### Shivers Speaks Tuesday Night At Brownwood

Governor Allan Shivers will bring his campaign for re-election to Central Texas this week when he speaks at a gigantic political rally at Brownwood. The rally, one of the most important in the stormy run-off campaign, will be held on the Courthouse lawn in Brownwood, Tuesday night, August 24, at 7:30 o'clock.

The Brownwood speech is billed as one of the major efforts of a campaign that has been marked by bitterness and all-out campaigning on the part of both candidates in the contest which will come to a close with the Democratic run-off primary August 28. Voters from throughout Central Texas have been invited to attend the rally.

The Brown County Shivers Club, which is making arrangements for the event, expects several thousand people to be on hand for the occasion, which will mark the governor's last appearance in Central Texas before the election. He speaks in San Antonio Monday night, and following the Brownwood engagement, will take his campaign eastward for the final few days in East Texas.

Governor Shivers will arrive in Brownwood at noon Tuesday, and will spend the afternoon on a hand-shaking visit to several communities surrounding Brownwood.

### New Licenses Will Go On Sale This Week

AUSTIN, Aug. 24.—The Chief Clerk of the Texas Game and Fish Commission said new hunting and fishing licenses, valid for the state fiscal year beginning September, will be mailed August 24. He has asked the state's 1,700 licensed deputies to promptly return unissued old licenses and stubs in their possession as of August 31.

The Chief Clerk requested the licensed deputies to order supplies of Game and Fish Law Digests by mail. Supplies of the new Migratory Game Bird Supplement will be forwarded just as soon as available.

The Farmers Home Administration office in Eastland is accepting applications for drought relief aid, it was reported Saturday by George I. Lane, head of the office.

All farmers and ranchers in the county are eligible for a 60 day supply of hay and grain under the new program, Lane said. His office is open Monday through Friday of each week.

## About 50 Candidates Expected To Report For Grid Practice

Coach Jay Williams was expecting from 45 to 50 candidates for positions on his 1954 Lobo football machine to be at the field house at 7 a. m. Monday to begin drills for the coming season.

Among the 45 to 50 candidates will be 15 lettermen returning from last year's team. Those lettermen will be bolstered by several good prospects from the "B" squad last year.

Indications are that the coaches will field a team this year that will average approximately 175 pounds in the line and 150 pounds in the backfield. The added weight and added experience make the prospects for a good team better than last season.

Despite the increased weight and added experience, sports writers are picking the Lobos to finish sixth in the six team race for the district crown. They pick

Mineral Wells to finish in the top spot, and Stephenville, Weatherford, Graham, Ranger, and Cisco to finish in that order.

Coach Jay Williams, Assistant Coach Charles Williams and "B" team Coach Lynn Glass will be working in fundamentals Monday at the initial drill, and will probably hold a light scrimmage session Monday afternoon. Plans call for holding drills at 7 a. m. and 5 p. m. all this week.

The team will be built around the following returning lettermen: Ends Bill Smith and Jerry Weiser; tackles Edward Bernie, Kenneth Penn and Carroll Thames; guards Joe Farrow, Artzell Hale and Tommy Collier and Center Ronnie Qualls, on the forward wall; and Tommy Reynolds,

Harold Phippen, Marcus Gallegos, Buck Whitehead, Benji Lipsy and Fred Hayes, backs.

Best "B" team prospects are Johnny Trig and Jimmy Branton at ends; LeVere Adams and Don Meier at tackles; J. Frank Walton at guard; Robert Fletcher and Bobby Cluck at center and Howard Hamilton, David Ewell, Joe Gilmore, Paul Ford and Jimmy Sublett at backs. John Carlisle a member of last year's "A" team, was also expected to come through and play a lot of ball this season. Those boys, and other recruits from the "B" team and the junior high Midgets were expected to give the coaches a well rounded squad.

Coach Williams said that he would probably shift some of the boys to different positions in order to give depth in every spot.

## City Opens Bids Tuesday Night On Addition To Boss Building

### Ten Contractors Are Expected To Seek Local Job

Some ten contractors are expected to submit bids to the City of Cisco at the semi-monthly Commission meeting on Tuesday night for a contract to erect a large addition to the Boss Manufacturing Company building here.

Plans and specifications had been obtained from Cisco, Abilene, Stephenville, Waco and Bryan. The City has advertised that bids on the project will be opened at 7:30 p. m. Tuesday, Aug. 24, at the regular meeting.

