A. D. Anderson and G. R. Nance — hardly had to work. Volunteers began telephoning or dropping by their offices.

Boss company employees met and raised \$5,000 of the fund. City workers put in about \$2,500. We heard that one offer came in from a man who wanted to buy \$10,000 worth of the warrants, which will pay 5% interest per annum, but the committee limited him to \$1,000.

This all can well be interpreted as an expression of faith in Cisco and the Boss company. As a citizen and business man, it makes us feel mighty proud of our town. If we can do things like this, there's no limit to what our city can accomplish. Let's keep these shoulders to the wheel and work on other projects.

ALSO IN THE Thursday paper was a story about a Hollywood studio wanting a Texas ranch to use in shooting a motion picture. There ought to be a good many in this part of the country. Understand that the Mel Sanders, Randy Steffen, Shy Osborn and others will make some pictures to send the studio.

We've heard of deals where motion picture studios go into towns for pictures. They employ up to several hundred of the local people for extra roles — crowd scenes and the like. And they spend a lot of money on properties and so forth. It would be a good deal if Cisco could attract this company.

BOARD APPROVES TRANSFER OF 18 AREA STUDENTS TO CISCO

Applications for transfer of 18 area students from other schools to the Cisco schools have been approved by the county school superintendent's office, it was reported Saturday by County School Superintendent Carl Elliott.

Transfer applications were on file prior to June 1, 1954, according to state law, and the county school board acted favorably on the applications, it was announced.

According to state education laws transfer applications must be in the hands of the county superintendent by June 1 in order for state aid to be transferred. A new ruling allows students to transfer until September 1, but all applications ap-

proved after June 1 will be made without the transfer of state aid.

Of the 18 transfers to the Cisco schools 13 were from the Scranton Common School District and five from the Eastland Independent School District.

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Heavy Fines Are Warning To Game Law Violators

The Director of Law Enforcement for the Game and Fish Commission said recent severe penalties inflicted by Texas courts for out-of-season deer hunting should serve as ample warning.

He called attention to several \$200 fines plus costs, in the latest arrest report, which were levied for raids on the state's big game herds.

The Director of Law Enforcement said wardens are trying particularly hard now to protect deer since the game animals are beginning to reappear again after the fawning season.

"Deer usually disappear for a time after the new fawn crop comes on," said the Director. "But now the does are beginning to quit seclusion with some of the early fawns, especially in view of the drought-seared ranges. They are showing up in public places as highway shoulders in search of food and therefore tempt a few to shoot them."

The Director recommended some of the arrest report cases for high priority reading material for persons getting itchy trigger fingers. A Corpus Christi man was fined \$200 plus costs for killing a doe deer. The same penalty was assessed a Portland man for "hunting deer in closed season." Men from both Dallas and Ingleside got similar sentences.

"Some of our deer are desperate for nourishment," said the Director. "In fact, in the more severe drought areas, we are getting occasional reports of deer actually starving to death.

"This crisis gives Texans a fine opportunity to show their true sportsmanship. For those who choose otherwise, they stand reminded that our wardens are using every modern means of law enforcement available to protect the deer herds."

CONSERVATION SERVICE WARNS OF DANGER OF PASTURE FIRES

Area farmers and ranchers were warned Saturday by local soil conservation authorities to exert every effort to combat rural fires that take a huge toll annually. The following statement was issued by the Eastland County office of the service:

"Every year fires cause untold millions of dollars damage in the southwest. The damage may be to livestock, barns, homes, and fences as well as to grass and the land on which the grass is growing. Stock that survive a fire must be sold off or feed bought for them.

"The greatest damage though, the damage to the land, can not be accurately calculated in dollars and cents. When a pasture is burned the dead grass cover and litter, the partially decomposed litter that has been accumulating on the ground for years and years and yet unsprouted grass seed are all lost. Recovery may take from 10 to 15 years even under careful management.