The City of Cisco, owners of the Boss building, plans to erect a 70x160 foot addition. This was expected to cost in the neighborhood of \$30,000. In addition, the structure will be equipped with an overhead sprinkler system, expected to cost \$10,000 or more. Bids on both projects will be opened at the meeting.

The Boss company, which employs about 160 persons, had requested the City to provide additional space in order that production of their Cisco plant might be doubled.

Funds to finance the building project have been pledged by Cisco residents, who will buy 5% per annum revenue warrants. The City will pay off the warrants from the proceeds of the rental contract with the Boss Company. The City will receive rent in the sum of \$400 per month for the property.

Mayor G. C. Rosenthal reported that the rent contract is now being negotiated. The company has agreed to pay \$400 per month for a period of 12 years. The contract will have renewal options and will provide that the company may buy the building on payment of a specified sum, Mr. Rosenthal added.

Several other business matters are due to be taken up by the Commission at the Tuesday session.

### RECORD NUMBER OF ABSENTEE VOTERS EXPECTED FOR COUNTY

Eastland County appeared to be headed Saturday for a new record in the number of absentee ballots cast in a primary election, according to records at the office of County Clerk Johnson Smith. A total of 210 ballots had been cast Saturday morning.

Absentee voting for the August 28 second primary will continue through Tuesday, August 24, Mr. Smith said. More ballots had already been cast in the runoff election than in the July primary.

Candidates for offices to be decided next Saturday were expected to put on full steam this week in their last drives for votes. The official ballot will list four races — for governor, for the supreme court, for state legislature and for county sheriff.

The runoff primary will be held at the same polling places with the same presiding judges. The clerks will be different in some places due to the fact that less

Funeral services for John Evert Wood, 67 year old retired stock farmer, were held at 2 p. m. Saturday at the East Cisco Baptist Church. Mr. Wood died suddenly at his home at 7 p. m. Thursday.

The services were conducted by the Rev. H. D. Blair, retired missionary of the Cisco District of Methodist Churches, and the Rev. F. C. Bradley, Jr., pastor of the East Cisco church. Burial was in Oakwood Cemetery under the direction of Thomas Funeral Home.

Mr. Wood came to Cisco from Moran 12 years ago and had lived here since that time. He owned considerable property in and near Cisco. He was born on September 25, 1886, in Arkansas, and on September 25, 1904, was married to Miss Maude Hull in Liberty.

Survivors are his wife of Cisco; three sons, Thurman Wood of Moran, Troy Wood of Odessa and Loyd Wood of Cisco; two brothers Willie Wood of Cross Plains and Lonnie Wood of Cisco; and seven sisters, Mrs. Bill Phillips of Rising Star, Mrs. Mattie Madry of Big Spring, Mrs. Zannie Callahan of California, Mrs. John Holder of Stanton, Mrs. Harvey Boykin of Cisco, Mrs. Charles Pinkston of Irving and Mrs. Curtis Pilche of Le Leon.

Funeral services were conducted by David Darnell, minister of the church; Paul Witt, Abilene Christian College, and E. J. McKelvain, minister of the East 14th Street Church of Christ.

Burial was in the Eastland cemetery under the direction of Thomas Funeral Home.

Mrs. Reeves received fatal injuries in an automobile accident at 7:40 p. m. Thursday. She died in a local hospital about an hour later. The injuries were received when the car in which she was riding was in collision with a car driven by a 17 year old Cisco High School student.

Mr. and Mrs. L. N. Carlile and Mrs. Stella Callaway, all in the same car with Mrs. Reeves, received injuries in the accident, but were reported as improved Saturday. Mr. Carlile was the driver of the car. They were en route to attend services at the East 14th Street Church of Christ at the time of the accident.

Mrs. Reeves was born in Milligan on July 22, 1877, but moved to the Flatwoods community when she was seven years of age. She had lived there and in Cisco since that time. In 1892 she was married to Joe Reeves in the Flatwoods community.

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Smear Campaign Obscures Main Issue. We're getting slightly tired of the sort of campaigning that Ralph Yarborough is carrying on against Governor Allan Shivers.

He is devoting his entire campaign, practically, to scurrilous attacks and vicious smears against the governor. Every such attack has been proved unfounded or false, but the opposition candidate goes blithely on finding new ways to smear, and repeating the old.

Actually all this dirt obscures—as it is meant to—the one real issue of the campaign—which man would be the better governor for Texas. And what Mr. Yarborough has not done is to spend his expensive radio and television time telling of his own fitness and outstanding qualifications.

And there we agree. His only reputation is as an opponent to Governor Shivers. And in Allan Shivers the record shows that Texas has had a good governor. It seems to us the answer is simple enough if we just disregard the smoke screen and realize that the smear campaign against Governor Shivers is the recourse of a political opposition that has a candidate they can't sell on his own ability and fitness.

Dear Editor: I have read your Gay Philosopher Column in your issue of August 18th and since you mention Mr. Jay Cook, Editor of the Mission Times, Governor Shivers sheet and job printing establishment as being the son in law of Mr. H. A. McCannies of Cisco, I think the facts rather than your article of slanted misstatements might be more appropriate, and of more interest to local people.

For that reason I have placed a file showing photostatic copies of the annual statements of ownership of the Mission Times as sworn to by Jay Cook in their required statement to the Post Office Department, copy of letters dated July 12, 1954 Mr. Cook sent to his fellow Editors of Texas papers, a list of 67 state contracts for printing given the Shivers-Shary printing firm being a part of the contracts given that firm in which Shivers is one of the owners and organizers in direct violation of the constitution of Texas.

This file may be seen at Lemore Pharmacy and I do not know how they plan to vote. The place is air conditioned and a seat is available and if you doubt that your statement that Shivers got rid of his stock when he became Governor go down there and read the file. Incidentally he only claims to have transferred the stock to his wife under community property laws of Texas if his statement were true he would still have a vested interest in the income from it. We believe Cook told the truth in his sworn statements for I have known the McCannies family for about two generations and as you know they are and have been highly respected here as people of high character and integrity.

You may also know that Governor Jim Ferguson was impeached for depositing some state money in a Bank in Temple where he was a stockholder. The same law should apply to Shivers and he is guilty of the same offense. On October 5, 1952 Cook swore that the stockholders of Mission Times were Mrs. John H. Shary, multi-millionaire mother in law of Republican, Millionaire Governor Shivers, one Allan Shivers of Austin who I presume is the Governor. Mrs. Allan Shivers and Joe T. Cook of Mission, the affiant. On July 12, 1954 in a letter to the Editors of Texas Cook stated that Allan Shivers and he were associated in the printing business and that Allan Shivers speaks our language being in the same business and being a member of our association. I believe he told the truth in both statements.

Jerry, how do you explain Republican Shivers land manipulation wherein he gave an I. O. U. for \$250,000 for an option on a tract of shinnery land not suited for irrigation and in a little over six months he gives it back to the same people he got it from and picks up \$425,000.00 profit that he does not pay income tax on. Also why did it take a Court Order for his testimony to be made public property and why when a number of later purchasers felt they had been swindled and filed suit to recover their money were they paid off without any case coming to trial which Court records show to be the case. Thing really stinks doesn't it and sounds like a pay off for services rendered — he held an office then too as you know Jerry.

You state most country editors owe a little money. Don't you really think it would have been much more fair to them then had the millionaire Republican Governor Shivers given some of them these state printing contracts so they could make a payment on their debts rather than take them himself. Also how much do you suppose the freight bill on getting them from the Rio Grande Valley almost on the Mexican border to Austin amounted to and don't you think the State paid the freight bill?

The millionaire republican governor, land schemer and publisher says he fears communist will invade farms and ranches. On the vast farms known as Sharryland which he married into that is likely true that they did invade it years ago since he has used wet back labor for years at as low as 25 cents per hour wage. It would seem though that since the Legislature passed a law outlawing communism and prescribing penalties he and his Attorney General could keep things under control if they would enforce the law but we have not heard of a single complaint filed against any person alleging him to be a communist in Texas since the law was passed. Shivers was born near Beaumont and is holier-than-thou communist are about to take over down there. Why don't he prosecute them in his home county of Jefferson where Beaumont is located?

I regard you as a fine citizen Jerry and believe you like to be fair when you have the facts and for your paper to be recognized as printing the news as it happens. I will pay for the expense of a telegram to Shivers asking him the date he transferred that Mission Stock and to whom he transferred it and if his mother in law and wife don't own at this minute most of it provided you will publish in the paper a copy of your telegram and the answer if you get one and then you will know that Shivers gave himself a number of these state printing contracts before he transferred all his stock to his wife. The real issues of the campaign seem to boil down to whether or not it is best for people of Texas to have a political machine built up by Shivers during the twenty years he has held office and getting to where he can take \$400,000.00 cash out of a land scheme he doesn't have a dime of cash in; wherein John VanConkrite, Shivers former campaign manager can keep a broke insurance company operating for more than ten months while he collects his fee of \$1000.00 per month and thousands of policy holders are swindled out of their insurance protection; wherein the Governor flaunts the law and gives himself lots of state printing contracts, wherein the head of the machine states until he is elected that he is a Democrat and then becomes a turncoat Republican or if the People of Texas would not benefit to have a man such as Ralph Yarborough come fresh from the people and bring his record of a fine District Judge, a fine Sunday School teacher and Churchman, a Director of Lower Colorado River Authority, a fine war record and who has outlined a definite program of water conservation, improvement in education standards, public welfare and many other improvements he advocates and which have been carried by the papers all during the campaign and are being every day. Shivers had had a long time to carry out his program and if he were sincere and can carry it out he would have long ago. Sure is time for a change when you think it over isn't it. It just don't prove to be healthy to keep one man in office too long for their machines grow to be corrupt and run for the benefit of themselves rather than the people.