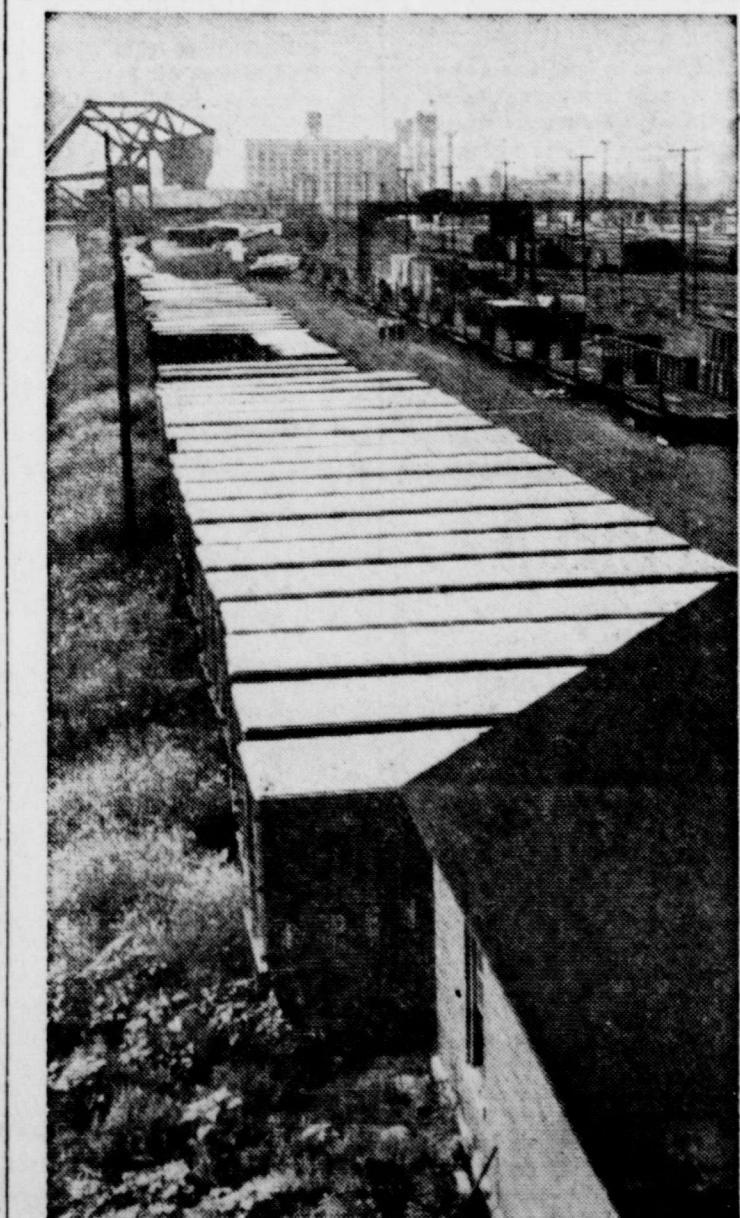
"Cover and litter enables the soil to take in and hold more rainfall and also provides a mulch to cut down on surface evaporation and prevent crusting. The loss of cover and litter leaves the barren ground open to the ravages of both water and wind erosion. When rain falls on a burned off area the barren ground seals over and the water runs off instead of soaking in and the life-giving top soil is lost with the water.

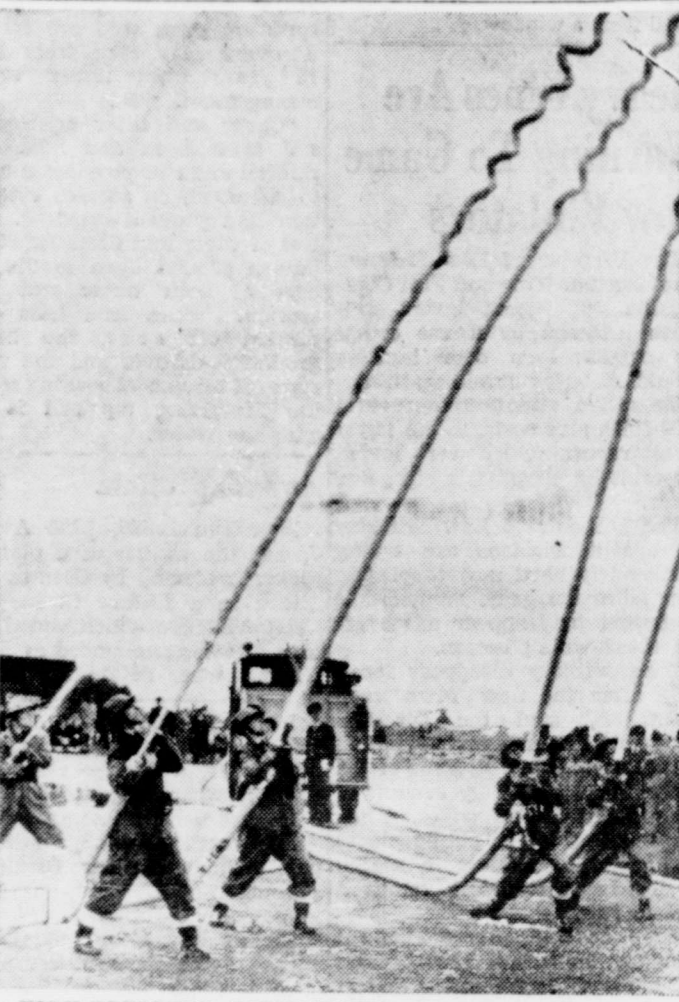

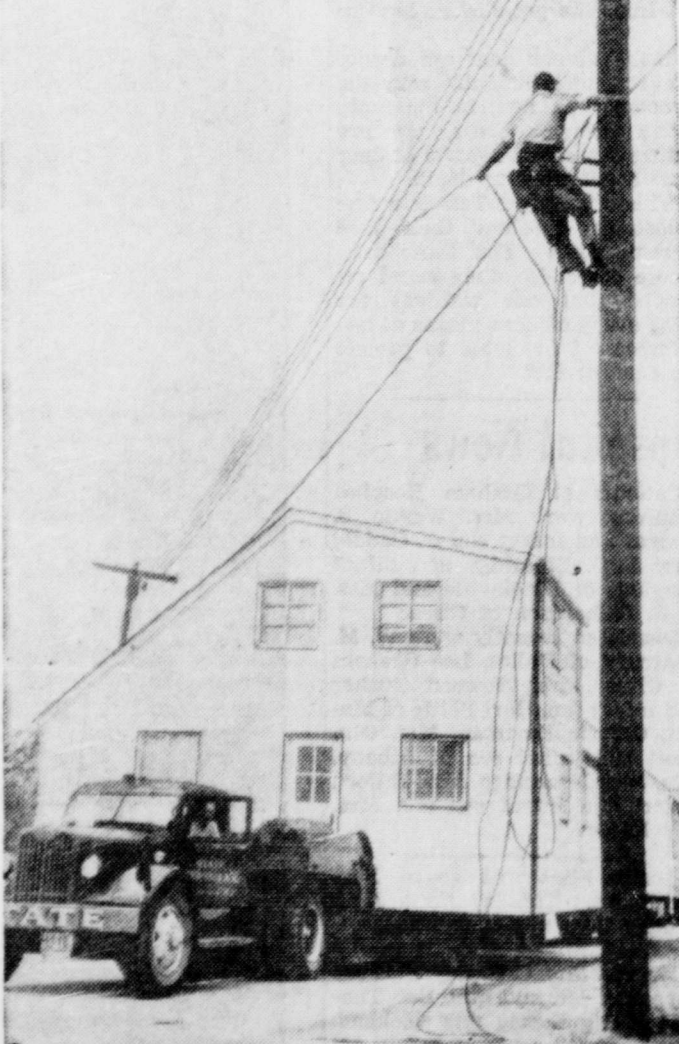

After a social period on the lawn the guests were invited to see the gifts, arranged in the reception room of the home.