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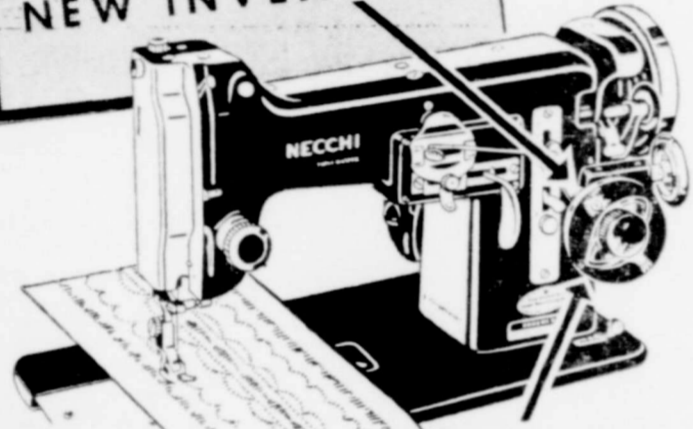

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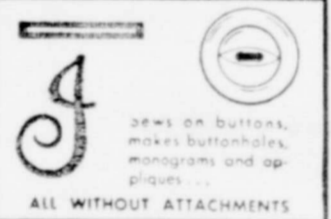

## Red Cross Plans To Hire Women In Overseas Clubs

ST. LOUIS, MO., Aug. 21.—Opportunities for immediate placement as recreation workers in the American Red Cross overseas club program are now open for young women between the ages of 23 and 28, according to an announcement issued today by Leslie This, director of Personnel, Red Cross Midwestern Area Office.

The Red Cross, as part of its traditional responsibility of service to the armed forces, supplements the Army's Special Services program with a club and club mobile program of its own to provide leisure-time activities for able-bodied servicemen. Mr. This stated that young women are urgently needed at this time to replace recreation workers now returning from Korea.

Ever present with the armed forces in the emergency of war, the Red Cross remains with American troops in peacetime, maintaining vital, morale-building recreation facilities for GIs where needed overseas.

To be eligible, women must have college training or special aptitude in recreation, education, music, dramatics, speech, and art. Physical fitness is essential. Those selected will receive two weeks orientation at Red Cross headquarters in Washington, D. C.,

and then go overseas. Openings are also available for women college graduates up to 35 years of age for recreation positions in military hospitals. Because the American Red Cross program of Service in Military Hospitals is conducted both in this country and overseas, applicants must be available for overseas assignment after a tour of duty in this country. Training and experience with groups in recreation, teaching, camping, hospitals, and other allied fields is advantageous.

For both club and recreation workers assigned overseas, the Red Cross pays maintenance and travel as well as provides an initial uniform allowance. The salary scale will be determined according to background and experience.

## WTCC Man Will Head New Texas Beef Campaign

FORT WORTH, Aug. 21.—Loy-an H. Walker of Abilene, manager of the agriculture and livestock department of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, has been named executive director of the newly-formed Texas Beef Council, according to Roy Parks, president of the organization.

Walker, who has been active in agricultural organization activities for the past 15 years, has been granted six months' leave of absence by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce to accept the position. Headquarters for the Council will be opened Sept. 1 on the second floor of the Will Rogers Memorial Coliseum at Ft. Worth.

A year ago when drought caused heavy marketing of range cattle Walker organized and conducted an "eat more beef" campaign for the West Texas Chamber of Commerce which showed the value of an organized educational sales effort.

Principal purpose of the Council is to promote the consumption of beef in Texas. Walker will cooperate with other state livestock associations, the American National Livestock and Meat Board, which are conducting campaigns on a national level. The Texas Beef Council is composed of 50 organizations representing producers of beef and others connected with and interested in the beef cattle industry.