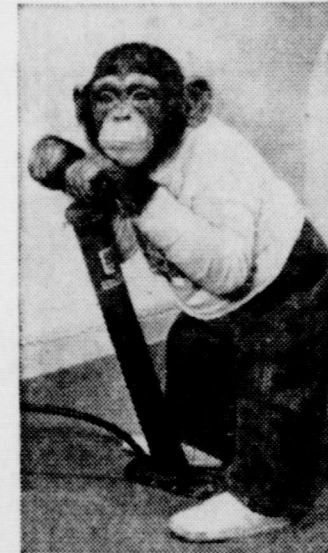

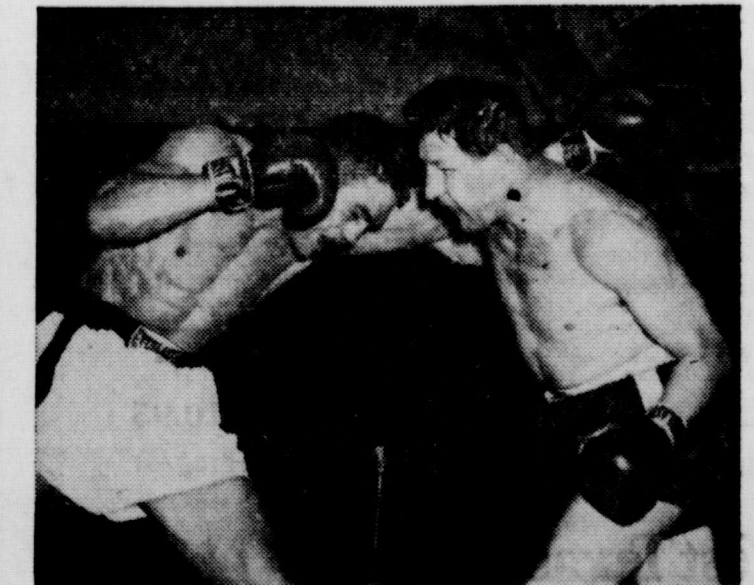

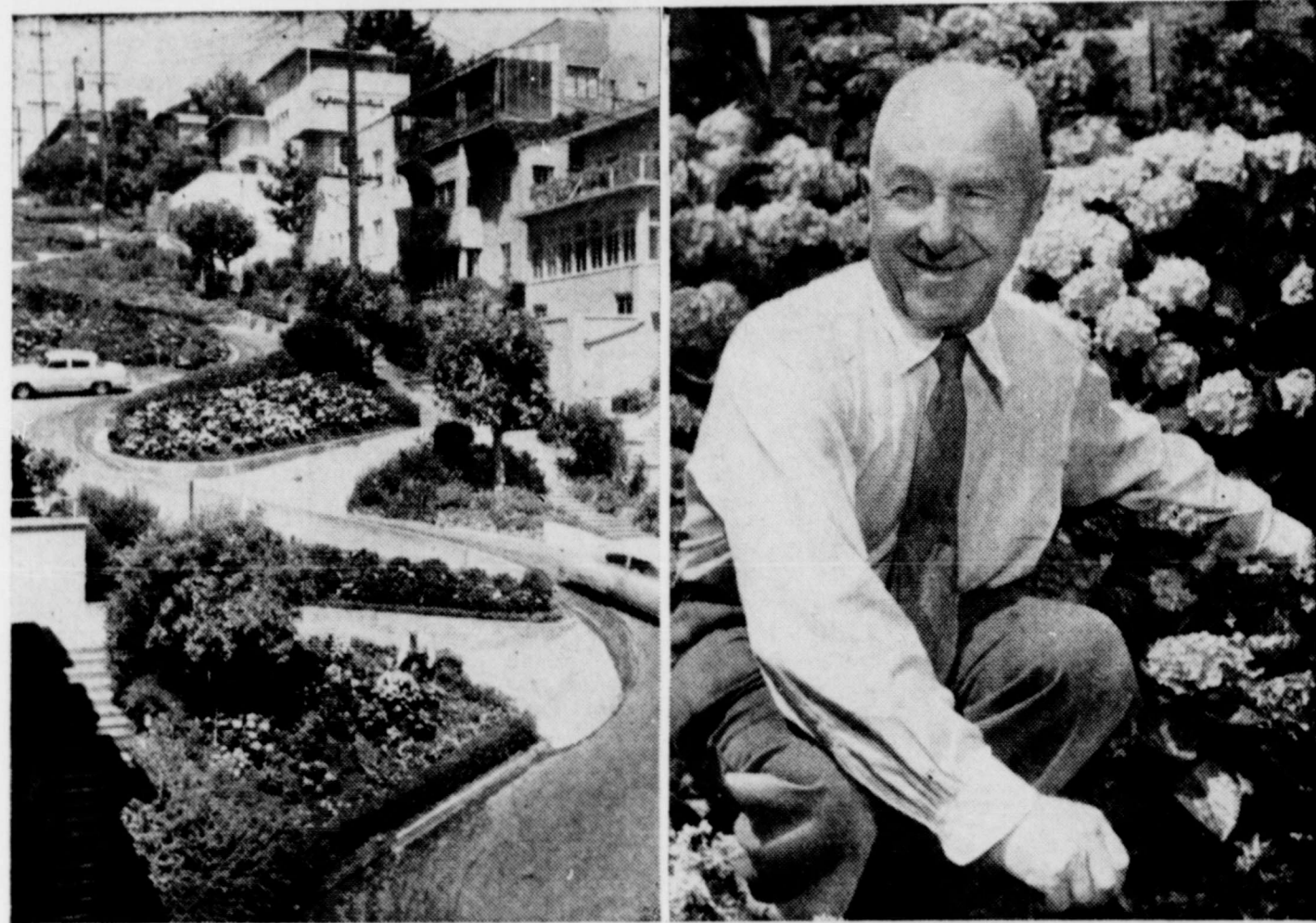

"Vacancies exist in good Civil Service jobs right now. These jobs will be filled during August and September," the announcement said.

College graduates who have completed the courses of study listed in the examination announcement may qualify to take the written Civil Service examination for these positions.

To be assured of earliest possible consideration, persons interested in these positions should apply by August 10, 1954.

In making application, candidates should obtain a copy of examination Announcement No. 8-136(1953) for Junior Professional Assistant and should file application Form 5000AB with the Director, Eighth U. S. Civil Service Region, 1114 Commerce Street, Dallas, Texas, in accordance with the terms of the announcement. These forms may be obtained at most large post offices and at the Regional Office of the Civil Service Commission.

The beginning salary is \$3410 a year but the opportunities for advancement are excellent. The next promotion is usually to a position having a salary of \$4205 a year.
